## INGERSOLL MAY GET NEW AUTO FACTORY

Company Asks Free Site and Loan of Ten Thousand Dollars.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ingersoll, Feb. 15.—Citizens who are acquainted with the industrial proposition, which has been before the industrial committee of the council and the board of trade for the past few weeks, are very favorably impressed with it. It is from a Motor Truck Company, and it would seem that there is a splendid future for a manufactory of this description.

The company ask the town for a free site, a loan of \$10,000 for twenty years at debenture interest, repayable in fifteen equal installments, the first payment to be made five years from the date of the bylaw. It also asks other minor concessions, which will receive further consideration at a conference of the proper committees and the representative of the company.

In view of the information that has already been elicited in connection with the project, the council will likely take steps to have a bylaw submitted at an early date.

**Wedding Celebration.** Probably nowhere in Western Ontario can there be found an older married couple than Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Burdick, who yesterday celebrated the 67th anniversary of their marriage. There was nothing of a formal nature in connection with the event, although Mr. and Mrs. Burdick received the hearty congratulations of many of their friends. Mrs. Burdick, who is in her 90th year, to her husband, who is in his 93rd year, has almost the full possession of her faculties, and is able to get around with the elasticity of step of a man years his junior.

The wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Burdick was solemnized in November 67 years ago at what is now known as Kintore. Mr. and Mrs. Burdick, who now reside with their daughter, Mrs. Macaulay, have resided in Ingersoll for over 50 years. Mr. Burdick has always been vigorous, although not of a particularly robust constitution. He has always been very active and up to a few years ago was a bicyclist.

## THROWN FROM SLEIGH FATALLY INJURED

He was at once taken to his house by John Jackson and Ernest Barker, who were working close by at the time of the accident. Medical aid was quickly summoned, but Mr. Speers soon lapsed into unconsciousness and expired before the arrival of a doctor. He leaves a widow and one daughter, Mrs. George Baxter, also a brother, John.

## HOTELKEEPERS MAKE UNIQUE AGREEMENT

Chatham Men Form Pact to Aid Authorities in Stopping Illegal Sales of Liquor.

She was about 65 years of age, and lived with her brother, Peter, and a younger sister. She was lighting the kitchen fire, when her clothing caught in a blaze.

## DOG HAD RABIES

Official Report From Toronto Says Stratford Animal Was Mad.

## HEAVILY FINED

Men Who Entered Canada Illegally Had to Pay Fifty Dollars.

[Canadian Press.] Niagara Falls, Feb. 15.—Sebastiano Manduc and Giovanni Lisi, Italians, who crossed the frontier at Niagara through tickets for Detroit, but got off at Hamilton and purchased tickets for Peterboro, were fined \$50 each for entering the country illegally. They were followed to Hamilton by immigration officials, who are exercising more than usual vigilance now.

## SWEEPING CHARGE IN LABOR CASE

Specific Accusation That Ironworkers Executive Was In Conspiracy.

## WORKED THROUGH MAILS

Indictment Declares That All the Fifty-Four Arrested Were Abettors of Alleged Plot.

Indianapolis, Feb. 15.—New disclosures made in the dynamite conspiracy cases, through 40,000 letters and telegrams quoted in the indictments, as implicating practically all the officials of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, is the base, it was declared today, upon which the Government will seek to convict the 54 defendants who are charged with committing or abetting in almost 100 explosions.

The correspondence, contained in one of the thirty-two indictments, and embracing what are termed "unconsummated acts of conspiracy," is held as showing that a vast plot, known to and furthered by Frank M. Ryan, the president of the ironworkers, and to members of his executive board, and many business men in Indianapolis, for six years to destroy the property of steel and iron contractors, who employed non-union labor.

All Held Guilty. It charges all the defendants with being equally guilty as abettors. "Jobs" became the accepted term to be sent through the mail to designate some place that was to be blown up, and that gradually the officials of the local unions began to call on the international headquarters in Indianapolis to assist by dynamite and nitroglycerin in increasing the expenses of "open shop" contractors.

Letters are included to show regular fees were paid to McManigal and that the cost of doing local "jobs" was frequently discussed in the letters.

## Letter Quoted.

A letter from Olaf A. Tveitmo, of the local union in San Francisco, to J. J. McNamara in Indianapolis, after the Los Angeles Times disaster, stating that he "hoped Santa Claus would be as kind and generous to you with surplus, as quoted to show that the conspiracy spread from Boston to the Pacific coast."

Four more indictments, not yet made public, supplement the principal indictment containing the correspondence. These indictments name all 54 defendants as implicated in the general conspiracy, and make these charges:

"That on 24 counts all the defendants are guilty as principals in illegal transportation of dynamite.

"That on 34 counts, McNamagal, John J. McNamara, James B. McNamara and Hookin are guilty of illegal transporting dynamite, and all the other defendants are guilty of aiding and abetting them."

"That on 16 counts all the defendants are guilty as principals in illegal transportation of nitro-glycerin.

"That on 16 counts McNamagal, John J. McNamara, James B. McNamara and Hookin are guilty of illegal transportation of nitro-glycerin, and all the other defendants are guilty of aiding and abetting them."

## LAW HAS ACCEPTED ASQUITH CHALLENGE

Alleges Corruption In the Matter of Appointment of Officials.

London, Feb. 15.—The Unionists, led by Bonar Law, decided to accept the challenge thrown out by Premier Asquith to prove the Government guilty of corruption in the matter of the appointment of officials. Mr. Law will move a vote of censure, and the debate will take place after the proceedings following the King's speech are concluded. Meanwhile Mr. Asquith has been asked to issue a return of appointments during the Radical term of office.
