

Sheep and lambs were steady, Receipts at the two markets were 6 carloads, which included 524 hogs, 64 calves and 120 sheep and lambs.

Export Cattle-Prices lower than on last market day, with considerable buying. In one or two cases extra fancy sold as high as 5 1-8c; eleven car loads of the best export cattle, averaging about 1,350 lbs per head, sold at \$4 60 to \$5 per cwt.

Although there was considerable activity in butchers' cattle the feeling was slightly easier, at 3c to 4 1-4c per lb, mostly the latter for choice. About car loads were taken for Montreal. Some of the common cattle were hard to sell.

Not many stockers and feeders offered: market was steady. A few good half-fat feeders sold in the vicinity of 4 1-2c. A bunch of choice feeders, averaging 1,300 lbs, sold for \$4 65 per cwt.

Mrs. Hyams Prostrated by Her Cross-Examination.

A Servant Who Washed Blood Stains From Prisoner's Clothes.

Important Testimony - A. Witness Who Doubts That the Weight Could

Have Slipped.

Toronto, May 15.—At the Hyams murder trial this morning Mrs. H. P. Hyams was called and her cross-examination continued. Before Mr. Lount was through with her she had to retire, owing to faintness, and was finally taken home in a condition of complete prostration. She denied that what Harry had told her about his going into the warehouse when coming from the barber shop, was that he found no one in the place, that he called aloud without receiving an answer, and that then, on going down stairs, he found Willie lying dead and lifted the weight off him, and that Expressman Fox came in after. What he had really said to her was that Expressman Fox fortunately had followed him into the warehouse, and that he

helped him to lift the weight off Willie. Mrs. Eliza Pengelly, who for eighteen months was a servant in the Hyams' house and who left some months after the accident, testified that a few days after Willie Wells had been killed she washed a pair of trousers belonging to one of the prisoners, on the legs of which there were blood spots. The trousers were afterwards sent to the

John Wright, a plumber, gave evidence as to the weight and said that he did not now believe that it could have slipped off the hook while in the weight shaft. Samuel Grundidge testified to having loaned the prisoners \$1,400 on their furniture and \$200 on a demand note.
