HEAT WAVE AT NEW YORK

Many Prostrations Are Being Recorded Today.

New York, June 26.—New York and its vicinity sweated again today under the rays of a burning sun, which were nearly as effective in raising the mercury as those which yesterday caused the tube to register record figures for the year. There was less suffering, however, than on previous days during the prolonged torrid spell, the electric storm of the early night having clarified the atmosphere appreciably. Nevertheless, numerous heat prostration cases began calling for attention at the hospitals.

The heat is believed to have been responsible for the suicide of one man, and another attempt on his own life during the morning.

MILLIONAIRE DROWNS

Chicago Capitalist Loses His Life in Michigan Lake.

Detroit, June 26.—A special from Muskegon, Mich., says: Alex. Bromberg, a millionaire of Chicago, was drowned in White Lake, near here, this afternoon, under circumstances which for the present are shrouded in mystery.

A companion who was in the boat with Bromberg, claims the unfortunate man mislaid an oar stroke, and losing his balance fell overboard. It is known, however, that Bromberg was a good swimmer and the police stoutly deny the idea of an accident explained in this way. The boat was less than fifty yards from shore when Bromberg went overboard, disappearing in twenty feet of water.

The body has not yet been found, although a flotilla of launches is dragging for it. Bromberg was fifty years of age, and owner of the Chicago Heights baseball club grounds. He was a millionaire many times over.
