New York, May 8.—Antonio Bonnane, a young butcher of 342 East Eleventh street, was at work skinning a calf which had just been killed. The calf hung in front of him on the hocks, and the butcher removed the skin by tearing it away with his left hand and striking quick blows under the hide with the knife in his right hand. It is said that Bonnano was not an expert in this work. He had already cut his wrist.

An unusually hard blow of the knife missed its aim and the sharp blade followed the arc of a circle which brought it directly against the man's thigh. Blood spurted from the severed femoral artery and Bonnano fell to the ground. Several men in the shop rushed to his assistance and one sent in a call for the ambulance. Before it arrived Bonnano had bled to death.

A MYSTERIOUS MURDER. Iwo Young Girls Poisoned by Strych-

London, May 9.—The police recently found in a room in Lambeth a young girl named Alice Marsh, aged 21 years, lying named Alice Marsh, aged 21 years, lying in the passage in her night-dress. She was apparently in a dying state, suffering from the effects of poison. In another part of the house the police discovered another young girl, fully dressed, named Emma Shrivell. She also appeared to have been poisoned. The girls were taken to St. Thomas' Hospital, but the Marsh girl died on the way in a cab. The other girl died in great agony a short time after being admitted to the bospital. It was at first thought that they had been poisoned by eating canned salmon. At the coroner's inquest held the next day the police constable who had found the girls testified that Emma Shrivell had told him on the way to the hospital that she and Alice Marsh had met a man known to them as "Fred," and that he had given them some globules, which they had swallowed. He afterwards accompanied them to their home, where he remained until 20 clock the next morning.
