

BLACK HAND HEADS RUN TO EARTH

The Headquarters of Murderous Society Located in Ohio.

WHOLESALE BLACKMAIL

Police Secure Evidence That Indicates Close Connection With the Mafia.

Cincinnati, Ohio, June 9.—Operations in nearly every large city in the United States and the investigations of the secret service will be laid bare when the Black Hand gang, which was rounded up on Tuesday in Columbus and Marion, Ohio, by postoffice inspectors of Cincinnati, are placed on trial. Inspector-in-Charge Hollister, today that the evidence gathered by the inspectors and by detectives and the police of several cities, working in conjunction with the postoffice inspectors, was voluminous and that there could be no doubt that the crimes of blackmail, extortion and threatened and consummated murder would be placed upon the guilty men.

In addition to the arrest of four Sicilians in Marion, Columbus and Denison on Tuesday, Joe Beletta and Sam Rizzo were taken into custody in Marion last night. Those arrested earlier in the day were Sam Liska, said to be the ringleader of the gang in the United States, and two brothers in Marion, Antonio Marisil, in Denison, and Tony Bicherloff, in Columbus.

The inspectors state they have evidence showing that the headquarters of a little fruit store in Marion, conducted by the Rizzos, was the headquarters of the society in this country, and that they found in a safe there letters which throw light on many successful attempts to extort money from wealthy Italians in Ohio, New York, Pennsylvania and other states.

They show, the officers assert, that hundreds of businessmen have been paying tribute to the Black Hand to secure immunity from death or torture at the hands of members of the society. The names of many active members of the Black Hand, together with the names of hundreds of their victims are in possession of the officers. The New York police officers, who have been carrying on the detective work started by Joseph Petrusino, who was killed in Sicily, have been working on the theory that there is no extensive organization, but that the operations have been conducted by individuals in different cities who have no connection with each other. But the work of the Cincinnati officers tends to show the Black Hand a national organization in the United States, but that it is directly allied with a similar organization in Italy, and is working in conjunction with the Mafia.

CONGREGATIONAL UNION

Third Annual Gathering Now in Session at Toronto.

Toronto, June 9.—The third annual meeting of the Congregational Union of Canada commenced here this morning, with Rev. Hugh Pedley, of Montreal, in the chair. Rev. A. Margat, of Olivet Church, Toronto, himself an Englishman, in commenting upon the report of the immigration department of the union, spoke scathingly of the class of Jewish immigrants now coming into the country. They were said to be the cream of immigrants, but if this was the case he wondered what the rest must be like. The executive committee of the union proposes a new missionary policy, which, briefly, is the opening of new churches in Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa and other centers, further steps for extending the work of looking after newcomers to Canada, and the development of work in the west.

BRASS BAND FOR ASSELIN

Given a Noisy Reception Upon Return From Quebec Jail.

Montreal, June 9.—Olivier Asselin, the newspaperman who returned today from Quebec where he had served a sentence of fifteen days for striking the Hon. Mr. Taschereau, was met at the station by a brass band and a large crowd of admirers. Responding to the reception he made an attack on the Quebec government from the Premier down and hinted at collisions between Government officials and the bench.

CUTS HER THROAT WHILE DESPONDENT

Berlin, June 9.—While despondent Mrs. Lantz, the wife of Peter Lantz, committed suicide tonight by cutting her throat with a razor.

When found she was lying on the floor face downwards, and she evidently only lived for a few minutes, as she had lost considerable blood. The family, which consists of husband and four children, formerly lived in Hesper, but have lived here for four years. Mr. Lantz has just returned from work, when to his great surprise he found his dead wife. Coroner Dr. Honsberger was immediately sent for and found life extinct.

PICKPOCKET SENTENCED

Toronto, June 9.—William Hutton, alias Slater, a professional Detroit pickpocket arrested here during the Woodbine races for stealing a gold watch and chain from a man in the crowds, was this morning convicted in the police court and sentenced to six months in the Central Prison.

When arrested, almost in the act, Hutton thrust the watch into another man's pocket, but was detected. He has nine previous convictions in the States.

WEST MIDDLESEX WANTS A TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL

Request Was Laid Before the County Council Yesterday by Middlesex Men.

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There is as yet no settlement between the county and the hospital trust in the matter of the maintenance of county patients at Victoria Hospital. As was pointed out in yesterday's Advertiser, the decision of the county judge is to be obtained to end the dispute.

The special committee appointed by the county council to consider into the matter of dispute between the two brought in their report yesterday as follows: "Your committee beg to report that they met a committee of the Victoria Hospital trust, and failed to arrive at an agreement as to the matter in dispute."

The committee of the hospital trust proposed that the matters in dispute be referred to the county and city solicitors, and in case they fail to arrive at an agreement, that the same be referred to the county judge for decision.

Refer It to Solicitor.

"Your committee recommend that the matter be referred to the county solicitor for settlement, and in case they fail to agree that it be referred to the senior county judge for decision, and that statements by each party, showing their respective modes of computing the amount due by the county, together with the original document relating thereto, be left with the judge, so that he may be requested to give a decision as to the matters in dispute without hearing arguments by either party."

The report of Victoria Hospital amounting to \$1,886, was received, and referred to the finance committee. The county engineer presented the report of cost of cleaning the court house and county buildings, along with \$475 of unpaid account of last year. This amounted to \$20 70. The account was referred to the jail committee.

Bridge Wanted.

A deputation from Brook Township presented a petition for assistance in the building of a bridge over Bear Creek, was heard, and the request referred to the board of road inspectors. The board, the night watchman at the jail, requested that he be given keys to the jail. He had been given them when first he undertook the work, but later they had been taken from him and no reasons given. Mr. Graham does not like to be locked up like a prisoner without the possibility of escape in case of fire. His request was referred to the jail committee.

Councillors J. W. McGregor and D. S. Campbell were appointed a committee to make inquiry into and effect arrangements to have Miss Cotes removed from the hospital to the House of Refuge, and see that suitable arrangements be made for her case. This motion was carried.

Mr. W. C. Coo, the court reporter, asked for a guarantee of \$300 to insure himself against loss in attending to the county's work. His request was referred to the finance committee.

Hospital Trustees P. H. Turnbull was empowered to investigate the cases of all emergency county patients, and if satisfied that they come under the head of county pauper patients, that they should be taken into the hospital.

Proposed Tuberculosis Hospital.

Drs. Hyttenrauch, Walker and Dougal, representing the West Middlesex Medical Association, presented the needs of indigent tuberculosis patients in the county. Dr. Dougal stated that inquiries had shown there were five or six such patients who could pay nothing, and several who could only pay part. After outlining the needs of this work as a preventive measure the medical gentleman spoke of the absolute necessity for something being done. The maintaining of a hospital by the council alone would be immensely expensive, and the medical practitioners strongly commended the project of the London Health Association, and urged the council to take what action they could to combat the disease.

The matter was finally referred to the finance committee for consideration.

The council then adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

TURKEY BELLIGERENT

Tells Powers Crete Must Return to the Crescent Flag.

Paris, June 9.—The Cretan situation is still causing considerable disquiet in Europe. The five protecting powers, Great Britain, France, Russia and Italy, have decided to keep their engagement to evacuate the island on July 31.

Turkey has served notice that after this date, the island, while preserving its autonomous regime, must return to the Turkish flag and she is prepared to go to war on this issue.

Greece, on the contrary, thinks that annexation to her should follow the evacuation by the powers, but the efforts of the King of Greece to secure the support of the powers to this idea have up to the present time been fruitless. It is understood that Germany is strongly with Turkey in the matter.

GRANTON FARMER KILLED IN RUNAWAY

St. Marys, June 10.—A farmer named Thomas Ringney, residing in Granton Township, died from injuries received in an accident Tuesday.

The horses, attached to a roller which he was driving ran away, and the unfortunate man was thrown beneath the roller and fatally crushed. He was 73 years of age, and leaves a widow and grownup family.

SOO CANAL LOCK RAMMED BY BOAT

Canadian Lock Put Out of Business by Big Freighter.

MAY CLOSE FOR SEASON

All Shipping Between the Great Lakes To Be Sent Through on the American Side.

Canadian Soo, June 9.—While the steamers Assinibola and Crescent City were locking down here today at 1 o'clock, the south gate of the lock was rammed by the freighter Perry G. Walker from the lower level, and for the first time in history the Canadian lock is a wreck.

Tonight the whole of Lake Superior is rushing through the canal at express train rate. That the steamers escaped at all, and that the freighter Perry Walker, the cause of the accident, was not swamped and carried down the river, is wonderful.

As it is, gushing torrents of water continue to rush unobstructed through the wrecked Canadian ship canal, while the three boats which figured in the sensational wreck are still lying on the American side of the river undergoing temporary repairs. Thousands of persons visited the scene of the accident tonight.

Strenuous efforts are being made to shut off the water, but it is now said it will take at least two days. It is believed that the lock will be out of commission the rest of the season. The accident will not tie up traffic between the upper and lower lakes. It will, however, necessitate the use of the American lock by all steamers, and therefore result in considerable delay. The Sault Ste. Marie Canal is one and a half miles long, and the lock broken is 900 feet long and 60 feet wide, with 20 feet 2 inches of water on the hill. It has cost more than \$4,000,000.

LOBO SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION MEETING

Eighteenth Annual Gathering—Encouraging Reports—Helpful Discussions.

The eighteenth annual convention of Lobo Township Sunday School Association was held in the Presbyterian Church, East Williams, on the 1st inst. Rev. Mr. Jewett, resident pastor, conducted the opening exercises. The president, Mr. D. A. Stewart, gave a fitting address of welcome, encouragement and inspiration.

The report of the secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Ella Zavitz, upon whose executive ability and energy depends largely the success of the association, was a fine resume of the spirit and inspiration of last year's notable convention. It showed the finances to be in a good state which indicates a flourishing condition in other respects.

The visitor of schools, although deficient as regards statistics, gave a very encouraging condition of the Sabbath school work in the district, and urged all to be faithful in this, one of the most glorious works they could be engaged in.

The subject of "Teacher Training" was presented by Rev. Mr. Fowler, a practical man, a natural teacher, trained in the profession, and deeply interested in the work at present. He emphasized the growing importance of the Sunday school work and advocated the formation of a teacher's training class in every church in view of increasing efficiency. The right kind of a teacher should have several qualifications; he should be a student—a student of the Bible. He should be teachable himself and sympathetic.

Mr. Fowler spoke of how to succeed in the formation of a class, and gave a comprehensive outline of a course of training. He thought the class should be open to all who are old enough to enter, and should be based on a liberal and strictly Biblical basis. It is a Bible training class the teacher should be confined to just what the Bible says. Doctrinal distinctions and theological theories should have no place in teacher training classes.

Discussion of the subject was carried on by several others. D. D. Campbell thought that the teacher should be a good moral man, a Christian, and should use tact. S. P. Brown thought that the teacher should be a spiritually-minded man, and should teach in the spirit in which the Bible was written.

Rev. McEwen counselled the teacher to look to God, who gives wisdom, power and all things. Loftus Cuddy referred to three very excellent books in use in the Presbyterian Church, viz., "The Bible in the Home," "Sunday School Methods," and "One to Twenty-One," the last a psychological treatise on child life. He thought the society should be used to advantage to keep the class together.

Excellent music was rendered by the local choir, to whom the convention felt very grateful.

Between the two sessions lunch was served. As rain threatened the Foresters' Hall nearby was used for this function. The tastefully arranged tables stood for a lot of work by a faithful, self-denying band of local young women and young men.

Evening Session.

The evening session was opened by devotional exercises led by Rev. McEwen. The nominating committee reported Mr. Peter Mitchell, president of the Lobo and East Williams, in all of which the convention united.

The address of the evening was made by Rev. Mr. Karmawin on "The Place of the Sabbath School in Our National Life." He said: "We, as Sunday school teachers, are engaged in the great work of nation building. The fate of Canada depends upon the kind of work you and I will do during the coming days. Let us endeavor to feel our responsibilities. Time was when our country was a collection of warring tribes. The absolutism remains, only the personnel of the ruler is changed. You and I belong to the royal family today. The royal family was educated at the state's expense. It was highly educated. So it should be today in all lines—not only the intellect, but the will and the conscience. The individual should be educated in the ability to distinguish between right and wrong, and in the power to choose the right. This culture so often entirely wanting in the Canoe, we must look to the Sabbath school to supply. It can be supplied best through the study of the Bible. The Greeks gave us philosophy; the Romans, law; the Italians, art; the Germans, liberty; the Hebrews gave us religion. In the Hebrew religion the highest type of manhood is revealed in the words of our deepest study, worthy of our closest imitation. Not in its natural resources depends the greatness of a nation, but in the Christ-like type of its humanity. Make the rising generation pure and noble. Let a Christian civilization be the aim of each individual who is growing up around us, and God himself will take care of our nation. A round-table was ably conducted by Rev. Mr. Avo in which many pertinent questions were answered and many live subjects were discussed, to the edification of all present."

Big Berlin Plant Prey to Flames

Berlin, June 9.—The button works of the J. Y. Shantz & Co., situated on Water street, was destroyed by fire tonight.

The fire is supposed to have started in the dry kiln on the first floor. When discovered it had gained such headway that it was found impossible to get it under control, although four streams of water were soon playing on the fire. Also a wait was necessary for direct pressure from the pumping station. The brigade realizing that the fire was beyond control, turned its attention to the adjoining residences and the Christ Science Church.

The insurance carried on the button works was about \$30,000. About \$50,000 will probably cover the loss on the other buildings.

The Shantz firm is one of the oldest established in Berlin, being organized about 1866, but they had occupied their present building only sixteen years. The firm had 150 employees, who will be thrown out of work. It is likely they will rebuild. The loss is placed in the vicinity of \$100,000.

Executions Start Fresh Massacre

Berlin, June 9.—The Tagblatt's Turkish authorities last week executed twelve of the ringleaders, including six Armenians, concerned in the Adana massacres.

The executive course of the Government, the correspondent adds, caused the populace in the region between Alexandretta and the mountains to start a new massacre, in which about a million deaths were slain.

The Young Turks' committee did everything possible to prevent disorders. They are in need of reinforcements, however, which as yet have not arrived. The situation is growing more anxiety, the agitators denouncing the Sultan as an infidel who has sold himself.

building was all on fire before the brigade could reach the scene. Every thing was dry, but fortunately the wind was light. BATTLE IN PRISON.

Montreal, June 9.—A desperate fight occurred at St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary last Saturday between a Polish convict named Stanislas Avo, who attacked the guards with an axe.
