**FOUR ARE HURT AS G. T. R. TRAIN LEAVES TRACKS**

Accident Believed Due To Tender of Engine Forcing Switch.  
**BLOCKS LINE FOR HOURS**

BELLEVILLE, Sept. 15.—When Grand Trunk passenger train, No. 28, due here at 5:15 p.m., left the rails at Sydney Crossing about eight miles west of here, four men were hurt, two of them thought seriously. They are Express Messenger Bert Moorman of Belleville, who is suffering from shock and injuries to the back and head, and Conductor William Johnson of Toronto, who is cut about the head.

V. Squires of Cobourg, brakeman on train suffered minor injuries. The cause of the accident is not definitely known. It is thought it was due to a tender of the engine forcing the switch near the crossing. The tender tore up the track, and the baggage car, together with all the passenger coaches, left the rails, with the exception of the parlor car. The express car suffered most, one end being smashed to pieces and the side torn, the messenger, Bert Moorman being hurled through the door. The car finally landed in a field south of the track and clear of the right of way. Against it was piled the baggage car.

The passenger coaches blocked the main line effectively, although none of them were overturned. The engine stood on the track, which was blocked for hours. The scene of the accident was quite a distance from a house and it was some time before word of the accident reached the city. The auxiliary car of the Grand Trunk Railroad was sent up from the city with coaches to take passengers aboard and transfer them to their trains for the east while accommodation was made for the injured.

**STATE ELLIS NEVER OFFICIAL HANGMAN**

Department of Justice Declares Execution of Murderers Provincial Matter.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—(Canadian Press).—At the present time, Canada has no official executioner, especially retained as such. Arthur Ellis has been recognized as conducting executions, but not, it is announced, as an employee of the department of justice. This curious situation is brought to light by the delayed execution of Bennie Swim, who was to have been hanged at Woodstock, N.B., today. Swim was granted a reprieve by the chief justice of New Brunswick, because Sheriff Jones was unable to find an executioner. Sheriff Jones made an affidavit to the effect that he had first engaged Arthur Ellis "once in the employ of the department of justice, but found afterwards he had been discharged by the department," and that his efforts to secure someone else had been unavailing.

At the department of justice today it was stated that Arthur Ellis had never been officially in its employ and therefore could not have been discharged. He has acted in a number of cases, but not as an employee of the department. It was stated further that the execution of convicted murderers is a provincial and not a federal matter and that the department has never employed an executioner.

It is understood that Ellis made a request some time ago that he should be appointed official executioner, but the request was refused.

**EXPECT TO REACH MINERS SUNDAY**

Rescuers Prepare To Enter Lower Levels Within a Few Hours.

JACKSON, Cal., Sept. 15.—Jackson settled down today for another tedious wait for news from its 47 men entombed in the Argonaut gold mine. Hope that some unexpected freak of nature would provide a means for an early rescue have faded. Only the incessant driving against the hardest rock will open a pathway.

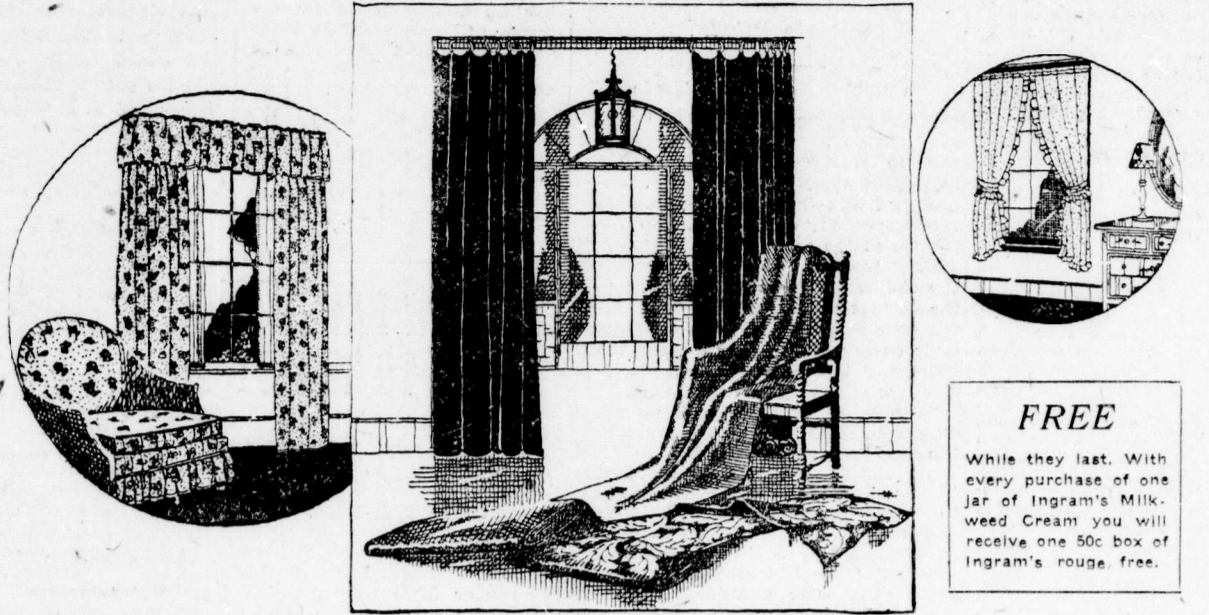




