FRENCH AIR NAVY

Four Millions Will Be Asked From Government For Aeronautical Purposes.

[Associated Press.] Paris, April 1. - Gen. Brun, minister of war, replying in the Senate to criticisms on the inactivity of the department of aeronautics, as compared with that department in Germany, said that the statements regarding strength of the latter country in this direction had been exaggerated. Germany, he said, at the most, had six units. France, while only three were actually in commission, had four others. The problem of the respective merits of dirigible balloons and aeroplanes were receiving the most careful attention. He proposed to ask Parliament for \$4,000,000 in four installments, to be used for aeronautical purposes.


