FAMOUS AIRWOMAN FATALLY INJURED

Height of Fifty Metres.

BODY TERRIBLY MANGLED

Was First French Woman Aeroplanist and Had Splendid Record.

Betheny Plains, Rheims, July 8.-Baroness Delaroche, the first French woman aeroplanist, was fatally injured here this afternoon by falling from a height of fifty metres.

The Baroness Delaroche had flown around the field once at a height of 80 meters, when suddenly to the applauding tribunes, she appeared to become frightened and confused at the approach of two other aeroplanes. She started to descend, but while still fifty meters from the ground lost control of the machine. The aeroplane turned over and fell like a log. The baroness legs and arms were broken. Her mangled body was removed from the wreckage and conveyed to the hospital, where she is dying. At the hospital it was found that her skull was fractured. This is the second fatal accident at this meeting, Wachter having been killed last Friday.

In Accident Before.
