MANY MINERS

WER KILLED

By Duet Explosion in a Mexican Colliery.

The Dead Number 106—Most of the Men Mexicans and Chinese.

Kansas City, Feb. 2.—A special from San Antonio, Texas, says: A dust explosion has caused a great loss of life in mine No. 6 of the Honda Coal Mining Company, in Mexico, 85 miles south of Eagle Pass. At the time the explosion occurred there were 180 miners at work in the mine, all of whom were entombed by the shaft being choked up by falling earth and stone loosened by the explosion. The Honda mine is located at Coahuila, at a terminus of a branch of the Mexican International road, about 100 miles south of Eagle Pass, and is the most important in that state.
MOSTLY MEXICANS AND CHINESE.
San Antonio, Texas, Feb. 2.—The latest information from the Honda (Mexico) mine shows the explosion to have been fully as serious as at first reported. There was a total of 106 miners at work in the mine when the explosion occurred, and all of them are dead. The majority of the victims are Mexicans and Chinese, very few Americans having been at work in the mine. Every mule in the mine was killed, three dead oxen being taken from the explosion today. The work of clearing away the wreck in order to get to the bodies is being rushed as rapidly as possible, but there is no hope that any of the men will be rescued alive. The explosion occurred in mine No. 6 and was occasioned by striking a gas pocket. The mine is the property of the Coahuila Coal Company, R. M. McKenna being superintendent. The names of none of the victims have been learned here. The loss to the owners of the mine is very heavy.

KILLED BY RUNAWAY TEAM.
Sydney, C.B., Feb. 3.—Miss Craig, of this place, received injuries in a runaway accident on Friday, from which she died. She was attempting to cross the street, when a runaway team ran along and knocked her down. The wheels of the wagon passed over her body and injured her internally.

FATALLY POISONED.
Montreal, Feb. 3.—Fred Ford died at the Montreal hospital from the effects of poison, supposed to have been self-administered. Ford was an inmate of the House of Refuge when he took the poison.

HUNTER ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.
Owosso, Mich., Feb. 3.—Walter Cope and a couple of 12-year-old boys were out hunting rabbits on Saturday afternoon. By the accidental discharge of a gun the hunter was seriously wounded, and it is feared will not live.

KILLED BY A TRAIN.
Cannonsburg, Pa., Feb. 3.—Two of the best known young people of this place were instantly killed on Saturday night while driving across the tracks of the Chesslers branch of the Pa. R.R. at Railroad at Arden station. A few miles this side of Washington, Pa. The dead are: Miss Anna Benderholt, aged 15 years; Mr. Samuel Smith, a mail carrier, of this place.

WRECKED BY LEAKY GAS PIPE.
Lafayette, Ind., Feb. 3.—The house of Frank Melton was wrecked by an explosion. His daughter Goldie, aged 15, there was a leak in the gas pipe. The daughter was seriously and her parents badly burned.

KILLED FOR \$7.
Chicago, Feb. 3.—C. C. Marx, a promi-

nent Chicago liverman, was shot and killed by Edward Coughlin, one of his drivers. Coughlin was arrested and admitted shooting. The shooting resulted from a dispute over \$7 which Coughlin claimed was due him.

THREE MEN INJURED.
Thompson, Pa., Feb. 3.—Three men employed by the Carnegie company were probably fatally injured by a fall of rock which they and others were loading on cars. They are: John Donack, John Gunbush and Andrew Yochup.

WATERBURY FIRE-SWEPT

Loss Estimated at \$4,000-000 to \$5,000,000.

Blaze Broke Out Sunday Evening in the Business Section

And Was Not Under Control Until 9:30 This (Monday) Morning.

Waterbury, Conn., Feb. 3.—The city of Waterbury today stands devastated by fire. The loss, according to the estimates of the most conservative business and insurance men, will run between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. With all this great property loss, there was, strange to say, no loss of life and but few accidents have been caused by the city's heart, taking in a triangle bounded on the north by Exchange Place, on the west by Bank street, on the south by Grand street, and on the east by South Main street, has nearly been wiped out.
