Great Housing Scheme.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—In The Monetary Times of August 30th, I find the following: Ontario Municipal Convention, Financial, Economic and Social sides of Municipal life discussed in Toronto. At this meeting the Prime Minister of the Province of Ontario addressed the Convention as follows (in part): On Thursday morning Premier Hearst described the Provincial Government's plan for assisting the municipalities in providing housing accommodation. The necessary legislation, he said, will have to be secured, but in the meantime municipalities can proceed with any scheme they have in mind after it has been first forwarded to, and approved by, the Government. The houses are not to exceed \$2,500 in cost of construction, and are not to rent for more than \$25.00 per month. Suggestions from municipalities would, he said, be gladly received, and he stated that it was not the desire of the Government to dictate to them, but rather to secure their cooperation. In my letter which you published in your issue of the 30th ult., I stated the Government of Ontario have offered \$2,000,000 to build houses for workmen.

If these houses are not to exceed \$2,500 then, we will assume that if three standard houses will be erected to cost \$1,500, \$2,000 and \$2,500, these will represent an average of two thousand dollars each, and would build 1,000 houses at \$2,000 amounting to Two Million Dollars; this would further mean that a \$1,500 house would rent at \$15 per month, \$2,000 house at \$20 per month, and the \$2,500 house at \$25 per month, equal to 12 p.c. on the cost of construction.

Take three standard houses to be built by the Dominion Co-Operative Building Association, Ltd., twenty foot frontage (single cottage), first floor, living room, small sitting room, kitchen, bath room, etc., and from three to four bedrooms in each house; on the second floor, with the option to purchase on easy terms by the tenant, and in addition free from taxation of any kind during occupancy by the tenant. These houses will be erected by your own company, with your own money, and let to shareholders and nobody else.

Germany's Lost Leaders.

(From the Boston Herald.)
Were there a complete roll-call at German general headquarters in the field, it might begin somewhat like this: "All-highest, Kaiser Wilhelm, war lord, in supreme command." No answer. "Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm of Prussia, commander-in-chief of the army of Paris." No answer. "Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, commander-in-chief of the army of the Channel ports." No answer. These lost leaders, where are they, and why are they absent? They have not been wounded, for their participation in battle was limited to the telephoning of orders or inquiries from behind the lines. The disappearance of the Kaiser may be said by his own people to be highly improper, seeing that the great German advance of this summer was designed to bear his name and was begun in his presence, after all Germany had been informed that he had taken the supreme command. The Prussian Crown Prince is said to have received six months leave of absence. Is he in Paris? He ought to have been there with his army in the first week of April, according to the Hindenburg time schedule. But he is not there even in the last week of August, unless the French have kept his capture secret, which is extremely unlikely. The Bavarian Crown Prince is said to have gone away on a serious enterprise. He is preparing at the age of 49 to marry a Luxemburg duchess of 22. But he and his army ought to have been long since at Dieppe, Boulogne or Calais, if not at Southampton or Dover. The retirement of these imperial and royal commanders is significant. They do not wish to have their names mixed up with the disaster. Too late. They proclaimed their leadership of Germany's military might to the position in which it falls before crushing blows. All is not well when the royalties jump from the breaking machine as the rate leap from the sinking ship. At this rate there may not be left in the field as much as a Serene Highness when the time comes for Marshal Foch to present his peace terms, "Unconditional Surrender."

Rammed Hun Sub.

British Captain Receives Decoration from the King.
For sinking in the Mediterranean in June, 1917, a large German submarine, which he believes was the former undersea cargo ship Deutschland, Capt. John Thompson of the British mercantile marine, has been awarded the decoration of the Distinguished Service Order by King George. The mariner rammed the submarine after an hour's manoeuvring in which the U-boat tried unsuccessfully to destroy his craft with shell fire. The submarine's huge size, Captain Thompson said afterwards, convinced him that it was the Deutschland, a belief which was strengthened when a lifebelt with that name on it floated to the surface after the vessel was rammed.

When pressed for particulars of the encounter, the captain replied: "I am the man who sank the Deutschland, but I cannot talk about it." The Deutschland has been variously reported as captured or sunk by the British. In March, 1917, the submarine was reported as having been towed into a British port. Later a report said that the vessel whose arrival in Baltimore and later in New London, in the summer of 1916, with cargoes from Germany, created international sensation, had been converted into a war sub. and was renamed the U-52.

TO FIGHT IN THE TRENCHES.
The Hague, Holland, Sept. 3.—From Gelderland on the German border it is reported that the soldiers, mostly elderly men who constituted the German frontier guard, have been sent to the front in France, because of the critical situation there. The new guard is composed of slightly wounded men who are convalescing in Belgium.

It is always noticed on the border when the chances of war are against Germany, by reason of desertion. On August 20 the whole German frontier post at Bergyk came into Holland, after switching off the electric current from the wire fence.

Since August 23, the Belgian-Dutch frontier has been closed to travellers on account of troops movements. M. Kellanaer, a member of the committee providing houses in Holland for Belgian children, in the course of the war, has made twenty-five trips into Belgium, and what he tells of the conditions there is appalling.

The state of affairs has been especially bad since the American relief has been held up and the sending of food impeded. In January, 1915, when relief was unable to reach all places regularly, he was sent to Malines and Etaples.

He witnessed thousands of women, children and aged men surrounding Cardinal Mercier on his walks through Malines, and begging for bread. "I saw," he says, "even Germans weep when they witnessed the scenes."
