AQUATIC.

STANBURY MAY COME TO CANADA.

London, July 14.—Stanbury, the Australian oarsman, who won the southing championship of the world race from Harding, over the Thames course yesterday, is considering the challenge sent from Canada by Gaudaur, and will probably accept it if the inducements are sufficient.

In yesterday's race betting was even. The men got away at 3:30 p.m. Stanbury pulled 36 and Harding 35 strokes to the minute. At the 22nd stroke Stanbury led by a length, and at 500 yards from the start was two lengths in the lead and took Harding's water. The mile was made in 4:28, Stanbury leading by four lengths. At Hammer-smith the Australian had increased his lead to six lengths, the time at this point being 8:17, which is 12 seconds better than the record. The race from this point to the finish was a mere procession, Stanbury rowing easily and frequently looking around to view the course. Barnes' bridge was reached at 19:17, Stanbury being eight lengths in front of his competitor. Stanbury won what appeared to be an easy victory. Time, 21:51. The race was for \$2,500, a side and the world's championship.

CHewed BY A DOG.

John Conn, a Toronto Boy, the Victim—A Young Woman Saves the Lad's Life.

Stuebenville, Ohio, July 14.—John, the six-year-old son of George Conn, of Toronto, was terribly lacerated about the face and head yesterday by a vicious Newfoundland dog, which attacked the boy while at play.

The lad, accompanied by several playmates, had wandered some distance from home and was playing on Adams street when a large Newfoundland dog was espied running down the street toward them, followed by a large crowd of men and boys. All of John's comrades ran and succeeded in climbing to places of safety, but John did not realize his danger, and stood still. When too late, however, he started to run, but was soon knocked down by the dog, who commenced to chew the boy's face and head.

At this point a young woman started toward the animal, who became frightened and ran away. The dog would probably have killed the boy had it not been for the timely appearance of the young woman.

WHERE THEY CAME FROM.

New York, July 14.—Immigration to this port during the fiscal year, 1896-97, 282,701; increase over year 1894-95, 72,781. Of these 118,635 were immigrants proper; 85,263 came to join their families, and the others have been in the country before. From Austria-Hungary came 52,071; Germany, 24,230; Italy, 66,445; Russia, 39,859; Sweden and Norway, 22,978; the United Kingdom, 33,226; and Turkey and Greece, 6,249. The total amount of money brought was \$3,524,399. The total number of immigrants deported was 2,624.

London and Middlesex Orangemen Celebrate at Goderich.

A Big Demonstration at the Lakeside Town.

The Procession—Speeches at Harbor Park—Dr. Freeborn Sails Into Laurier and the Liberals.

The Orangemen of London and Middlesex went to Goderich yesterday and joined in the immense celebration there in King William's honor. The majority returned at 11 p.m., and marched up Dundas street to the Edge block, to the music of Ahoghill Fife and Drum Band. They had a capital time at the lakeside town, which was full of Orangemen and ablaze with the rainbow hues of the Orange regalia. Goderich never had such a crowd in its history. The big procession was marshalled at the cricket grounds and moved off to Huron Park in the following order:

Speeches were delivered from the grand stand in the park, a pretty place on the lakeside. The breezes of old Huron tempered the heat, which would have been unbearable otherwise. County Master John Neil, of Centralia, was the chairman, and made a short address.

Rev. Bro. Stout, of Holmesville, county chaplain, followed, and went into the history of Jesuitism. He warmly welcomed the Orangemen, and expressed gratitude for the great majority rolled up for him in York.

"What about Laurier?" asked someone.

"We are going to see what Laurier will do," replied the county chaplain.

"If we carry out the true principles of the order, dare Laurier take our God-given principles from us?"

Give us the spirit of the men who fought at Derry, the men who were obliged to feed upon vermin and raw hides; give us the spirit of such men, and we will defy Laurier and any Grit or Tory Government which may come in."

The speaker said it was no part of the obligation of Orangemen to be wedded to any political party.

Rev. Mr. Currie, a superannuated Goderich clergyman, was the next speaker. Contrary to all advice, he believed the society had been used as a kind of political machine, and he considered they were not the best thing every member could do was to have a little less Gritism, a little less Toryism, and a little more Protestantism.

They would have to act more fully in the future, because many Roman Catholics and also many weak-kneed Protestants were becoming impressed with the idea that the sole object of the order was the persecution of the Church of Rome. On the contrary, the Orangemen were not a persecuting society, but a society advancing Protestant principles, willing to let Catholics live in far more peace than the Catholics allowed the Protestants in early times. The constitution and bylaws were founded on the Bible, but they simmered down to the belief of William of Orange, who said: "The laws of England and the Protestant religion we will maintain." The order compelled no man to vote either Grit or Tory. Its members were not priest-ridden; they were free for sale, and that was why they had their freedom, and it also partly accounted for the divided vote given not long ago. They were not hindered from doing their duty in any respect, although attempts might be made to interfere with them. As to separate schools, he did not care if they were, for institutional ten thousand times over; he knew they were not for the benefit of the country.

Dr. Clinton, made the last address. It was largely devoted to an attack on Mr. Laurier and the Liberal party. He (Laurier) had called the Remedial Bill a half-hearted measure; that the Tupper bill was only the shadow of a substance; "Coming events cast their shadows before," said Dr. Free-

born, "and what you may therefore expect from Mr. Laurier, with about 160 members behind him, who have either voted for or pledged themselves to vote for remedial legislation. We may expect that he will give his minority friends in Manitoba their separate schools. Look back at the time Riel was hung; these very men said the Tories had better not do it because they were afraid of the French people in Quebec. And when Sir John Thompson announced in the House of Commons that the law would take its course in the case, they turned around and began to howl, that it was done merely to appease you blood-thirsty Orangemen. Some of us will see the error of our ways before the next 12th of July. This party has always raised the race and creed questions in Canada, and what can you expect of such a party as that? What can you expect of the representatives of Huron? Do you think they will go back on Mr. Laurier today? Not much danger of it. Why, they would not even give your respectable Orange Society a bill of incorporation that would enable you to carry on life insurance in your order. Judging from their utterances in the past, I cannot place much confidence in what they will do for you in the future." (Hear, hear.)

Continuing, the doctor said Orangemen possessed unswerving loyalty to the old flag, and he might add to the old pole if they liked. They had no use for Goldwin Smith, Elgin Meyers, or even Dan. McGillicuddy, and their exaltation ideas. No man could reverse the old flag and hanker after the Stars and Stripes no more than he could serve two masters, consistently.

Two Railway Disasters.

Picnic Train Wrecked and Five Persons Killed.

Collision at Kingston, Ja.—Eleven Dead and Forty Badly Hurt.

Chicago, July 14.—A picnic special train on the Wisconsin Central road ran into a siding at Altonheim cemetery, ten miles from this city. The train consisted of 13 cars, heavily loaded, and was returning from Schiller Park. Five people were killed and many injured.

Dead—Charles Samuel, Frederick Kertell, Frank Koch, Mary Arnold, Lena Hubert. All of the killed were standing on the front platform of the first coach, and were crushed to death against the baggage car.

The train was running only at ten miles an hour, but the force of the collision was sufficient to partially telescope the first coach.

Kingston, Jamaica, July 14.—A working train on the Port Antonio Railway became unmanageable on a sharp decline and dashed down the track at a speed of at least sixty miles an hour. At the foot of the decline the train struck a stationary engine, causing a terrible wreck.

The list of those killed and injured includes eleven dead and forty badly hurt. Those killed were all natives of Jamaica. Two American foremen, named Graf and Thiel, were among the injured.

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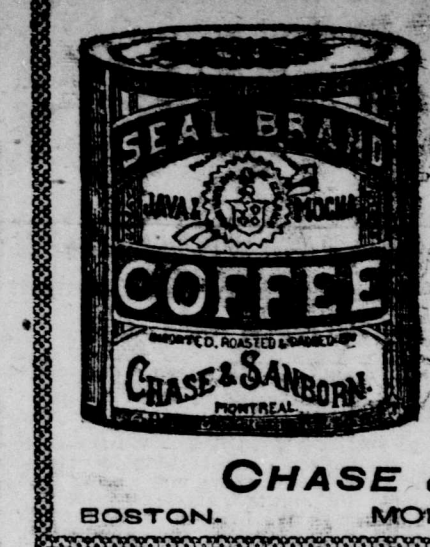
