I beg to call your attention to the great and steadily increasing expense of criminal justice in this County, amounting during the past year to nearly \$9000. Believing it to be the first paramount duty of every general government to provide for the administration of justice, I would recommend you to petition Parliament so to amend the law as that the expense of summoning and the remuneration for the attendance of Jurors and all indemnity paid to Crown Witnesses shall be provided for by the Provincial Government, and also that the charge of \$1 per day for constables attending hearings before Magistrates under the summary punishment acts should be charged with the other costs and not against the Council as has been the case heretofore. This item alone would be a considerable saving annually.
