LONDON, May 8.—Mr. Schmiedhorst, at the close of the Liberal conference, in summing up the reports, drew an average. He calculated that the general election will give the Liberals a majority of 77 in the next House, and held that the labor complications would exert only a minor influence.

Zola's Verdict.

PARIS, May 8.—M. Zola, referring to the Anarchist scare, said: "This issue excitement is much ado about nothing. My verdict is that the Anarchists are few in number, that they have no organization, and that the most they can do is to blow up a few houses. The public opinion will support summary justice dealt in the streets. Lynch law will speedily silence the advocates of Anarchy."

LONDON, May 8.—Capt. Verney, formerly a member of Parliament, who was expelled from the House of Commons and imprisoned for immoral conduct has been released from jail, his term of imprisonment having expired. He has gone to his estate at Biddulph, Wales, where he will live in the strictest seclusion and privacy. The entire period of his imprisonment was spent in the prison hospital.

Amey Told a Lie.

LONDON, May 8.—It has transpired that the story told by Amey Faulkner, the dressmaker who was found in a terribly injured condition beside the railway near Leeds, and who said she had been assaulted by a man in the compartment of the railway carriage and then thrown out, is without truth. The woman confessed that the story was concocted by herself, and instead of a man throwing her from the train she jumped out herself. She gave no reason either for jumping from the train or for telling the story that she had been assaulted.

The Modus Vivendi Treaty Ratified.

LONDON, May 8.—The ratifications of the Berlin Sea Arbitration agreement and modus vivendi convention were exchanged between Great Britain and the United States yesterday. The exchange of the ratifications was a brief formal ceremony. United States Minister Lincoln and Lord Salisbury held a meeting for the purpose of exchanging documents in connection with the matter. The two diplomats engaged in a short conversation, during which they exchanged mutual greetings. Lord Salisbury afterwards started for Windsor Castle, whither he had been summoned by the Queen.

No Chance for Deeming.

LONDON, May 8.—No petition in Deeming's case has yet been lodged with the judicial committee of the Privy Council. A petition is forwarded from Australia, but it will simply be refused a hearing. Mr. Lyle, Deeming's solicitor, defended a murderer who was executed in Melbourne last August. In that case he presented a petition to the Privy Council asking for a rehearing on the ground that the judge had misdirected the jury on the definition of insanity. The appeal was rejected. A similar course in the Deeming case would receive no consideration here.

The Financial Pulse.

LONDON, May 8.—During the week past discount was quiet at 1 for three months and 4 for short. All the indications point to the continuance of the extreme ease of the money market. The plethora of money is embarrassing the banks, and some of them are so loaded with deposits that they are reluctant to grant any interest on them. The refusal of bankers to allow interest on fresh deposits diverts money to the Stock Exchange, causing a stream of investing orders.

DESTRUCTION OF A JAPANESE STEAMER AT COREA.

WRECK OF A JAPANESE STEAMER AT COREA.

FIFTY LIVES LOST—THIRTEEN RESCUED—NO FOREIGNERS AMONG THE NUMBER.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 9.—The steamer Isuzu Maru was cast away during the night of April 28 at the entrance to an island harbor in Corea. The captain and twelve persons were saved, while 50 others, including two Japanese naval officers, were lost. The ship's cargo consisted of bound from Chumulpo to Japan. The vessel was officered and manned by Japanese, and no foreigners were among the passengers lost.
