"WHAT COMES AFTER DEATH?"

Rev. F. E. Malott's Subject in the Colborne St. Church Sunday.

REV. MR. PEATFIELD ILL

Pulpit Occupied by Rev. T. A. Steven on Sunday—Sermons in Local Churches.

Rev. F. E. Malott, at Colborne Street Methodist Church.—There is no question that has been asked so often by the human heart as "What comes after death?" People everywhere refuse to believe that the grave ends all. According to the conception of earthly happiness has been the conception of future enjoyment. The Indian believed in a happy hunting grounds, the Greeks in Elysian fields, the Mohammedan in a heaven where there are unlimited sensual enjoyments, but the Christian religion is the only one which tells of a heaven of pure and spiritual delight.

Luther's Life.
Rev. Thomas Mitchell, at the New St. James Church.—Martin Luther's life was a protest against the corruption of his time, both in the church and in the state. By his efforts he instituted a great intellectual and spiritual revival which moved the world.

Philosophy of Its Own.
Rev. A. K. Birks, at Askin Street Methodist Church.—Every faith has a philosophy of its own. The Bible has a philosophy for every age. It gives a philosophy of health, cheerfulness, a long life. It gives a good reputation, improves material conditions, is conducive to prosperity and is beneficial to the soul for all time.

Pastor Is Ill.
The Rev. Ernest Peatfield, pastor of the First Congregational Church, is in Victoria Hospital with a severe cold. His pulpit on Sunday was occupied at both services by the Rev. F. A. Steven, of the China Inland Mission. In the morning he said: "The only way to the throne of God is through self-abnegation. God passes by those that feel no need and leaves them to try their unaided pride and resources, and passes on to those who have a real need."

S. S. Anniversary.
The Sunday school anniversary was observed at Centennial Methodist Church on Sunday. In the morning the Rev. A. V. Jones of London Junction gave a very interesting address to the children. In the afternoon the Rev. T. Manning, of Dundas Centre, gave an address, and Mr. T. Glenn, of the city, gave an illustrated talk. In the evening the Rev. H. A. Graham, of the Wellington Street Methodist Church, preached. The children of the Sunday school were arranged on the platform and sang exceedingly well, showing careful training. The church was beautifully decorated with flags, and large audiences were present at all services. The children were thrown into the ring, while Miss Hagerman was pianist.

A Warning.
Rev. A. J. Vining, at Talbot Street Baptist Church.—"Stop! Letting your boy and your girl go to moving pictures shows if you don't want your boy ruined and your girl to become a prostitute. Your boy and your girl have no business to be out after 8 o'clock at night without protection. You legislate against murder, against robbery and against self-destruction by poison, but it is all right for a man to get drunk in the liquor. We have the cure for this in our hands if we will only apply it."

A Sense of Duty.
Rev. Walter Moffatt, at Chalmers' Church.—"Courage, arising from a sense of duty is a essential factor in all departments of life if we are to secure the highest and noblest results out of our opportunities. Our every-day life is an abundant scope to exercise our courage."

The Christian Life.
Rev. Prof. Jennings, at the Church of St. John the Evangelist.—Christ came for a kingdom, not to lay plans on a sure and perfect foundation. The sermon on the Mount has stood the criticism and test of nineteen hundred years, and is the standard of all Christian life. All men should strive to attain that ideal. But to all who do, the evil one comes, and a man asks himself if his ideal is not too high. The real answer is found in helping men by being unlike men, and being filled with the love of God. And when the end comes, men will glorify you for your example. The popular novel represents its characters as persons outside the church, and preachers and teachers are scoffed at, but it is the men and women who are making the world today, cleaning out its slums, and controlling its governments; and were it not for them, conditions would be much worse."

Responsible to God.
Rev. C. C. Claris, of Alton, Ont., at the Southern Congregational Church.—"We are individually and personally responsible to God. There is a divine ideal possible for every man. Every human race was first of all an idea in God's mind. Our beings are a divine product of God, and we are responsible to Him for some particular use or service."

Barroom a Cancer.
Rev. Mr. Kettlewell, of Toronto, at Askin Street Methodist Church.—"Fifty years ago Abraham Lincoln said that the barroom was a cancer. Is there a single barroom that is not profiting in the work of destruction?
