CITY IS DOOMED WIRES FUNSTON

Once Beautiful San Francisco Soon an Ash Heap.

300,000 FOODLESS, HOMELESS

Reports from Many Other Points Tell of Widespread Disaster.

Washington, D. C., April 19.—The war department has received the following from General Funston: "Fire crossed Van Ness avenue to the west at 3:30 p.m. Almost certain now that the entire city will be destroyed. Have ordered troops from Monterey and everywhere is going as well as could be expected. On account of the confusion it has been impossible to locate individuals inquired for, but attention will be given that matter as soon as practical."

San Francisco, April 19 (via Oakland).—The magnitude of the calamity that has befallen San Francisco has become apparent today. Looking eastward from the heights in the central portion of the city everything attached to earth has been wrought by earthquake and flame.

In several sections the fire still raged with unabated vigor. The people seemingly are half-lazy by the disaster. The pestilence of famine already is presenting itself. At best, the city never carried more than three days' supplies of provisions, and now, with the wholesale districts and warehouses wiped out, there is a shortage of food.

Prices today were in most instances more than doubling. Merchants were stationed at retail shops and permitted only a small portion of goods to be delivered to each purchaser. Reports were received that numerous men, caught in the act of looting, had been shot. The military is unusually strict in the enforcement of the order to shoot all looters.

On miles of streets the front walls of ruined buildings still stand, swaying with the concussion of distant dynamite explosions, and there is frequently a crash of brick and stone, followed by a cloud of dust, giving warning to pedestrians of the unsafety of travel.
