ALL LUIS FIRPO WANTS

Argentine Fighter Shows Good Sportsmanship in Public Statement.

Associated Press Despatch.

New York, Sept. 19.—The decision of the referee is sufficient for Luis Angel Firpo, and, despite the protests of his friends and many spectators of his fight with Jack Dempsey that he was unfairly treated and fouled, he asks nothing more than "another match" with the world's champion.

The true sportsmanship of the Argentine fighter is shown in a statement given by him to the Associated Press, in which he says:

"There has been enough discussion on the question of fouls in my match with Jack Dempsey. The charges against Horatic Lavelle are unjust, because Mr. Muldoon, chairman of the New York Boxing Commission, assured us that justice would be done to me.

"I have read what Mr. Muldoon has said on the subject of fouls, and I appreciate it. I have also read many reference to the same matter. But, activithstanding this, I want to make one thing perfectly clear: I accept the decision, and all I want is another match with Dempsey as soon as my arm is all right and I have had sufficient rest."
