Town and County News.

PUSLINCH AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.—This Society have fixed Tuesday the 8th October as the date of their annual Exhibition, to be held on the Society's grounds, Aberfoyle.

BASE BALL.—A game of base ball was played in Acton between the "Renforth's," of Stewarttown, and the "Pastimes," of Acton, on the 20th, which resulted in favor of the "Pastimes" by a score of 63 to 15.

FIRE IN HILLSBURG.—On Saturday about two o'clock a most disastrous fire occurred in Hillsburg, totally destroying Mr. Lang's bakery, dwelling house and stables, also Mr. Close's tavern and out-buildings. Had it not been for the strenuous efforts of the inhabitants the great part of the village would have been in ruins. Messrs. Lang and Close saved very little of their furniture, the flames spreading so fast that they were unable with all the assistance at hand, to get out. There is some insurance on the property, but we have not learned to what amount. The origin of the fire is unknown, some saying that it started in the bakery others in the stable.

The Mutuals defeated the Athletic Philadelphia, on Saturday, by a score of 11 to 6, and the Troy club defeated the Boston club at Boston, on the same day, by a score of 17 to 10.

The Ottawa Citizen understands that Messrs. T. & W. Pannock have secured a Plumbago mine in Buckingham to furnish firm for one hundred thousand tons.

A son of Patrick Wallis, of New Glasgow, was killed on Monday afternoon, driving a load of lumber into a mill, when the load fell off the wagon, which passed his body, causing immediate death.

The store of Mr. G. H. Green Nelson, was entered on Friday by one John Osborne, who was charged with taking goods from the store, and was arrested and sent up for trial.

Although Ireland cannot be said to be in a settled state, yet it appears from the latest statistics that the rate of increase is noticeable. In 1871 there was a population of 5,100,000.

A telegram from Geneva, Switzerland, informs us that Mr. Warner, a correspondent for an English newspaper, was murdered there and robbed of 700 francs. Most of the money has been recovered, but the murderers have not been traced.
