U. S. SENATE PASSES PACT BY

Amendment After Amendment Defeated by Decisive Votes-Measure Will Become Law Next Wednesday.

Washington, D. C., July 22.-The Canadian reciprocity bill passed the Senate without amendment today by 53 to 27. All amendments had been previously defeated. It becomes law upon the President's signature, the Senate measure being the bill that passed the House.

The La Folette amendment for revision of the entire cotton tariff and the tariff on artificial silk was defeated. A part amendment by Mr. La Folette admitting free of duty, after Jan. 1, 1912, all wood pulp, news print pape and paper board, was defeated by 11 to 67.

Senator Bailey called up his amendment proposing to attach the farmers' free list bill to the reciprocity measure, and it was defeated, 15 to

Two amendments by Mr. McCuamber, of North Dakota, Republican, on to put harness and saddlery on the free list and the other to prevent free admission of Canadian barley and other cereals now held in bonded warehouses in the United States, were defeated, the votes being 15 to 64 and 21 to 54, respectively. Under the general tariff laws all foreign goods held in bonded ware nouses are entitled to a new tariff rate as soon as any such new rate becomes a law.
