EIGHT-HOUR LEGISLATION.

ASK FOR MORE ROOM

Doctors Urge Upon the Hospital Trust
the Need of Increased Accommo-
dation—Other Business.

A meeting of the hospital trust was
held in the city hall yesterday after-
noon, there being present Col. Lewis
(chairman), Messrs. Thomas McCor-
mick, James Gilmore, T. H. Purdon,
Q.C., and Superintendent Dr. Balfour.
A deputation consisting of Dr. John
D. Wilson and Dr. Drake urged upon
the trust the necessity of finishing the
plastering, etc., of the third story of
the hospital. They guaranteed its fur-
nishing if the board would attend to
making it fit for occupancy. The cost
of the work would be between \$1,500
and \$1,600. The reasons advanced by
the doctors was the utter inadequacy
of the present accommodation for pa-
tients, though the unusually high num-
ber of patients at present is due to the
prevalence of typhoid fever. In the
course of the discussion the doctors re-
ferred to the overworked condition of
the nursing staff, and the fact develop-
ed that at present three of the nurses
are ill with typhoid fever. The trust

The Strauss Orchestra.

It is indeed a matter of regret that
the home-coming of the South African
soldiers should have conflicted with
the engagement at the London Opera
House last night of Eduard Strauss
and his famous Viennese orchestra,
for many citizens of London thereby
missed the opportunity of a musical
treat such as is not often afforded
them, and a deserving and talented
company of musicians were deprived
of the encouragement and patronage
which was their due. The orchestra,
which is a splendid organization of 41
musicians, gave eminent satisfaction
in the various selections, and evinced
a remarkable degree of fine and varied
temperament and individuality into
his methods as a conductor, and to
this fact is owing very largely the
unique reputation which his orchestra
has gained. It is in the rendition of
the Strauss music that the orchestra's
work is especially noticeable, for it
cannot be denied that there are several
American orchestras that are fully
equal, if not superior, to it in the ren-
dition of the operatic and other music
played by them. The work of the
strings and wood wind is of
the finest quality, but the brass is
discordant at times. It was for this
reason that the work of the orchestra
excelled in the more delicate passages
of their numbers, while their work in
stronger parts fell short of the critical
musical standard. The most enjoyable
number was undoubtedly the exqui-
site "On Wings of Song," while others
worthy of special mention were
Mozart's "Ave Verum" and the selec-
tion from "Elyvia" (Smaraglia); waltz,
"Doctrien" (Eduard Strauss); "Ave
Verum" (W. A. Mozart), arranged for
string quartet and harp by Eduard
Strauss; entr'acte and pizzicato from
the ballet "Elyvia" (Debussy); potpourri
from the opera "Pasciocco" (Leon-
cavallo); waltz, "Fledermaus" (Johann
Strauss); song, "On Wings of Song"

"What About Tarte?"

Toronto, Nov. 4.—One of the inter-
ruptions which Liberal speakers have
met with all over Ontario during the
past campaign is the familiar cry
"What about Tarte?" Mr. Pattullo,
M.P.P. for North Oxford, ran up
against a number of animated inter-
ruption remarks at Mr. McKinnon's
meeting at Glen Williams, in Halton
county, the other night. The meeting
was anti-Liberal, and apparently or-
ganized for the purpose of worrying
the speakers. But Mr. Pattullo is one
of our public speakers who improves
on interruptions, and his ready wit
and ability to answer all questions,
soon made him master of the situation,
and there was after a time perfect
quiet, except from one auditor, who
kept on the refrain, "What about
Tarte?"

Turning on him, Mr. Pattullo told
why Conservatives disliked Mr.
Laurier, and made a vigorous defense
of the master of public works. In spite
of all this, said he, when we show
what the Laurier government has done
for the country, we are met with the
cry "What about Tarte?" When we
show that labor is plenty and wages
good, the answer is "What about
Tarte?" When we prove that the
policy of the Liberals has made the
manufacturers and the business men
and the farmers prosperous, there is
the old refrain, "What about Tarte?"
Dropping his voice to very solemn
tones, Mr. Pattullo went on to say
that he supposed it would be so until
the end of time. "Even at the last
great day, when all things here shall
dissolve, and the elements melt with
ferment heat, when the last trump
shall sound, and the politicians of the
world be called together to receive
their final sentence, even on that
solemn night, away off in a far corner
of the universe, some restless, miser-
able Tory, who will shake the ashes
from his hair, kick the coals from
about his feet, and interrupt the pro-
ceedings by growling, 'What about
Tarte?'"
