This being the first meeting, there was not enough representation to elect the officers, but this will take place at the next meeting, Wednesday, Oct. 22.

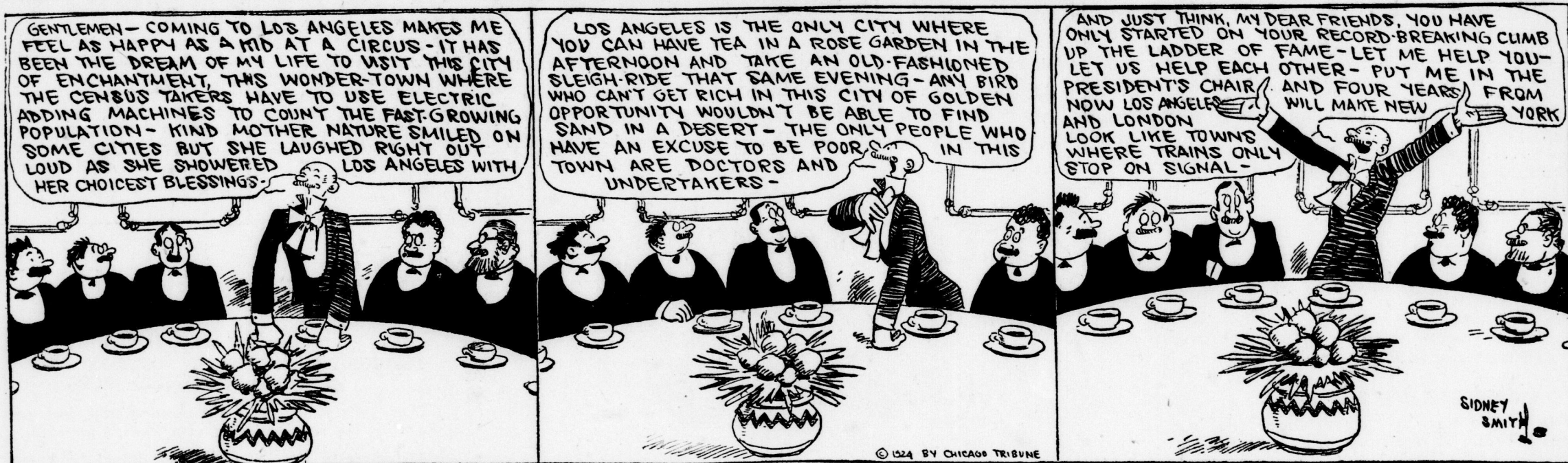
