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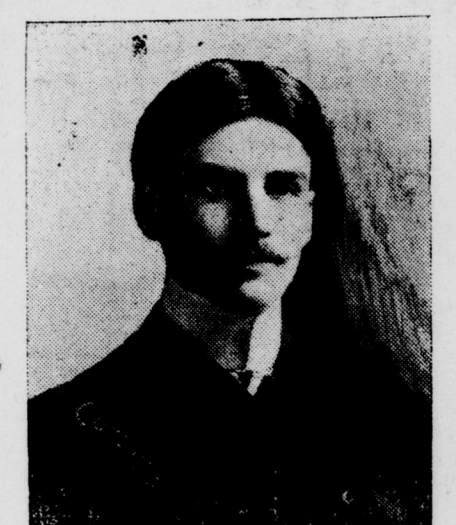
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NEW ENTERPRISE HERE.

Well-known Young Business Man's Proposal That Should Become Very Popular.

"One of London's most enterprising young business men is Mr. Chas. H. Anderson, proprietor of the City Parcel Express. He has undertaken to fill a need of the business section of the city that has been often felt, but the remedy for which has not probably occurred to many. In the offices of the city who has not noticed the absence of some refreshing toilet soap and the luxury of a clean towel? Just

here Mr. Anderson's enterprise comes in. He has visited the American cities and has witnessed the workings and the success of the system which he proposes to introduce here. In brief, it is to furnish to each office desiring it a dainty cabinet, eighteen inches square, with plate glass mirror. This will contain two either roller or hand towels, a cake of good toilet soap and a comb and brush, all for fifteen cents per week. Four towels will be 25c, and more will be charged for proportionately. The cabinet is rented merely by the door.

The new enterprise will be known as the London Toilet Supply Company. Agents of the company will wait upon citizens concerned within a day or two.

FREE PRESS CORRESPONDENCE.

MR. MAGEE TO MRS. THORNLEY.

To the Editor of the Free Press. Sir,—In to-day's Free Press, Mrs. Thornley, of this city, one of the Dominion Alliance deputations, is quoted as having stated to Premier Ross on Wednesday at Toronto, speaking of the plebiscite campaign in London, as follows:

"In one case a man took the oath 'and voted in the name of a man' whose funeral both the scrutineer and deputy had attended, and when an effort was made to secure his arrest it was found that no warrant could be obtained without the authority of the Crown Attorney. 'That official had a notice on his office door that he had gone away for a day's fishing. In view of these facts she earnestly asked that on this occasion safeguards be adopted to prevent a repetition of such doings.'"

There have been two plebiscite campaigns, and I do not know which was referred to. The Provincial vote was taken at the municipal election in January, 1894, and the Dominion vote in September, 1898. As fishing is not a comfortable job in January, the September date is probably the one intended to point the moral and adorn the tale.

There are, however, some trifling inaccuracies in the statement. It is not and was not necessary to have any authority from the County Crown Attorney for the arrest or prosecution of any offender for any offence or for the issue of a warrant therefor.

That official had not on either of those occasions or on any other occasion a notice on his office door that he had gone away for a day's fishing, or gone away for any other purpose; and further, that official had not on either of the two occasions gone away fishing, and had not gone away at all.

That official took care to be in the city and at his office on both dates.

The speaker was doubtless misinformed, but it is better that assertions during the campaign should be in accordance with the facts.

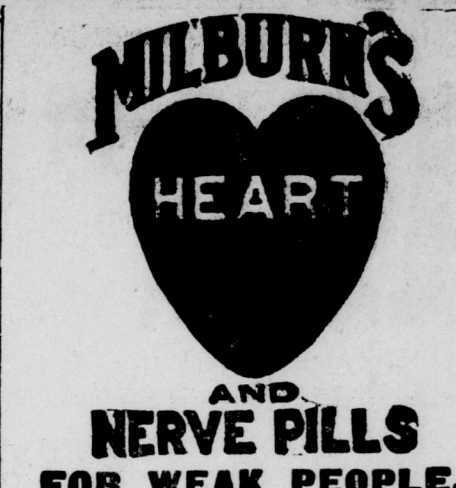
