what general staffs are for. So far as Japan's alleged desire to go to war with the United States is concerned, there isn't a clear mind in the administration that does not scout the idea. Japan cannot go to war with anybody. She is in debt a billion dollars, with no place to borrow more.

The idea that England would assist Japan in an assault upon this country would be an argument on the Atlantic look at the facts as they are, going further in the argument, concede the bottling up. Then they point out that the United States is the only country in the world sufficient to itself, and if England tried the experiment of bottling up this country she would cut herself off from a very large proportior of her own food supplies.

So far as Japan herself is concerned she does not want to fight with any-He was not seen for some days after- body. Her public debt is almost, if The greatest problem Japan has now In the pockets of the dead man's clothes is, not to conquer any country, but to panese population, which increase is 500,000 a year.

Furthermore, the proposition of Japan bringing an invading force of a size to do any particular damage 7,000 miles has its grotesque features that apparently do not appeal to the people who are continually finding war clouds over Nippon way.

The men who look at this proposition sanely admit that Japan might seize a port on Alaska or on the Pacific coast,
