It is true that at the end of January the local union made a demand for 65 cents an hour, 5 cents more than their present rate. It is equally true that this association refused this demand from the very first, and it was not, therefore, at a joint meeting held in the above reoms a week age that the trouble began.

In fact, some of them were getting it before June 1; but as business men we do not see our way clear to pay everyone who may be fortunate enough to pass an examination by the city authorities a minimum rate of 65 cents, irrespective of ability.


