HEALTH OF PUPILS WILL BE RECORDED

The Board of Education Will Co-operate With Dr. Hill, or Health Institute.

CENSUS IN THE SCHOOLS

Parents Will Be Asked to Enter Condition of Children on Cards.

At a special meeting of the board of education held Friday afternoon it was decided to take a health census of the city.

Dr. Hill, head of the Institute of Public Health in the city, was present, and explained the system to the board. Cards are to be distributed among the pupils, to be handed to the parents. On the cards are a number of questions relating to infectious diseases, and the family physician is not called in every time the children are ill, there are scores of cases of infectious diseases not recorded. In Iowa, one year, the vital statistics showed only 1,000 cases of measles, while the health census showed at least 24,000 cases. The cards would be turned in to the teacher. In case of an outbreak of any contagious disease, measles or anything of that nature, the teacher could readily find out what pupils had already had the disease, and they would be allowed to continue going to school.

Board Will Co-operate. The members of the board were in sympathy with the movement, and on motion of Trustees Inkster and Strong it was decided to co-operate with Dr. Hill.

City Clerk Baker notified the board that at the last meeting of the finance committee of the city council it was decided to order the board of education \$10,000 to purchase the land necessary to enlarge the grounds of the Aberdeen school, and that they had also referred the request of the board for \$70,000 for a new school to next year's council.

"What position is this board in now?" asked Trustee Hunt. "The building inspector employed by the city council has condemned the building, and it looks as if we might be liable for anything happened."

Responsibility With Council. "The responsibility is on the city council," declared Trustee Strong. "Trustee Inkster strongly advised that the money be accepted. The board could go ahead and prepare the plans for the new school, and next year a concrete proposition could be placed before the council. The board agreed to this."

The department of education notified the board that the annual grant, amounting to \$1,400, had been withheld, owing to the fact that the overcrowding of the Collegiate Institute had not been remedied. The secretary was instructed to notify the department that steps had already been taken to remedy the conditions arising. City Solicitor Meredith wrote the board that it was impossible to issue debentures for \$7,000 for industrial school purposes, and that the expense would have to be met out of the general rate. This will mean an overdraft of considerable size, but the board could do nothing but accept the situation.

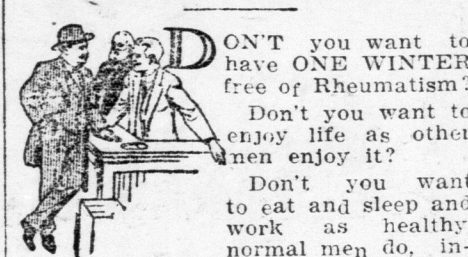

BRUSSELS TAX RATE WILL BE 20 MILLS

Five Per Cent. To Be Added to Unpaid Amounts After December 14.

Brussels, Oct. 11.—Twenty mills on the dollar will be the tax rate for Brussels this year. Five per cent. is added after Dec. 14 on all sums unpaid.

This week the Ladies' Aid of the Methodist Church paid the last \$100 on the parsonage debt, and now the church premises are clear.

Five hundred boxes of choice butter was shipped from Brussels creamery to Calgary at 26c. cents per pound.

The factory is well patronized, and on Tuesday turned out a ton of prime butter.

Rev. A. C. Wishart has accepted the call to St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Calgary, and will close a successful pastorate of six years here on Oct. 20, opening at Calgary on Nov. 3.

Potato rot is reported as very common in this locality.

The monthly Horse Fairs will be resumed here this fall and continued through the winter as in former seasons.

Next Wednesday afternoon and evening the Women's Home Missionary Society of Maitland Presbytery will meet here in convention. Mrs. (Rev.) J. A. McDonald, of Toronto, and Rev. Mr. McBeth, of Paris, will be the chief speakers.

Last Sunday John Lawson, who married Miss Clara McQuarrie, of this locality, died at Summerland, B. C., where he had gone in quest of health. The burial will be made at Goderich.

COOLIES ON STRIKE

Want Hire of Vehicles Reduced From 46 to 40 Cents a Day.

Hankow, Oct. 12.—Hankow's rich-sha owners refused a demand for the reduction of the daily hiring charges from \$90 cash to 700 cash (40 to 40 cents).

On the first day a few outside coolies took out rickshas, hoping probably to make big money. They were resisted by the strikers, who held up several rickshas in the concessions and compelled the men in the shafts to unship their passengers. For this interference eight of the strikers were arrested by the British police and placed in custody.

Recently the number of rickshas plying in the concessions has been increased from about 800 to more than 12,000. The result is that competition for fares has become far more keen.

The coolies are finding it hard to make a living over and above the 46 cents they have to pay as the daily hire to the ricksha owners.
