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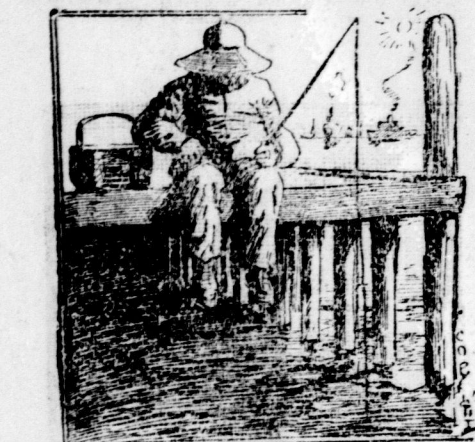

DRAGGING A MAN'S CREED

Attempt to Throw Out Tender From a Roman Catholic.

Public School Trustees Protest Against Such Conduct.

Recommendation of Committee Is Turned Down—Trustee McCormick's Admission.

The board of education has not had such a sharp meeting for a long time as that held last evening. There was just one matter of business—the consideration of the report of No. 2 committee recommending the acceptance of tenders for the alterations to the West London public school. The trouble all arose over the committee's action in recommending a tender which was not the lowest. Those who objected claimed that the lowest tender had been rejected on religious grounds. The advocates of the lowest tender won, but only after some hot firing across the board.

All the members were not present, but the following were there: Chairman Hamilton, and Trustees Birtwistle, Blackwell, English, Evans, Fitzgerald, Macpherson, McLean, and Zeigler. Mr. Evans, as chairman of the committee having the matter in hand, read his report, recommending the acceptance of the following tenders:

Mr. Thomas Fudge, \$1,146. Carpentering, W. T. Brown, \$1,073. Heating, W. Stevely & Son, \$128. Painting, A. R. Galpin, \$129.

The adoption of the report was moved by the committee chairman, Trustee Evans, and seconded by Trustee Fitzgerald.

Trustee Macpherson started a series of questions which were answered by Chairman Evans. First he asked if they were the lowest tenders. They were, he said, the lowest. The lowest for which was \$117, or \$12 less. Asked as to why this was not accepted, Trustee Evans said that the committee had voted against it. Trustee Macpherson pointed out that it was customary to reject tenders, but he was not told that it had been thought that Mr. Galpin would do a better job.

Trustee Evans then asked if it was informed that it was that of Messrs. Fudge and Fitzgerald. Trustee Evans said that he had referred to last year, when he said they had hit them hard on extra.

TRUSTEE GAMMAGE REBUKES BIGOTRY

Trustee Gammage then took a hand in the argument, putting the matter on a basis, by moving an amendment to the effect that the lowest tender should be given to the lowest tender, with the exception of that for painting, which should be given to the lowest tender. OUTLOOK FAVORABLE

Crops in Westminister Making Good Headway—Hay Very Heavy.

THE SCOTS AT PORT

Arrangements Completed for Thursday's Outing—Banquet at 6 P. M.

Farmers have been busy the last week or ten days gathering in their crop of hay, and very few of them have taken the trouble to come to market. Their time is too valuable.

A resident of Westminister Township, who was in the city today, told The Advertiser that the outlook for the crops in general was exceedingly favorable. The weather, as a whole, had been good, and all kinds of grain and roots were making great headway. Corn, especially, was coming on well with the rains, while barley was never looking better. The dry weather of the early spring had the effect of keeping the oats back at the time, the result being that the stock is stronger and better able to carry the grain. The only danger along this line is the rust, of which there has been no sign to date. The hay crop will be very heavy. New meadows will, in some instances yield two tons to the acre. The hay is firm also, whereas a year ago it was spongy and soft.

BASS FOR THE THAMES

Another Large Consignment Secured by Dr. Routledge, M.P.P.

Another large consignment of bass secured through the efforts of Dr. Routledge, M. P. P., has been placed in the River Thames at different points. The fish came from the hatcheries of the Ontario Government at Port Rowan, and the bulk of them were deposited at Ingersoll. Some were placed in the river near the Asylum for the Insane, and several hundred in the south branch of the river at another point near the city. The balance of the lot went to St. Marys. The next lot is to be deposited in Dugan's Creek, in the vicinity of Lambeth.

LOWEST TENDER ACCEPTED.

At this point Trustee Evans thought something had been "kicked," and "we had a longer discussion on the item for \$128 for heating; that was not proper, was it, Trustee Gammage?" Trustee Macpherson made an interruption and Trustee Evans told him to mind his own business.

"I am," said Trustee Macpherson. The years and days were then put on the amendment to accept the lowest tender, and the vote was: Years—Macpherson, English, Blackwell, Gammage and Zeigler—5. Years—McLean, Fitzgerald, Evans and McCormick—4.

Trustee Birtwistle refused to vote on account of the conflicting evidence, but some of the board insisted that he should vote, and the chairman upheld the contention. "Then I will vote for the lowest tender," said Trustee Birtwistle, and the amendment was carried by a vote of six to four. Chairman Hamilton not voting. Trustee Evans, as chairman of the committee, moved, seconded by Trustee Blackwell, that the report as amended be adopted, which it was.

RUSSIAN MURDERERS

Arrested in Connection With Killing of N. Sipiaguine.

Vienna, July 14.—It is reported from Kieff, Russia, that the police have arrested two members named Wieropotoff and Gerschunn, of the executive committee of the revolutionary society concerned in the murder of the Russian Minister of the Interior, M. Sipiaguine, who was assassinated at the ministry, April 16, 1902, by a student and of M. Bogdanovitch, Governor of Ufa, who was killed by two unknown men in a public park at Ufa last May.
