## FIRE-SWEPT

Loss Estimated at \$4.000.-000 to \$5,000,000.

Blaze Broke Out Sunday Evening in the Business Section

And Was Not Under Control Until 9:30 This (Monday) Morning.

Waterbury, Conn., Feb. 3.-The city of Waterbury today stands devastated by insurance men, will run between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. With all this great property loss, there was been, strange to say, no loss of life and but few accidents have been recorded. The city's heart, taking in a triangle bounded on the north by Exchange Place, on the west by Bank street, on the south by Grand street, and on the east by South Main street, has nearly been wiped out. The first fire, which began about 6:20 o'clock last night, in the big store of the Reid & Hughes Drygoods Company, on Bank street, was not considered un-der control until about \$3,000,000 worth of property had been destroyed.

A SECOND BLAZE. A SECOND BLAZE.

About the time the firemen supposed they had the first fire under control, a disastrous fire broke out in another quarter of the city, near the city hall and the police station. The Scoville House, the city's leading hostelry, was discovered to be on fire about 4 o'clock this morning, and by daybreak was a complete wreck.

At the outset of the blaze the hotel's occupants were forced to seek the street in their nightclothes. With the ringing of a second alarm the entire city was of a second alarm the entire city was thrown into a panic.

HELP FROM OUTSIDE. Although the Waterbury fire department was reinforced by the services of the most efficient men from the departments of nearby Connecticut cities, the fire was completely beyond their control. At various times the advisability of using dynamite was discussed, but the idea was abandoned, because of its dan-UNDER CONTROL.

At 9:30 a.m. the great conflagration seemed to be fully under control. Since seemed to be fully under control. Since 6 a.m. the firemen have been gradually getting the better of the flames, and, while the ruins of the Scoville House and adjacent buildings are burning, no further spread of the flames is anticipated.

FOUR ACRES BURNED OVER. The fire burned over four acres of the The fire burned over four acres of the city's choicest business section.

Among the prominent buildings totally destroyed are the block occupied by the Reid & Hughes Drygoods Company, the entire plant of the Waterbury American, the Masonic Temple, the two leading hotels of the city, the Scoville and Franklin Houses, the clothing store of Jones, Morgan & Co., and J. B. Mullings; the Hamson-Sellow Furniture Company, the New England Engineering Company, the New England Engineering Company, the Sapaline-Hoffman Company, the W. L. Douglas Shoe Company, Ryan & Fitz-maurice; the Johnson block, occupied by Cannon & Webster; Perschel's Turkish baths, and the Salvation Army working-men's home; Jean J. Jacques' \$40,000 block on Grand street, the Best Furniture Company and scores of others. In all about 100 of the city's most prominent business houses are burned out. The property loss may be estimated at between \$2,000,000 and \$2,500,000, and the loss on stocks, etc., at as much more. As far as can be learned, the greater part of the loss is covered by insurance.

MILITIA SENT FOR. During the night the mayor was in communication with Gov. McLean, and the militia was called out. Companies A and G, consisting of about 120 men,

A and G, consisting of about 120 men, were detailed about the fire district, and are still on duty.

The armory, city hall, the churches and other public places have been turned into temporary shelters, hundreds being rendered homeless. WANTS NO FINANCIAL AID.

Mayor Kilduff was asked if he would call for financial aid from outside cities. The mayor responded quickly, saying: "Waterbury, although suffering a grievous blow, will take care of herself, although extremely grateful for the expressions of sympathy that have poured in on every side."

San Antonio, Texas, Feb. 2.—The latest information from the Hondo (Mexico) mine shows the explosion to have been fully as serious as at first reported. There was a total of 106 miners at work in the mine when the explosion occurred, and all of them are dead. The majority of the victime are Mexicane and China. of the victims are Mexicans and China-men, very few Americans having been at work in the mine. Every mule in the mine was killed, three dead ones being taken from the debris today. The work of clearing away the wreck in order to get to the bodies is being rushed as rapidly as possible, but there is no hope that any of the men will be rescued alive. The explosion occurred in mine No. 6, and was occasioned by striking a gas pocket. The mine is the property of the Coahuila Coal Company, R. M. McKeeny being superintendent. The names of none of the victims have been learned here. The loss to the owners of the mine is very heavy.
