WAR CLOUD AGAIN HOVERS OVER EUROPE; KAISER REJECTS FRENCH NOTE RE MOROCCO

Disclaims All Idea of Conflict, But "Mailed Fist" Is Evident.

Berlin, June 27.—1:49 p.m.—The German answer to the French note on the subject of the proposed Moroccan conference was sent to Paris yesterday. A high official near Chancellor Von Buelow informs the Associated Press that the note, while perfectly amicable in form, insists upon a conference and also declines to comply with France's request that Germany outline beforehand the programme of the conference.

The chancellor takes the standpoint that the Moroccan question is an international affair, and that Germany having accepted the Sultan's invitation to a conference on the subject, cannot rightly agree with any single power as to what can be discussed at the conference. Germany insists that France must agree to the conference before any arrangements are made respecting the subject matter for discussion. After France has agreed to this, Germany is willing to listen to France's wishes.

The officials' attention being called to the warlike talk in the foreign press, he replied:

"The fact that we are urging a conference is clear proof that we have no wish for war with France. When a nation wants war it cannot ask for a conference at the same time. If we wanted war with France, we would have regretted M. Delcasse's fall, since he was the greatest obstacle to good relations with France. On the contrary, M. Delcasse's removal and Premier Rouvier's decision to retain the foreign portfolio, gave great satisfaction in German official circles, because we saw in these steps a guarantee of improved relations."

What Will France Do?

Paris, June 27.—3:05 p.m.—The council of ministers today considered the status of the Franco-German negotiations. Premier Rouvier announced that he expected to have a conference later with Prince Von Buelow, the German ambassador, who would deliver the German reply to the French note on the subject of Morocco. Pending the receipt of this, the official says the situation remains stationary, as the final outcome depends on the text of the German note. In the meantime, the officials here consider that the situation has been considerably relieved in view of intimations they have received from the French ambassador at Berlin, concerning the general purport of the German position.

Want Their Mileage.

Windsor, June 27.—When the entire grand jury visited the House of Refuge at Leamington a month ago, after being warned by the county council that mileage would not be allowed, as there is already enough supervision of the institution, County Crown Attorney Reid referred the matter to the Attorney-General. The latter believes that the grand jury had a right to visit the house of refuge, but declines to express an opinion as to the legality of the refusal of the county to pay mileage. The foreman of the jury intimates that the members will take action in the county court to collect mileage.

Yaquis On the Warpath; Massacre Many Whites

San Francisco, Cal., June 27.—A dispatch to the Chronicle from Tucson, Ariz., says:
At least twelve ranchers and several women and children have met death at the hands of a band of 100 Yaqui Indians, who have been raiding the country along the San Miguel River in the Ures district of Sonora, Mexico, and a party composed largely of American mining men has gone from Pozo-Station to rescue the unfortunates who are in danger of being massacred.
Dr. Frank J. Toussant, who has returned from Ures, brought the news of the trouble, which began last Friday. After several families had been

murdered by the Indians, the ranchers made a determined stand at Buenos Ayres ranch, where, aided by about 30 employees, they succeeded in repulsing the Indians, although Jesus Ortolano, proprietor of the place, his brother Francisco, Luis Carranza, proprietor of an adjoining ranch, and several other neighbors, died from wounds received in the fight. It is thought that fully 20 Indians were killed, although the number can only be estimated, as the savages carried off the dead and wounded when they retired. Five Yaquis captured near Lachumata, and thought to have taken part in the massacres, were immediately hanged.

RUN OFF IN MOUNTAINS

Rockslide Causes Bad Wreck On Crows Nest Pass Railway.

Frank, N. W. T., June 27.—An accident occurred on the Crows Nest Pass Railway yesterday, three miles west of Bellevue, caused by a rockslide. The engine and tender fell, but was not much hurt. The fireman was buried in the debris and was taken out alive, but badly scalded. None of the passengers were injured.

What Winnipeg's Worth.

Winnipeg, Man., June 27.—City estimates, as submitted to the council, last night, aggregate \$1,443,357.32, as compared with \$1,010,831.71 for 1904. The total assessment is \$62,727,630, of which amount \$52,786,970 is realty.

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WILL ARRANGE INDIAN TREATY

Building of G. T. Pacific Necessitates Understanding With Aborigines.

Ottawa, June 27.—S. D. Scott, accountant, and Samuel Stewart, of the Indian department, have been appointed by order-in-council to negotiate a treaty with the Indians north of Lake Huron and lying between the Point of Land and James Bay. They leave tomorrow to begin work. This treaty is necessary on account of the early construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the opening up of the country. Ontario will be a party to the treaty. Mr. Matheson, the Provincial Secretary, is expected here today or tomorrow to close the arrangements. The Ontario Government will be represented by a commissioner and the Hudson Bay Company will furnish the transport. The treaty will embrace all the unsundered territory in Northern Ontario.

MAY SEND FOR RAINFORD

Canterbury May Elevate New York Divine to English Bishopric.

London, June 26.—Big honors are reported to be in store for Dr. Wm. S. Rainford.
The Archbishop of Canterbury is said to be contemplating the elevation of that divine to a bishopric, and has already written him in the hope of inducing him to deliver addresses in the larger churches in England, including Westminster Abbey, on the institution of the archbishop.
The archbishop's action is unprecedented, it being the first time in the history of the country that so high an honor has been offered to a member of the American Church.
Dr. Rainford is said to have discussed the advisability of accepting the offer with J. P. Morgan, by whom he was originally persuaded to go to New York. St. George's Church, New York, does not wish to lose the services of Dr. Rainford.

VOTE ON ARMY SCANDAL

British Commons Engages in Debate On Stores Theft.

London, June 26.—The House of Commons tonight defeated the Opposition's motion of censure on the Government in connection with the army stores scandal in the South African war by a vote of 239 to 55 after a long debate.
The Government acted mainly on the defensive, disclaiming responsibility, and rather laying blame on Lieut.-Gen. Sir W. Francis Butler, chairman of the war office committee, for the publication of the report on this matter, issued June 14. In the course of the debate Premier Balfour, Secretary for War Arnold-Forster and Indian Secretary Brodrick (former war secretary) underwent a fierce cross-examination, which they adroitly sustained.

Ontario Wouldn't Sell.

Toronto, June 27.—The Provincial Government has refused to grant the application of a number of Toronto, Hamilton and Roussau sportsmen, who desired to purchase 2,800 acres of land in Cardwell Township, Muskoka, to be held as an exclusive game preserve.

THE ALIEN LABOR ACT CASE TO BE APPEALED BY THE GOVT.

Ottawa, June 26.—This evening Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick, in reply to Mr. Ralph Smith, said that the Government do not concur in the judgment of Mr. Justice Anglin, declaring the alien labor law to be ultra vires, and added that it was the intention of the Government to make application to the Privy Council for leave to appeal.

THIS RED MAN IS WANTED IN ELGIN

Walden Delany, in Jail Here, Alleged to Have Committed Burglary at Lawrence.

County Constable Robert Miller, of Southwold, is in the city today, with a warrant for the arrest of Walden Delany, the young Indian who is incarcerated in the county jail here.
Delany is charged by the Elgin authorities with burglarizing L. H. Weidon's store at Lawrence station, from which a sum of money and a considerable quantity of goods were taken. Some of these were disposed of by the Indian, it is alleged, to the storekeeper at Muncy, but they have been identified by Mr. Weidon as his property.
It is alleged that the Indian is held here on a charge of bringing stolen goods into the county and the Elgin authorities are desirous of trying him in St. Thomas on the more serious charge of burglary.
Crown Attorney McKillop has the case under advisement, and it is not known yet what disposition will be made of it.

ARRESTED CIRCUS MEN

Four of the Alleged Assaulters Now in Quebec City Jail.

Quebec, June 26.—The twenty-three Royal Canadian Garrison artillerymen, under command of Capt. Thacker, and twelve members of the provincial police, who left Quebec yesterday afternoon, to arrest the desperadoes of the Lemon Brothers' circus, who brutally assaulted a girl and shot the Indian, Robertson, at Roberval, Me., also shot a young white man, named J. Corwell, who gave Toronto as his home, and D. Allsweil, of Chicago. These prisoners were captured with the circus at Grand Mere and positively identified as the guilty parties by a number of witnesses brought from Roberval. At first twenty-three arrests were made at Grand Mere, but the other nineteen were discharged for lack of sufficient proof to hold them. The prisoners, on arrival in the city, were conveyed to the district jail.

To Rebuild the Lincoln.

Sandwich, Ont., June 27.—Capt. Doty, of Goderich, has purchased the hull of the steamer Lincoln, which was burned at her dock here two months ago. The Lincoln will be rebuilt at Goderich, and the Capt. Stockwell, of Leamington, her former mate, will purchase her when repairs are completed, and put her on the Pelee Island route.

Blinder Twice Cheaper.

Kingston, June 27.—Owing to a reduction in the price of hemp and a very lucrative purchase made by the Government for the order (twine) factory, the Kingston Penitentiary, it has been decided to cut the price of warranted pure manila binder twine by three-quarters of a cent. The new price will be 15¢.

"No Canucks Need Apply."

London, June 26.—"No Canadian-bred required," "English-bred preferred," "No Canadian need apply," is written on the sign posted by Mr. Baker, a Canadian, is opposing Chinese in the Liberal Imperial party. "And this from the people so anxious to consolidate the empire," adds a radical journal.

SHARP DEBATE IN THE COMMONS

Mr. Foster's Charges in Connection With MacLeod Land Office Discussed.

Ottawa, June 26.—The greater portion of the time of the House was taken up in discussion of the question brought in by Mr. Foster, who charged the former sub-land agent at MacLeod with the theft of money of the Dominion. The Minister of the Interior protected vigorously against the unfair nature of Mr. Foster's attack, and the Premier expressed confidence that in his cooler moments, on fuller consideration of the circumstances, he would come to the conclusion that he had been premature in alleging that the money was stolen. The charge of personal responsibility, and the shortage found in the account, as the evidence showed, was attributable to a son of the agent, to whom the business of the office had been necessarily deputed during his absence upon an official duty.

Before the orders of the day were called, Mr. Foster directed the attention of the House to the report of the Interior, which was not very thorough, and, next, that the Minister of the Interior should have displayed more energy in tracing up the wrongdoers, and that he had information, which he believed to be reliable, that the son was never farther away than Frank, and that he only remained there four or six months, and the rest of the time had been in town. COSSACKS HERD STRIKERS AND VOLLEY INTO CROWD

Thousands of Revolutionists Thrown Into Prison—Bloody Battles of Barricades.

Warsaw, June 27.—All the prisons are full to overflowing, no less than 672 persons, mostly Jews, having been arrested during the past 24 hours. It is expected that a state of siege will be proclaimed, as great riots are anticipated during the mobilization. The laborers on 32 best root plantations in the Government of Podolia have struck, and it is feared the harvest will be lost.
The peasants in the Government of Kovno are forcibly occupying pasture and other lands of the proprietors of estates.

Soldiers In Revolt.

Lodz, Russian Poland, June 26.—Since the proclamation of martial law the situation has become somewhat quieter. The rumor of an approaching massacre of Jews has caused 20,000 Jews to leave the town.
Scattered cases of rioting as a result of the insurrectionary spirit continue. One of these occurred today in the Protestant Cemetery, when a patrol was fired on from behind a wall. The patrol charged and killed twelve persons, five men, four women and three children.
A case of disaffection among the troops was reported today, when the officers of one regiment informed their commander that they would refuse to fire on defenseless people.
The regiment was at once transferred to another place.

The Caucasus Aflame.

St. Petersburg, June 26.—The red flag of revolt has been raised at Warsaw, Kovno and many other places in Russian Poland out of sympathy with the victims of the rioting at Lodz, and so far as these cities are concerned, the situation almost approaches the dignity of open rebellion. The news received in St. Petersburg is meager on account of the rigorous censorship, but it is evident that the troops are being resisted, and a reputation of the sanguinary encounters at Lodz is anticipated. The three big socialist parties in Russian Poland are well organized and have some arms, but the authorities claim they have no chance of success single-handed.

Rioters Kill Workmen.

Warsaw, June 26.—Disorderly crowds have thronged the streets since early morning. They erected barricades at Ogrodzka, Krochmalna and Wronia streets, on top of which they placed red flags.

The police stormed these barricades, and ten persons were wounded by bullets or bayonets. Another affray occurred at Zelazna street, where Cossacks charged the crowd and wounded three persons.

Tool Company Will Not Move

Secured Site East of City for Factory and Will Build at Once.

The London Machine Tool Company has decided to remain in London. A member of the firm today informed The Advertiser that the company has secured a splendid site of seventeen and a half acres just east of the city limits, and lying between the Grand Trunk Railway tracks and Trafalgar streets.

The firm will at once erect a large and up-to-date factory, so that the Dymont-Baker Company may be given possession of the present factory on Bathurst street.

German M. P. Goes to Jail

Berlin, June 27.—Herr Kunert, a Social Democrat member of the Reichstag, was sentenced at Halle today to three months' imprisonment for insulting members of the German expedition sent to China in 1900 by saying in a campaign speech, "Our soldiers in that desolated land plundered and abused women."

A number of former soldiers of the expedition were examined and gave a corroborative testimony in great detail.

Graveyard Dead.

Chicago, June 27.—Graeme Stewart, prominent in Chicago's commercial, political and social life, two years ago a candidate for mayor (the Republican ticket), and a member of the executive committee of the Republican national committee, from 1901 to 1904, died at his residence here early today after a month's illness. Clotting of blood on the brain and a series of apoplectic strokes was the cause of his death. He was 62 years old.

GRANTED REDUCED RATE

Old Boys in New England Secure Concession From Railways.

The London Old Boys in the New England States who intend coming to London for the reunion will be interested in the announcement that the railways in the New England Passenger Association have agreed to grant a rate of a fare and a third, on the certificate plan, for the big gathering. 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CONTRACTOR HAS HIS OWN TROUBLES

Thieves Steal Tools and Teamsters Destroy Work On Permanent Roadway.

So multitudinous have his troubles grown of late that Contractor Harry Craig's hair is threatening to become a snowy white. Mr. Craig is putting down the vitrified brick pavement on King street, between Ridout and Wellington.

For some weeks scarcely a night has gone by that the men employed on the works have not been robbed of their tools, and so far the police have been unable to locate the thieves. Last night another tool chest was broken into, and several shovels, picks, saws and other tools were stolen. Thus Mr. Craig "thinks things" as he counts what he has lost in the way of tools on the job this far.

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But tool thieves are not Mr. Craig's only troubles. For some reason or other many appear to have taken an interest in his work, and a street cannot be closed for a few days so that a pavement may be laid.
