TIBETAN TREACHERY

Officers Invited to a Parley Fired Upon From Ambush.

London, April 8.—A dispatch to the Times from Kalatzo, Tibet, dated Wednesday, reports that 200 Tibetans at the village of Samodra, in treacherously firing a volley at a party of British officers whom they invited to parley with them, aimed badly. No one was injured, but the action is supposed to indicate the tactics which the Tibetans intend to employ at Gungye.

The correspondent adds that reinforcements are arriving at Gungye to oppose the British advance.

HEADED THIS WAY

Men Who Robbed Flesheron Bank May Turn Up in London.

Toronto, Ont., April 8.—The burglary of Mitchell's private bank at Flesheron, which took place on Monday night or early Tuesday morning, was the work of two men, one of them apparently a machinist. The burglars got \$2,000 in cash. The next day the two men now suspected of the work stopped at a farmer near Orangeville, the farmer finding them hidden in his barn on the afternoon of the 5th. After obtaining food from the farmer the men set out towards the west, evidently making for London. Some of the things taken from the bank were afterwards found in the barn. The description of the two men says one is about 35 years, fair, with fair mustache, weight about 160 pounds, height 5 feet 9 inches; he wears a felt hat. The second, evidently the machinist, was 35 years old, sandy, with sandy mustache, weight about 170 pounds, height 5 feet 10 inches, wearing a black felt hat. The roads are impossible for a pursuit, but all the police in the district have been notified of the men's appearance.

EXPERTS VISIT KAISER.

Birmingham, April 8.—The Post says that two specialists made a thorough examination of the Kaiser's throat on board his yacht, the Hohenzollern, at Naples, on the 31st of March, and returned to Germany on the first of this month, taking with them specimens of the Emperor's saliva. The utmost importance is attached to the examination, the result of which has not yet been disclosed.

CONTROLLING THE TEMISKAMING RY.

Dr. Pyne Wanted It Run by Public for Ten Years.

AMENDMENT WAS VOTED DOWN

Some Objection Raised to Running of the Line by Way of New Liskeard.

Toronto, April 8.—The Legislature last night had a timely discussion on the question of the Government ownership of the Temiskaming Railway. The House went into committee on the bill to provide for the extension of the road from New Liskeard to some point northwards, a distance of about 9 miles, at a cost of \$2,000,000, and Dr. Pyne (East Toronto), precipitated the debate.

Dr. Pyne declared that if it were known that the Government was going to be owned and operated as a Government enterprise the lands would not go begging on the market as they had. He delivered a strong plea for public ownership, and called on Mr. Pettypiece to support him in that connection, as the latter gentleman had declared himself as being in favor of the principle, and could not change his views now.

Dr. Pyne then moved in amendment to the bill that the line be operated as a Government enterprise for at least ten years either by a commission or otherwise.

Premier Ross stated the Government did own the line, and expected to own it for all time to come. There was no proposition to sell it. The question of ownership was not involved, as the Government could not sell the line without the consent of the Legislature. He questioned the advantage of a Government-operated railway.

The Intercolonial Railway had been run at a loss, while all other railways had paid interest on their bonds, and some of them dividends to stockholders. The House would be stultifying itself by a change of policy from that agreed upon when the line was projected.

Mr. Whitney said that the Premier had not dealt with Dr. Pyne's amendment, and also added that the operation of a railroad was as much a part of the principle of public ownership as the owning of the road. He suggested, too, that the Government should own and operate the road for say ten years. Now was the time to experiment and endeavor to find out exactly what the advantages of public ownership were.

Mr. Powell entirely disapproved of the proposed extension of the line from New Liskeard to some unknown point. The line from North Bay to its present terminus should be completed and in running order before any further extensions are made.

Mr. Gibson said that he would much sooner see the line run by the Liskeard through the clay belt than from North Bay to New Liskeard.

Mr. Beatty (Leeds), favored the throwing open to competition of all the reserve land set apart for the railroad.

How E. J. Davis supported the measure as it stood.

Dr. Pyne's motion was defeated, and the House adjourned at 10:35 p.m.

ROBBER SHOTS TWO

A Wild West Episode in Streets of New York.

New York, April 7.—In an exciting chase of a highwayman, who had snatched a young woman's pocketbook at Thirty-fourth street and Second avenue today, two men were shot down in the street, one being probably fatally injured, and a large crowd that gathered, after the highwayman was captured, made a demonstration as if they would kill him. He later gave his name as John Kenny, 40 years old. Passengers on the rear platform of a street car witnessed the struggle that the young woman made to retain her purse, and when Kenny knocked the woman down near the car and tried to escape on a moving car, the crowd started in pursuit.

Joseph Corn, 26 years old, overtook Kenny and bore him to the ground. In the struggle Kenny fired two shots, one striking Corn in the arm and the other in the abdomen. Kenny then ran. E. B. Johnson, jun., of Woodside, L. I., next overtook Kenny and threw him. Kenny shot Johnson in the jaw and was disarmed by a policeman.

Several hundred people had gathered around the struggling man and cried loudly that he be lynched. Other policemen appeared and Kenny, who was bleeding from a blow on the head, was hurried to a police station.

A PLAGUE OF LOCUSTS

Usambara, in German East Africa, Is Devastated.

Berlin, April 8.—Swarms of locusts have devastated the valleys of Usambara, in German East Africa. They were first noticed coming from Wembo, Feb. 22. It is semi-officially stated that the most terrible snowstorm would not have broken down, and mulberry and banana trees have been stripped. Scarcely a green blade of leaf has been left in the forests or farms, except in the case of coffee plants, which the locusts tried but disliked.

EXTRADITION FOR BRIBERY

France Pressed to Give Decision on Request of United States.

Paris, April 8.—Foreign Minister Delcasse, at the request of the United States, has pressed a request of Justice Valle an early decision in the case of the request of the United States to make bribery grounds for extradition.

It is believed that the delay is due to the state department's desire to make the agreement retroactive, so as to cover bribery heretofore committed. The retroactive features probably will not be granted, but if they are, it is expected that they will have a sensational sequel in the apprehension of certain parties now sojourning in Europe who are suspected of having been connected with municipal bribery in a large American city.

STOPS PLURAL MARRIAGES

Head of Mormon Church Issues an Order Against Them.

Salt Lake City, April 8.—A notable feature of the closing session of the 74th annual conference of the Mormon Church was the official declaration by President Joseph F. Smith, on the subject of polygamy. He said: "Inasmuch as there are numerous reports in circulation that plural marriages have been entered into contrary to the official declaration of President Woodruff, of Sept. 26, 1890, commonly called the manifesto, which was adopted by the church at its general conference Oct. 6, 1890, and which forbids any marriage violation of the laws of the land, I, Joseph F. Smith, president of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints, hereby declare that no such marriages have been solemnized or the sanction, consent or knowledge of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints, and I hereby announce that all such marriages are prohibited, and if any officer or member of the church shall solemnize or enter into any such marriage he will be deemed in transgression against the church, and will be liable to go to jail, and will be excommunicated therefrom."

The church members unanimously adopted the following resolution introduced by Apostle Francis M. Lyman: "Resolved, that we, the members of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints, in general conference assembled, hereby approve and endorse the statement and declaration of President Joseph F. Smith, made at this conference concerning plural marriages, and will support the courts of the church in the enforcement thereof."

A committee was authorized to take steps toward the erection of a suitable building as a monument to the memory of Prophet Joseph Smith. There is at present not a single monument in honor of the founder of the church.

BURNED TO DEATH.

Toronto, April 8.—Frank Munro, a young man, son of the late George Munro, 8, was burned to death last night in a fire which destroyed the small shack in which he lived in Victoria Park.

KILLED IN BOXING CONTEST

Quebec, April 7.—A boxing contest between George Wagner, a soldier, and J. B. Drolet, resulted at 6:25 this morning in the death of the latter. Drolet was knocked down in the sixteenth round. He was unconscious the whole night, and died this morning without having recovered his senses. The body has been transferred to the morgue. A post-mortem examination will be held tomorrow and Coroner Jolicoeur will proceed to an inquest on Saturday morning. Drolet was 24 years old, married and the father of two children.

IT WAS A JOKE.

Montreal, April 8.—The case against H. B. Wilson, of Toronto, commercial traveler, and Edward J. Griffin, on a charge of attempting to set fire to the Queen's Hotel, was dismissed in the police court. They had tried to play a joke on a fellow-traveler. They rigged up a man in his room with electric lights shining through the dummy's eyes. Their friend failed to go to bed, and the light burned the clothing, causing smoke.

POPULATION OF THE U. S.

Washington, April 7.—The census bureau today issued a bulletin which gives the estimated population of the United States for 1903 exclusive of Alaska and the insular possessions of the United States as 79,900,389. This is an increase of 3,000,000 since the census of 1900. The estimates show: New York, 3,716,139; Chicago, 1,873,880.

Other estimates are: Philadelphia, 1,267,171; St. Louis, 1,045,000; and Boston has almost reached 600,000 mark; Baltimore has 521,213; Cleveland, 414,550; Cincinnati, 322,934; San Francisco, 355,919; Pittsburg, 345,947; Detroit, Milwaukee and New Orleans have just passed 300,000 and Washington is close to that figure. Considered states, New York leads in population with more than 7,500,000.

FOR NIAGARA POWER.

Stratford, April 8.—Stratford's city council has passed a bylaw authorizing the signing of an agreement whereby Toronto, London, Brantford, Stratford, Berlin, Ingersoll and Woodstock, raise \$15,000 for investigating the cost of transmitting Niagara power to these municipalities. These cities pay on the basis of assessment, Stratford's share being only \$342 at the most.

Toronto, April 7.—The operators' strike at the Great Northwestern Telegraph Company's office here has proved a dismal failure. The men have only been out two days, and already their places are supplied, and matters have again resumed their normal condition. There has been no delay or interruption to business.
