FORMER MAYOR DIES FROM FALL

James A. Wiley, ex-Mayor of St. Catharines, Suffers Injuries in Parade.

Canadian Press Despatch. St. Catharines, Aug. 13.—James A. Wiley, mayor of St. Catharines during 1915 and for several years an alderman, died in Welland county hospital at Welland early this morning from injuries received yesterday when he was thrown from a horse upon which he was riding at the head of the Derry Day parade of Black Knights.

He was in the act of turning the horse from South Main street to Regent street when he pulled the curb rein instead of the guiding rein. The horse reared and, still pulling the curb rein, the rider clung to his horse, which turned completely over backward, throwing the grand marshal on the pavement, fracturing his skull and breaking his collarbone and causing other injuries. He was first taken to Dr. Colbeck's clinic, and later moved to the hospital.

James A. Wiley was 57 years of age, a tailor by occupation and a lifelong resident of St. Catharines. He was an active temperance advocate and prominent in labor matters, having unsuccessfully contested the riding of St. Catharines for the legislature against the late Dr. Jessop. He was elected mayor on the same ticket.

A widow and one child survive him.

KEMAL PASHA GETS DIVORCE

Wife of Turkish Statesman Was Strong Advocate of Women's Rights.

Associated Press Despatch. Constantinople, Aug. 13.—Mustapha Kemal Pasha has divorced his wife, Latife Hanoum.

Mustapha Kemal Pasha was married Jan. 29, 1923, to Latife Hanoum, daughter of Mouamerou Chaki Bey, a wealthy merchant of Smyrna. The marriage is said to have brought him a dowry of 1,000,000 Turkish lire. A few months later Madame Latife, known as a believer in women's rights, was proposed as a deputy to the Turkish parliament from Constantinople by women of that city, who were indignant over the unacceptance of the Deputy Salih Effendi to make marriage obligatory.

Mustapha Kemal has taken an active interest in the improvement of the condition of the Turkish women. On March 25, 1923, two months after his marriage, when a banquet was given him at Koniah, he broke two traditions by having women invited to the banquet with men.

Mrs. Latife was 19 years old at the time of her marriage. She was described as a dainty, attractive girl with large black eyes. When she accompanied Mustapha Kemal on his first official journey after the marriage she did not wear the customary Turkish veil, but had a large, brightly colored silken kerchief around her hair, and otherwise was dressed in European fashion.

The marriage in Smyrna was in Turkish style. Kemal simply declared: "I have decided to marry Latife Hanoum. Will you please accept the necessary ceremonies?"

The mufti then addressed the bride, saying: "Do you accept as husband Ghazi Mustapha Kemal Pasha in return for a gift for him of ten drachmas of silver and on condition of a mutual indemnity as agreed upon by you in the event of separation?" Her affirmative reply concluded the ceremony.

The dowry of 1,000,000 Turkish lire which Madame Latife brought her husband was worth approximately \$650,000 at the rate of exchange at that time.

Plans Are Under Way To Effect Union at an Early Date.

New York, Aug. 13.—Plans for the amalgamation of three of the largest British banking institutions in Africa—the Colonial bank, the Anglo-Egyptian Bank, Limited, and the National Bank of South Africa, Limited, were announced in a cablegram received at the New York office of Barclay's Bank, Limited, Control of the new bank will rest with Barclay's Bank, Limited, by virtue of stock ownership.

The Colonial Bank will be reincorporated and change its name to Barclay's Bank, (Dominion, Colonial and Overseas). It will then acquire the businesses of the Anglo-Egyptian bank and of the National bank of South Africa.

The new institution will have an authorized capital of £10,000,000, of which £6,975,000 will be issued and subscribed, and £4,975,000 will be paid up.

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BISHOP'S REMARKS CLAIMED TO BE CAUSE OF RESIGNATION

Orangeman Says Bidwell's Attack On Lodge Forced His Withdrawal.

Special To The Advertiser. Toronto, Aug. 12.—Leading members of the Orange Order in Toronto hold the opinion that the recent resignation of Rt. Rev. Dr. E. J. Bidwell of Kingston, Bishop of Ontario, was partly brought about by his references to the Orange Order, Recommendation of the acceptance of the resignation by the executive of the diocese of Ontario followed closely upon the publication of a letter written by Dr. Bidwell to the Church Times, in which statements were made that seem to have given offence.

Local Anglican clergymen refused to discuss any features of the case whatever. Canon Cody expressed the general opinion when he deplored the publicity which had been given to the case.

"I feel sure that Orangemen did everything in their power to have removed a minister who spoke so slightly of the Orange Order," declared Mr. T. H. Addy, past deputy grand master of the Orange Order. "I do not know what action our members in Kingston took, but I am sure they would not have been inactive. No doubt they worked to secure Bishop Bidwell's resignation."

"After the statement he made he must have realized that his position as a Protestant minister was untenable. Personally I would have done everything in my power to cause his removal, and I feel confident that other Orangemen would have done the same."

The letter in which Bishop Bidwell referred to the Orange Order was written to the Church Times, commending, through disagreeing in detail, with an article from a Canadian correspondent, headed "The Church in Eastern Canada: Evil Influence of the Orange Lodges." The fluency of the Orange Lodges, the correspondent dwelt upon the difficulties of a Catholic revival in Canada, and attributed the lack of success largely to the influence of the Orange Order.

EARLY SETTLEMENT BY FRENCH IS SEEN

Brian Denies, Though, That Question Taken Up Recently With the British.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Aug. 13.—The Daily Express displays on its front page today the words: "The latest discussions with France regarding her debt to Great Britain have progressed in a most favorable way, and it is believed there will be an early settlement."

It is not suggested that these discussions occurred during the present visit to London of M. Briand, the French foreign minister. Although M. Briand met the chancellor of the British exchequer, Winston Churchill, at luncheon at the French embassy yesterday, the subject of the debt apparently was not discussed either there or elsewhere.

"Mr. Churchill and I are old friends," M. Briand is described as saying to the Express correspondent, "and it is only natural that we should have discussed the question of debts, as that is hardly my mission. We did not discuss debts; we talked mostly about carnations."

PROTEST COAL SUBSIDIES. Associated Press Despatch. Gijon, Spain, Aug. 13.—Coal miners and owners have held several meetings here to protest against the action of the British government in granting subsidies for coal exports. They believe this policy will cause serious damage to the Spanish coal industry.

ANTHRACITE OWNERS FEAR INTERFERENCE

Expect Soft Coal Miners' Request For Probe Will Affect Their Position.

Atlantic City, N.J., Aug. 13.—Anthracite operators today see confirmation of their forebodings in yesterday's announcement by the miners that government intervention in the hard coal deadlock would signalize a request from the United Mine Workers that the authorities first consider alleged wage-cutting in the soft coal fields.

W. W. English of Scranton, chairman of the scale committee of the anthracite operators, said: "We have feared that, as in the past, the anthracite industry would become the victim of soft coal necessities."

Our industry is relatively a small part of the coal industry as a whole. The mine workers' union is dominant in both hard and soft coal fields, and how ever it may affect the feelings of hard coal producers and consumers, they always come in for consideration whenever there has been a conflict of interests between hard and soft coal."

John L. Lewis, mine workers' president, has declined to elucidate the union's policy. He had business in Philadelphia today.

LONDON BANK CLEARINGS. Local bank clearings for the week ending today are \$2,282,715, as compared with \$2,136,487 for the corresponding week of last year.

COAL RATE REDUCTION NOT TO AFFECT PRICES

U. S. Board Orders Lower Tariff On Certain Classes.

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, Aug. 12.—The reduction of certain anthracite and bituminous coal rates, as ordered by the interstate commerce commission at Washington today, does not affect Montreal or Canada to any great degree, according to local coal firms.

They base this decision on the fact that the rates were lowered on prepared sizes of low volatile bituminous, a coal which is not used to any great extent in Canada, while what changes were made in anthracite freight rates are such as will not, according to reports from Washington, in any way change prices of American coal in Canada.
