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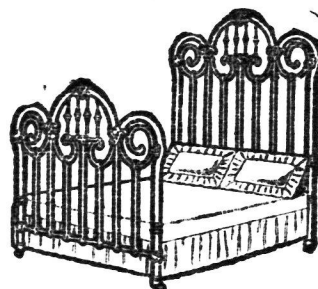

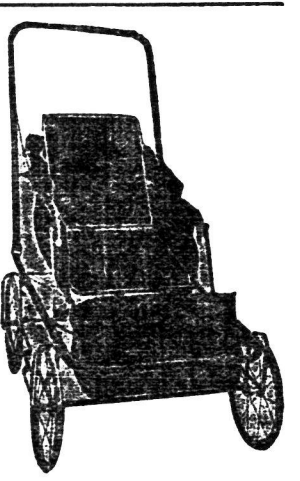

NEW YORK HARBOR HARD HIT BY STRIKE OF TOWBOAT MEN

Large Quantities of Perishable Freight Tied Up and Liners Unable to Secure Their Cargoes May Be Greatly Delayed.

[By Associated Press.]

New York, April 1.—New York harbor activity was considerably diminished in volume today. At midnight last night a strike of the pilots and masters on the tow boats of four railroads was declared, and today the boats of the companies involved were rapidly going out of commission. Many hundreds of men are affected. There are fears that quantities of valuable perishable freight will be tied up, and reports were prevalent that the strike might spread to other classes of employees in the harbor service.

FRANK GIBSON CHARGED DEFRAUDING LIVERYMAN

Remanded By Mayor Beattie Until April 15 for Trial—Other Cases in Court.

Frank Gibson, a young man charged with obtaining a livery outfit through fraud from J. C. Carmichael's stables, was remanded until April 15 by Mayor Beattie at the police court this morning. He was also charged with being drunk, and will appear on both charges at his next trial.

It is claimed that Gibson telephoned the livery and asked for a rig in another man's name, directing that the outfit be sent out to him.

Charles Heir was found guilty of providing a minor with cigarettes, and was fined a dollar. He paid as the option of ten days in Castle Carter did not appeal.

William Mahon said he did not think his auto was running faster than the law when a policeman saw him, but was assessed \$5. He paid.

The case against John Lightfoot, a second-hand man of Dundas street east, charged with auctioneering without a license, was adjourned until April 15. In the meantime his rights will be investigated.

CASES AGAINST STREET RAILWAY WERE SETTLED

Actions of Antonio Cusolito and W. A. Bluethner Will Not Come to Trial.

At the afternoon session of the spring assizes yesterday, it was announced that the actions brought by Antonio Cusolito for \$2,000 damages against the London Street Railway Company, and by Waldemar A. Bluethner against the London Street Railway Company for \$3,000 damages, had been settled.

Mr. Cusolito was claiming damages on the ground that when on Sept. 15 of last year, he was wheeling on Dundas street between Wellington and Clarence, he was struck by a street car and knocked down, with the result that one of the toes on his right foot was amputated, and another toe badly crushed.

J. C. Judd, K.C., represented the plaintiff, and C. H. Ivey, the London Street Railway Company.

Mr. W. A. Bluethner sued the railway for injuries sustained by falling from a car. The claim set forth that Mr. Bluethner got on a car at the corner of William and Dundas streets, and it started unexpectedly, throwing him heavily to the pavement. He alleged that the accident was due to the negligence of the motorman, Gibbons & Co., represented the plaintiff, and C. H. Ivey the London Street Railway Company.

At this juncture Inspector Waugh, of Whitley, asked permission to speak. "I had the honor of helping in the prosecution of education as a member of the committee," he said, "and say that the statement in the resolution is untrue, and maliciously untrue. Every recommendation made by the committee was given attention to. It is absurd to pass a resolution on the strength of the single example mentioned."

"I didn't ask them to," interjected the speaker referred to. "I admit," went on Dr. Waugh, "that some of the verses are not poetry and some of the lessons are not literature, but I do say that they are the best of the kind. You don't know what you are doing in moving a resolution like that. It is a demagogical proceeding of the worst kind. It is just a piece of claptrap. I ask you in full fairness to the Government to appoint a committee and consider the question. Remember, it has only just come out of the arena of party politics."

Superficial, Says Mr. Fraser. Principal Fraser was on his feet instantly. "If the standard is to supply the boys and girls with what appeals to them, which is the use of our meeting here and protesting against five-cent shows and cigarettes? If the children want things must they have them? That is a very superficial appeal. I have it on good authority that recommendations made by the committee of principals, some of which were even promised, were not fulfilled. Teachers today are being compelled to lead a living life in using unauthorized books to supply the deficiencies of the primer. We don't want to glorify drunken drummers of the buff; we want to give our boys and girls high ideals of life."

Replies to Whitney. A reply to Premier Whitney's denunciation of the school primer and the department of education was made yesterday by Principal C. G. Fraser, of Toronto, secretary of the public schools department of the Ontario Education Association.

"We have tried other and private means," said Principal Fraser, "to bring before the department the objections to all the text-books, and it is our purpose to take up all of the books one by one, and criticize them as we did the primer. The primer was only taken because it is the first in the scale of the series, but we find fault with all of them. Our opinion of the primer was expressed in the resolution passed by

FRENCH AIR NAVY

Four Millions Will Be Asked From Government For Aeronautical Purposes.

Paris, April 1. — Gen. Brun, minister of war, replying in the Senate to criticisms on the inactivity of the department of aeronautics, as compared with that department in Germany, said that the statements regarding the strength of the latter country in this direction have been exaggerated. Germany, he said, at the most, had six dirigible balloons and aeroplanes were receiving the most careful attention. He proposed to ask Parliament for \$4,000,000 in four instalments, to be used for aeronautical purposes.

Lehane, a coroner-general, who she charges that Dr. Lehane performed an autopsy on the body, and in doing so illegally abstracted and retained the heart.

Julius Harberger, a former coroner, maintains that he ordered Dr. Lehane to return the heart to the relatives.

LOCAL POLICE NOT YET NOTIFIED

Marie Sullivan Disappears From Her Home in Toronto.

The disappearance of Marie Sullivan, the 17-year-old Toronto girl, from the home of Mrs. McColm, Mulgrave street, in that city, where she had been rooming, which has caused some anxiety among her friends, has not as yet been reported to the local police.

It is thought that she left for Hamilton, and according to dispatches from that city the police are of the opinion that it is simply a love affair.

However, her friends, who are certain grave doubts, and the murder of the Wheelwright girl in New York, has led to the investigation of foul play theories.

IWAKURA DEAD.

Tokio, April 1. — Prince Tomosa Iwakura, minister of the imperial household, died today. He was 72 years old. Mr. Iwakura had been a time grand chamberlain, privy councillor and director of the peerage bureau. He was 58 years of age.

H. S. VANDERBILT DEAD.

New York, April 1. — Henry Stevens Vanderbilt, who knew both Lincoln and Grant, died at his home here last night of heart disease. He was 72 years old. Mr. Vanderbilt was paymaster at the Portsmouth navy yard during the civil war, and during President Grant's administration was chief of a bureau in the treasury department.
