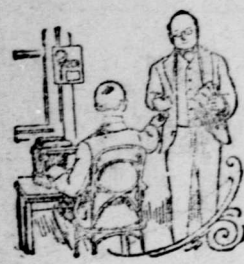

METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, June 15 - 8 p.m. - A pronounced area of high pressure which covers the lake region has remained almost stationary since yesterday, as has also the low pressure over the Southern and Western States. These conditions point to a continuance of existing weather in the various districts. Fine, warm weather from Ontario eastward, and fair, very warm in Manitoba and the Territories. Thunderstorms have been pretty general just to the south of Manitoba, but as yet the drought continues unbroken in that province. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 54-68; Kamloops, 62-72; Calgary, 44-76; Prince Albert, 50-70; Qu'Appelle, 45-78; Winnipeg, 46-88; Fort Arthur, 45-78; Parry Sound, 46-72; Toronto, 59-75; Ottawa, 58-78; Montreal, 54-72; Quebec, 50-72; Halifax, 52-76.

Local temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Friday, June 15, were: Highest, 78°; lowest, 47.5°.

Today (Saturday) the sun rose at 4:35 a.m., and sets at 8:01 p.m. The moon rises at 10:33 p.m. and sets at 8:25 a.m.

NORMAL SCHOOL CLOSING.

The closing of the first term of the London Normal School was observed last night by an enjoyable reception tendered by Principal Merchant to the staff and pupils of the Normal and Model Schools. An excellent programme was rendered, made up of solos by Miss Roblyn and Dr. Holmes, a duet by Mr. and Miss Temptation and a recitation by Dr. Crawford. Some interesting physical experiments, including an exhibition of x-rays, were conducted by Principal Merchant. A promenade concert was given, the music being furnished by an orchestra under the direction of F. L. Evans, musical instructor of the school. The valedictory address was delivered by L. T. Miller, of Stratford, and replies were made by Dr. Crawford, Rev. J. W. Holmes, Principal Graham, Vice-Principal Dearness and Principal Merchant. Afterwards all present sat down to a dainty spread.

THE COLBORNE STREET CHURCH PASTORATE.

The Stratford Herald, in speaking of the dissatisfaction existing among the members of the Colborne Street Methodist Church, city, in regard to the action of the conference in appointing Mr. Birks as the pastor, says: "The action of the Colborne Street Church does a most undesired injustice to Rev. A. K. Birks, M.A., B.D., and will create not a little indignation here, where Mr. Birks' merits as a scholar, preacher and pastor are warmly recognized. Mr. Birks had been unanimously elected for four years by his Stratford congregation, so that his appointment to the charge of Colborne Street Church in London was no doing of his. His going to London will be merely a loyal obedience to the authorities placed over him. Rev. Mr. Birks is a man not in requisition. Congregations in Lucknow, Essex and Kingsville, all large and strong congregations, had sought for him as their pastor, and advances had been made to secure him next year, supposing he would return the fourth year to Stratford. He is well-equipped to give the Colborne Street Church efficient service, and it is to be hoped the people of that church will think better of their attitude, avoid the charges of presumption and religious ill-manner and uncharitableness and accord Mr. Birks the welcome and support that every clergyman needs. Mr. Birks deserves better than to be made the victim of a disorderly movement of the class that it was thought the sensible lay Methodists element had outgrown. From Mr. Birks the Colborne Street Church will get as good, if not better, service than from any man they might have directly sought for, so that in the practical sense they have not a shred of cause of complaint. Moreover, it is understood that the deciding vote in favor of inviting Mr. Wilboughby stood 6 to 4, being made unanimous afterwards as a matter of form so that the grounds for a rupture are absurdly weak."

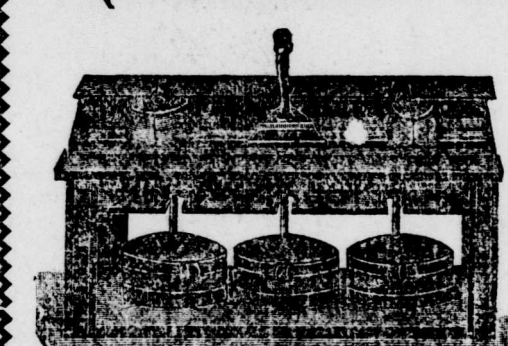
