SOLENN CROWNING OF PIUS TENTH

Magnificent Ceremonies at
St. Peter's in Rome.

70,000 PEOPLE IN CATHEDRAL

An Impressive Service In St. Peter's
Crypt—The Coronation Scene One
of Splendor.

Rome, Aug. 9.—The ceremony of the coronation of Pope Pius X. took place today in the basilica of St. Peter's in the presence of the princes and high dignitaries of the church, diplomatic and Roman nobles, and with all the solemnity and splendor associated with this the most magnificent rite in the Roman Catholic church. As Cardinal Macchi, the dean of the cardinal deacons, placed the triple crown on the head of the venerable Pontiff, the throng of 70,000 persons gathered within the cathedral burst into unrestrained acclamations; the choir intoned a hymn of triumph, and the bells of Rome rang out a joyful peal.

It is 57 years since the Romans and Europe assisted at such a function in St. Peter's. The great basilica, popularly supposed never to have been quite full, was overflowing with humanity. The most magnificent and magnificent mixture of gold, red and silver, was erected in front of the high altar. As, contrary to custom on these ceremonial occasions, there were no galleries, the basilica bore more of its normal aspect. On the altar, which was dressed in white, stood the pontiff, silver-gilt candlesticks and a magnificent crucifix. All the available space within the cathedral was divided into sections by wooden barriers, which to a certain extent kept the vast crowd in order. In the early hours after sunrise a thick fog hung over Rome. The effect was especially magnificent on entering the piazza of St. Peter's, at times Michael Angelo's great dome disappeared completely from view, and at others it appeared through the flowing golden mist. As the morning wore on the fog disappeared and the sun shone with all its southern brilliancy until it became unbearably hot. At 6 a.m. the ringing of bells announced the imminent opening of the doors, and a gigantic crowd had waited for hours, and the police and Italian soldiers had a difficult task to maintain order, as the crushing and fatigued had begun to tell on the patience of the people. When the doors were opened the rush was terrific. Many who started from the bottom of the steps outside were lifted off their feet and carried into the cathedral. It was a great human torrent let loose thousands of people rushing, crushing and squeezing, amid screams, protests, gesticulations and cries for help. Women fainted in comparatively large numbers, and even men were overcome by the heat, but no serious accidents were reported.

After their entrance the people had further long hours of waiting, and it is computed that the vast throng on their feet altogether ten hours before the ceremony and five hours while it lasted. Those who had received special invitations, including the high ecclesiastics who were not participating in the procession, the pope and his suite, the prince of the Vatican, Prince Massimo, accompanied by his daughter-in-law, Princess Beatrice, the daughter of Don Carlos, and Duke Robert of Parma, were the only members of a royal family to attend. Among the aristocracy there was a great mixture of those Roman nobles who remain faithful to the papacy and those adhering to the secularist party.

Inside the Vatican palace there was no less movement and bustle as the hoped procession of the pope, estimated at 500 people, was formed. The pope seemed to be the only tranquil one among them all. He arose unusually early, and took a few turns in the Vatican garden. Then he allowed himself to be dressed by the cardinals. He evinced no nervousness, and even jokingly to the master of the ceremonies, who the other day suggested that he should use the plural form in speaking of himself. "We are well this morning, but we may be different on returning from our coronation." Just before entering the sedia gestatoria he asked for his spectacles, and when the master of the ceremonies discreetly hinted that his holiness would look better without them, he said: "I have no desire to appear what I am not," and in fact he wore them during the entire ceremony.

The central figure in the long cortege was Pius X., borne in the sedia gestatoria. His heavy white robes and the red and gold mitre were worn without an effort. Over the Pontiff's head a canopy was held by eight men, while the historic ostrich feather fans, with peacock tips, gave a touch of barbaric splendor to western eyes. Surrounding Pope Pius were the noble guard in red uniforms and gleaming helmets and carrying drawn swords, while in front were the cardinals, the cardinal bishops and the cardinal priests, and the cardinal deacons. The chaplain bore the cushion on which rested the triple crown. He was accompanied by the pontifical fever and by a special guard composed of Swiss and was followed by the choir of the Sistine Chapel in white, which sang as it went along.

A quaint ceremony was then carried out. The master of ceremonies knelt three times before the Pontiff, each time lighting a handful of hemp, which surmounted a silver torch and as the flame flickered he chanted in Latin, "Holy Father, thus passeth away the world's glory."

The procession then proceeded, the Pope's face meanwhile illuminated by a smile.

At the Chapel of the Sacrament there was another halt, and His Holiness left the sedia gestatoria and prayed a while at the altar. On re-entering the chair he was carried to the Chapel of St. Gregory, where he officiated at a mass. Then all the cardinals donned their silver caps and white mitres, and the Pope was borne (Continued on page 6.)

FOUND RICH GOLD REEF

Soo Capitalists Claim It Assays \$5,000 to the Ton.

Sault Ste. Marie, Aug. 10.—J. B. Miller, of the Sault, and associates, claim to have made the biggest find ever heard of in Ontario on a property owned by them, situated about three miles west of Webwood station. The claim comprises a reef 174 feet wide, 900 yards long and standing up perpendicularly from 50 to 75 feet high from the plain below. It is of banded quartz intersected by seams of mica, quartz schist. A portion of the surface has been stripped of its mossy covering, with the result that in the whole section uncovered the gold is visible in the quartz to the naked eye. Several specimens have been tested and some of them found to carry gold values as high as \$5,000 to the ton.

TWENTY PERSONS EATEN BY SHARKS

The Unfortunates Were Blown
From Ferries Into the
River Tigris.

Bagdad, Aug. 10.—A cyclone has nearly wiped out the harbor districts and turned the River Tigris into a furious ocean. The bridge lately finished has been blown asunder, wooden and iron debris being carried many miles. Two ferries, carrying hundreds of people, were swallowed by the waves. The storm threw them high in the air, and then smashed to the bottom, where they broke up. Of the multitudes struggling in the water, more than 20 men and women were eaten by sharks within sight of the shore.

CRAZED BY FEVER

Buffalo Man Kills Wife and Attempts
Suicide.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 10.—Kent Stowe, son of F. D. Stowe, general central agent of the Merchants Dispatch and Transportation Company, in this city, and residing at No. 501 Richmond avenue, shot his wife early today, killing her instantly, and then shot himself with probable fatal result. Young Stowe is now at the hospital, where the surgeons are endeavoring to locate the bullet.

Stowe had been suffering from malaria fever, but was about again, yesterday he and his wife were out for a long drive, returning during the evening in good spirits. They have an infant child, a year old, which Stowe is said to have brought down stairs this morning, and left with his parents. A few minutes later his father heard pistol shots from above and rushing upstairs found his daughter-in-law dead and his son unconscious.

Mr. Stowe, sen., believes that his son was suffering from temporary insanity, the result of the fever.

King Peter's Children.

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CONFESSES TO MANY MURDERS

Ghoul Cantrell Tells Authorities of His Black Deeds.

HE GIVES NAMES AND DATES

Tells of Fate of Unfortunate Carrie Seave, Who Escaped From a Hospital.

Indianapolis, Aug. 10.—Rufus Cantrell, the king of the colored ghoul, who is serving a sentence in the Indiana reformatory for grave-robbing, has made a sworn confession to Former Superintendent Byers, of that institution, and it was today forwarded to the attorney-general in order that the commission of the several crimes may be taken action upon it.

The confession deals with several murders that have occurred in this city and the correctness of dates and circumstances show that Cantrell had an intimate connection with them. He admits participating in most of the murders, and the police will take up the investigation and attempt to bring the guilty parties to justice. For prudential reasons the authorities refuse to give out the names of the men whom Cantrell says assisted him in the commission of the several crimes.

The first murder to which he refers was that of Policeman Watterston. Cantrell says he saw two men, whom he names, trying to rob a store, when Watterston came upon them. A fight ensued, and the police officer was killed. He recognized one of the men, and they stabbed him to death. He says one of the murderers is now in Philadelphia and the other is in this city.

The second case was that of a woman named Carrie Seave, who came to Indianapolis from Newark, N. J. He had \$300 or \$400 and wanted to locate in Indianapolis. By arrangement Cantrell says Johnson drove with three other colored men out West Tenth street on the way to a club house, that he (Cantrell) met them, and that after they left the carriage a quarrel was purely started, that Johnson was knocked down with a fence rail, and beaten to death. The body was taken to an Indianapolis medical college, and his attempt at self-destruction is supposed to have been caused by depression.

The next murder was a man from Pennsylvania, whose first name was Claude, the last name not being recalled. This was a case of a man who had a gold watch, a check for \$200 on the Englewood Bank of Chicago, and a man in Police's office says he met the man in Hamilton county, who has since been convicted of the grave-robbing case.

Cantrell says he and others had rented a house in the rear of 721 Missouri street, and that there the Pennsylvania man was entertained by a woman, who passed as the wife of the man, and whose name Cantrell gives in the confession. When we reached the Belt crossing we met a woman coming toward us. She was bareheaded and wearing a blue wrapper. She was of medium size, with white and had brown hair. The man who originally buried her had lived on Allisonville Pike. A flower pot was placed in the top of the grave by myself just under the surface in order that I could easily determine whether the grave had been disturbed.

Cantrell also confessed to killing a man named Jordan, and several days after the body was sold to a dental college in this city. There are so many circumstances in connection with these murders that Cantrell alone appears to know that the police superintendent is very much impressed by the confession.

MAY BE A MURDER

Reckless Shooting Puts a Girl's Life in Danger.

St. Thomas, Aug. 10.—A shooting affray has occurred at Brownville which may terminate fatally. While Mrs. Weaver and her daughter Kathleen, who have charge of the tollgate, were sitting near the table, they were fired upon by a man driving quite fast, with two men in it. Then opposite the door the man discharged a revolver, the bullet striking Kathleen, aged 15 years, in the head. A doctor was summoned, but the girl died of the wound, which may prove fatal. It is supposed the men were under the influence of liquor, as they had been shooting at random along the road leading to the tollgate.

Dundas, Ont., Aug. 10.—A. F. Pirie, editor and proprietor of the Dundas True Banner, is lying at the point of death at his home here, from the effect of a bullet wound in the head. The tragic affair occurred about 9:30 on Saturday night at Mr. Pirie's home, the wound being self-inflicted. The townspeople were dumfounded when reports of the affair were circulated.

Mr. Pirie was sitting with his cousin, Mr. Robinson Pirie, for some time, and left him to go upstairs for a few minutes. Shortly after his cousin heard the report of a revolver, and rushed upstairs to find Mr. Pirie lying unconscious, bleeding from a wound in his head. He immediately summoned assistance. REFORM OR DEATH SAYS SARAFFOFF

Only One End to Revolution in Macedonia.

CHRISTIANS DEMAND SAFETY

Bulgaria Calls Upon the Powers to Take Action—Reports of French Massacres.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Aug. 10.—"Nothing can end the present revolution in Macedonia until our national inspirations are satisfied or those fighting to attain them are exterminated."

This was the concluding sentence of a statement made to the special correspondent of the Associated Press who is investigating the situation in Macedonia, by the Macedonian committee at the revolutionary headquarters here. Boya Saraffoff, its head and front of the movement, is with the insurgents in Macedonia. His representatives here believe that the desired results will be reached through the present movement.

"The object of the movement," said the Macedonian committee, "is to win reform which will assure to the Christian population of Macedonia security for their lives and property, and the right to participate in the administration of the country."

"The present revolutionary organization came into existence nine years ago, when the Christians of the Bulgarian population of Macedonia became a flagrant. Today all Macedonia is embraced in the movement, and though it was not intended to strike so soon, because the preparations for the uprising were not sufficiently completed, the recent outrages of the Turks, the massacre of the innocent, the filling of the prisons with the Macedonian population, pillaging the entire villages, and the extorting of heavy fines from others under various pretexts, so exasperated all that the insurgents decided upon, no matter what might be the outcome."

"The first step was to gradually embrace every village in Macedonia until the autonomy of the Christian population was gained by force of arms or by the intervention of those great powers which desire peace. Until then we will lay down our arms."

The Macedonian revolutionary committee is now drawing up and will shortly circulate a declaration addressed to the powers, explaining Macedonian grievances and the objects of the revolution.

The Bulgarian ministry is closely watching the situation in Macedonia and has decided to instruct its frontier forces. Orders have been telegraphed to the frontier authorities to repulse the violence and prevent all unauthorized individuals as well as insurgents from crossing the Turkish frontier.

The foreign minister has informed the representatives of the powers that the Government would use its utmost endeavor to quell all unrest in Bulgaria occasioned by the events in Macedonia. He stated that the Government would take the necessary steps to induce the Porte to stop the persecutions of the Christians and the employment of Bashis Buzukis in suppressing the revolution. The massacres killed, followed the killing loss of the Bashis Buzukis, added to the number of the Bulgarian population in Macedonia, and thus force the hand of the Government.

Salonica, Aug. 9.—A party of Bulgarians, near Resna, murdered the guard which was escorting the mails to Monastir, and captured a large sum of money.

London, Aug. 10.—The Times this morning prints a dispatch from Sofia, dated yesterday, stating that the Bulgarians had taken the town of Krushevo, 25 miles northwest of Monastir, for two days, and had killed hundreds of the Turkish troops, and that the Bulgarians, fighting with the Turkish troops, in which 100 were killed on both sides.

The general belief is that the kidnappers are bound to considerably aggravate the already serious situation in Macedonia, and it is felt that it will undoubtedly encourage the Bulgarians to support the insurrectionary movement, which is spreading rapidly, notably to the southward of Monastir.

According to mail advices from Monastir, dated Aug. 9, the insurgents have recently occupied the little town of Krushevo, 25 miles north of Monastir, numbered 300.

SUICIDE AT AYLMER

A. Marshall, a Well-Known Farmer, Shoots Himself.

Aylmer, Aug. 10.—Alexander Marshall, a well known and highly respected farmer, who lived on Talbot street, about a mile west of this place, committed suicide Saturday morning by shooting himself with a revolver. The rash act was committed in a cornfield, about half a mile south of his home. It is supposed that he first took poison, as a bottle which had contained strychnine was found near the body. A bullet wound in the head and a revolver lying near told how the act was committed. Mr. Marshall was a well-to-do farmer, and no cause can be assigned for the rash act. He leaves a widow and three children.

ATTEMPT TO KILL FRENCH PREMIER

Anarchist Shoots at M. Combes in the Streets of Marseilles, France.

Marseilles, Aug. 10.—As Premier Combes was returning on Saturday afternoon to the prefecture from a banquet given by the Friendly Society of Teachers, two pistol shots were fired at the carriage in which he was riding. The premier was untouched and none of those accompanying him were hurt.

The attempt upon the life of the president of the ministry caused great excitement, and the crowd pointed out to the police as the author of the attempt a man dressed in fisherman's dress. His companion drew a knife, but the police quickly disarmed him. The police had much difficulty in protecting the man who had fired the shots. He struggled desperately, but was soon overcome, handcuffed and taken to the prefecture, where Mr. Combes had already arrived.

The first interrogation of the prisoner took place in the presence of the premier. The man said his name was Sauvaire Picolo. He spoke very bad French, with a strong Italian accent. He denied that he had fired the shots, but when searched a revolver was found, with two chambers which had been freshly fired.

FOUR BOYS DROWNED

A Yachting Disaster in Harbor of St. John.

St. John, Aug. 10.—(G. N. W. press dispatch).—The worst fatality of the year in New Brunswick occurred yesterday afternoon, when four young boys lost their lives in the Magaguadavic River, about two miles below St. John. The boys, who were from St. John, N. B. The dead: John Chambers, aged 20, and George Phillips, aged 15, of St. George; Guy Henry, aged 19, and his brother Gilbert, aged 12, of Cathlamet, near St. George. A fifth boy, Charles Chambers, was saved. The boys borrowed a sailboat and started out for a cruise down the river. They did not know much about handling a boat and were sailing among the main and gib sheets tied down. A sudden squall caught them unprepared and the boat was capsized, over, filling her with water. She righted again, but immediately sank, carrying four of the boys with her. The fifth boy, Charles Chambers, was the only one of them who could swim, and he reached the bank. The father of the boys saw the accident from the river bank, but was powerless to render assistance, as he had no boat and was in the vicinity. The bodies were recovered.

DEMANDS SATISFACTION

Russia Calls Turkey for Murder of the Consul at Monastir.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 10.—The Czar has demanded the exemplary punishment not only of the murderer of the Russian consul at Monastir (who was killed last week by Turkish gendarmes), but of all the military and civil officials in any way responsible for the crime.

DEADLY HOOK AND LADDER

Kills One Man and Seriously Injures Eight Others.

New York, Aug. 10.—One man dead, eight more with serious injuries in the hospitals, two of whom will probably die and a dozen others badly cut and bruised, is the work of havoc left in the wake of a hook and ladder as it zigzagged in West Fourth street Saturday afternoon on its way to a fire. George Gill, of 248 West Forty-ninth street, died in Roosevelt Hospital late in the afternoon as a result of his injuries, and Edward Scheu and Josepa Swerling, a boy of 10 years, are in a critical condition.

At Ninth avenue and Fortieth street, in attempting to avoid some hucksters' wares and the elevated pillar in the center of the street, the truck swerved to one side, its projecting ladders sweeping a crowd of men and boys on the sidewalk on the corner, hurrying them into a heap while the wheels and side of the truck struck several others, injuring them more or less seriously. Many of those less seriously injured were attended by surgeons and taken to their homes. Rose O'Connor, a girl of 10 years old, was quite seriously injured by being struck by the body of a heavy man, who was hurled ten feet. The man was only slightly hurt. Roger Moore and Sidney Gordon, were cut and bruised.

Was Hurt at the Falls

ROWLEY GIVEN TWELVE YEARS

Defaulting Ex-Manager Sentenced to Kingston Prison.

READS A WRITTEN STATEMENT

In Which He Tells of His Speculations and Embezzlements—He Was Visibly Affected.

[Special to The Advertiser.] St. Thomas, Aug. 10.—George A. Rowley, the defaulting ex-manager of the Elgin Loan Company, was this morning sentenced by Judge Ermattinger to twelve years in Kingston penitentiary for embezzlement. Before sentence was passed, Mr. Rowley read a written statement to the court in which he said his fall was due to a highly successful speculation some years ago. This had encouraged him to further operations on the stock market, for which purpose he had used the company's funds. These turning out disastrously he had taken still further sums in the hope of recouping losses and returning the money to the loan company. During the reading of the confession Rowley was visibly affected.
