So the washstands of hotels, office buildings and the like are equipped with various contrivances to give each visitor his soap uncontaminated. In many of these the soap is liquid, but a York man has patented a machine for shaving cakes of soap into thin slivers, which drop into the user's hand. A cylindrical receptacle with cutter blades






