FINE, VERY WARM, LOCAL
THUNDER STORMS.

Toronto, July 12-11 p.m.—The distribution of pressure remains much the same as it was yesterday, except that the lowest pressure is now further to the northward. Some heavy thunderstorms have again occurred in Manitoba and the Northwest. There have also been a few thunderstorms from the lakes to the Atlantic. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 50°-70°; Calgary, 48°-66°; Qu'Appelle, 50°-78°; Winnipeg, 58°-80°; Toronto, 60°-85°; Montreal, 65°-78°; Quebec, 62°-74°; Halifax, 60°-80°.

Toronto, July 13-1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (favoring the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Moderate to fresh southerly to westerly winds; generally fine and very warm; some local thunderstorms.

—The Queen's avenue tile sewer has been completed.

—Alexander, son of Mr. S. H. Craig, has gone on a trip to the Northwest.

—Mr. Walter Ince, of Cleveland, Ohio, is visiting his parents at Queen's avenue.

—Miss Katie Minton, of Toronto, is visiting relatives and friends in this city.

—Miss Florence Ince, of Queen's avenue, has left on an extended visit to Cleveland, Ohio.

—Mr. Robert Elliott, city, has left for Winnipeg and the Northwest on important business.

—Ald. Moule was acting mayor yesterday. Mayor Essery went to the Orangerie's celebration in Exeter.

—Mr. H. Payne has retired from the butcher business in London West, and leaves shortly for his home.

—The city engineer has ordered all the sewers of the city to be flushed. Mr. Wm. Ironside is in charge of the work.

—Miss Kate Clement, daughter of Rev. B. Clement, of London West, has arrived home from visiting friends in Paris.

—About 300 people went to Port Stanley yesterday. 2nd annual picnic of the First Congregational Church was held.

—George Watson has been granted a permit to erect a \$700 brick stable in the rear of the Walsh House, King street.

—An immense crowd of Orangemen and their friends went from the city to Exeter yesterday. The number is estimated at from 700 to 800.

—Fred R. Marshall, formerly with P. A. McDermid, druggist, Alvington, is visiting Walter Armstrong, city, en route to his home in Britain.

—The C. P. R. announce a cheap rate to the city of London, and last week delivered to Messrs. H. O'Hara & Co., 24 Toronto street, \$735,000 worth of debentures, the bulk of this issue having been sold in London, Eng.

—Bishop Fallows, of Chicago, and Dr. Bondhager arrived in the city yesterday. The local Endeavorers gave them a drive around in the afternoon to show them a model Canadian city.
