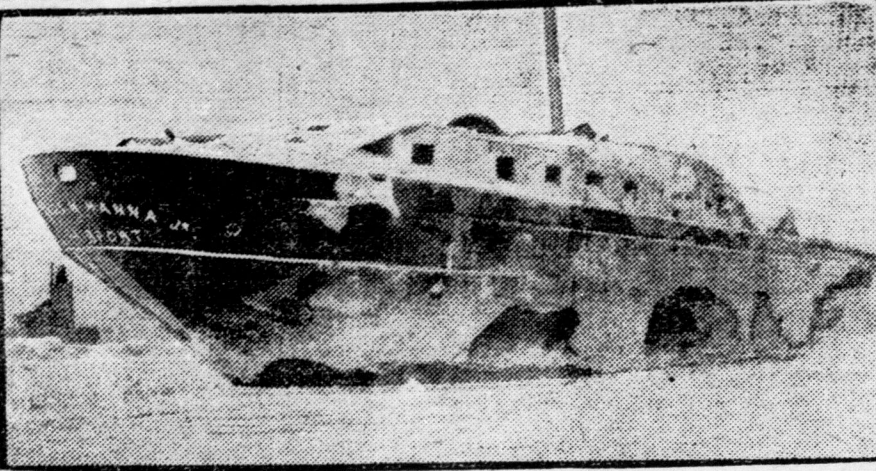


## STEAMER HOWARD HANNA ON ROCKS AT PT. AUSTIN WITH 10,000 TONS OF COAL



## EVANTUREL IS READ OUT OF PARTY AS A RESULT OF CHARGE

Member for Prescott Accused  
of Offering to Take Liquor  
Retainer.

ROWELL'S FIRM STAND

Practically Demands Resigna-  
tion, and Says More Than  
Explanation Is Necessary.

[Special to The Advertiser.]  
Toronto, Feb. 25.—The Ontario  
Legislature was the scene of a sen-  
sation this afternoon when Gustave  
Evanturel (Prescott) was charged  
with offering to accept a retainer from  
the liquor party to defend their in-  
terests in the Legislature.

The occasion occurred after Mr.  
Evanturel, who is seldom heard, charg-  
ing a direct alliance between the  
liquor interests and the Conservative  
party in Prescott County, and offered  
to resign his seat if the truth of his  
statements were not proven.

This was followed by a speech from  
G. Howard Ferguson (Grenville), who  
produced a letter signed by Mr.  
Evanturel offering for \$10,000 to be  
the special advocate of the liquor  
traffic in the halls of Parliament.

REPUTED BY LEADER.  
The scene was intense and Mr.  
Evanturel could only stammer an in-  
coherent reply to the charge. Later  
Mr. Rowell, Liberal leader, in a vigor-  
ous statement, repudiated Mr. Evan-  
turel, read him out of the party and  
virtually called for his resignation as  
representative of Grenville.

Mr. Evanturel attempted to make  
a further explanation, but was de-  
clared out of order by the Speaker and  
he will have to bring the matter up again  
on the orders of the day being called to-  
morrow.

Evanturel Makes Charge.  
"I have the privilege to say, and I am  
prepared to prove it or resign my seat in  
the House, that there is in the County  
of Prescott, which I represent, a great  
and a more than great alliance between  
the Conservative party and the liquor  
interests," said Mr. Evanturel. "I will  
prove it to you today."

He stated that the only Liberal lib-  
eral in the county had his license cut  
off twice. Mr. Evanturel charged that  
one of the license commissioners had  
acted as bartender for a hotelkeeper who  
admitted paying him \$2 a day for the  
service. The commissioner justified him-  
self by stating that it was "not against  
the rules."

Political Pull Gets License.  
Mr. Evanturel also charged that a  
liquor shop in Hawkesbury, which was  
without such a place for two years, had  
been granted a license on condition that  
the son of George H. Pharrand, a former  
member, was admitted as a partner, and  
the Prescott member, thought he could  
make something of the patronage.

Mr. Hanna interrupted to state that  
the incident had been investigated and  
that Mr. Pharrand had given an emphatic  
denial.

Asks for Pardon.  
Mr. Evanturel remarked that he  
would ask for the return of the report.  
He was not prepared to accept Mr.

No Justification for Letter.  
"But there is more in the latter than  
simply a statement of my honorable  
friend's position on that question, and it  
is that part of the letter which I peculiarly

"I feel certain that my honorable friend  
from Prescott has done himself a grave  
injustice in writing that letter. I believe  
the honorable member for Prescott has  
done his constituency a grave injustice in  
writing that letter. I would not do  
myself the honor to think I should under-  
stand the honorable member, reach any  
final conclusion in this matter, but I  
do feel that upon reflection, and that the  
honorable member and his constituents will  
feel that some further action is necessary  
than such explanation as the honorable  
member may make to this House.

"I trust I have made myself clear, and  
when we hear from the honorable mem-  
ber, when he makes his statement there  
may be something further to say."

Where the Letter Came From.  
Mr. Howell then went on to state that  
he did not believe that Mr. Ferguson  
received the letter from the man to whom  
it was written, but that it had been put  
into his hands by those who wanted to  
defeat the proposal to abolish the bar.  
(Applause.)

## TWELVE MEN KILLED IN GERMAN EXPLOSION

Others Seriously Injured When  
Factory Was Destroyed—  
400 in Building.

Berlin, Feb. 25.—Twelve men are known  
to have been killed and eight others se-  
riously injured in an explosion which de-  
stroyed an extensive aniline dye factory  
in Rummelsburg, a suburb of Berlin.  
There were 400 employees in the building  
at the time of the explosion, which was  
heard all over Berlin.

The firemen were unable to enter the  
buildings owing to the poisonous fumes,  
and it was not possible to ascertain the  
real extent of the disaster.

## IRISH PARTIES UNITE ON STEAMER QUESTION

Protest Against Desertion of  
Queenstown by Mail  
Boats.

New York, Feb. 25.—A cable from  
Dublin to the New York American says:  
Both Irish parties, enemies on home rule  
have united in protesting against the  
desertion of Queenstown by the mail  
steamers.

An important deputation, including  
John Redmond and Sir Edward Carson,  
will present to the premier and the post-  
master-general, Ireland's claims in this  
connection.

The Dublin corporation simultaneously  
will present to the House of Commons  
a petition for the reinstatement of the  
regular mail service between Queenstown  
and America.

## STORAGE RESERVOIRS TO DEVELOP HYDRO POWER

Power Minister Gives Details  
of Scheme to Add 25,000

Toronto, Feb. 25.—Hon. Adam Beck this  
morning gave details of his plan to add  
25,000 horsepower to the available hydro  
power. His plan is to have great storage  
reservoirs on the new Welland Canal and  
develop power from them.

"Under treaty rights we have power to  
draw 36,000 cubic feet from the Niagara  
River per second," said Mr. Beck. "Our  
present system consumes 30,000, so we  
have 6,000 more to develop by allow-  
ing the water from the Welland Canal  
reservoirs to drop over the ridge that ex-  
tends from Queenston."

Animal in Canada.

New York, Feb. 25.—When Judge  
Middley Marsden, of Whaley Bridge,

for the best dog in the Westminster  
Kennel Club's exhibition yesterday to  
the English sheep dog Slammer, owned  
by Mrs. Tyler Morse, Westbury, L. I.,  
it marked the fourth successive annual  
win at this show of an English-bred  
dog.

high-class collies.

Church for the same reason.

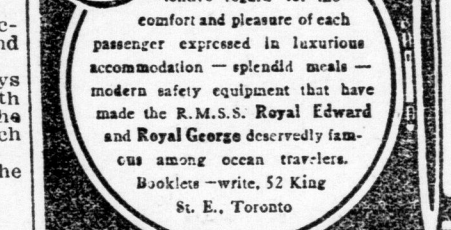
"I don't believe in churches running re-
