Before the fire was started, the negro's head was cut off and placed on one end of a pole which was stuck in the ground. The heart was taken out, cut in small pieces and passed among the men as souvenirs. The vehicle runs in a circle an eighth of a mile in circumference at a speed of 25 miles an hour, with 80-horsepower, without the slightest tendency to leave the rail. Two gyroscopes, weighing three-quarters of a ton each, automatiearly supply perfect stability. The rail closely resembles the ordinary one exot that the top is somewhat curved and the rims of the wheels correspond to this curve. The gyroscopes make 3,000 revolutions a minute. The motive power is entirely self contained in a petrol engine which is used to drive the engine dynam**o**




