THE WORLD OF SPORT."Capitals" Capture the Intermediate
Championship—Vancouver Seniors
Lose to Westminster.Entries Numerous for the Bays' Re-
gatta—New Canadian Wheel
Records Established.

The Capitals by winning their match with the Beavers of Vancouver yesterday have captured the intermediate lacrosse championship for this year. It was not exactly a walk over for the home team, but after the first goal was scored it was conceded by the large crowd of enthusiasts at Caledonia park that the Capitals would win handily, and they did. It was good team play that did the business, the visitors, though showing excellent individual work, being unable to cope with the combination of the home twelve. Captain John Irving, honorary president of the Capitals, placed the ball and the match commenced close upon the appointed time. In the first game the Beavers carried the ball to the Capitals' goal, but Clark returned and at once the Capitals began a combined attack. Some sharp and close checking ensued, but the Capitals were doing the best team play. Campbell made a fine run from centre and passed to Schnoter, who fell when about to shoot close up to the flag. Miller next got a chance but missed, and the Beaver defence sent it far up field. Reynolds, the Beavers' goalkeeper, though suffering from a bad leg, made some very fine plays, stopping hot shots time and again. Finally Smith got the ball behind the Beaver's goal and passed out to B. Bland with excellent judgment. Bland, when the defence came at him, shot and scored in fine style. Time, 10 minutes.

The second game was almost a repetition in all save duration, the Blands, Stephens and Finlayson doing good work, while Scurry accomplished wonders for the visitors. W. Bland threw up field and Smith capturing the ball eventually dodged McDonough and scored. Time, four minutes.

Miller, whose foot was injured in a former match, had to retire before the third game was started, his place being taken by F. Schnoter, who though young made a very good showing. Snider signally distinguished himself by stopping an attack on the Capitals' flag in this game. From centre field F. Schnoter captured the ball and running down field scored Victoria's third goal, 6 minutes from the face off.

Finlayson was ruled off for the fourth game for accidentally landing Dimond into the fence, and the Beavers, making the most of their opportunity, rushed the ball down on the Capital flag, doing some of the best team play they had displayed during the afternoon. Summers, who was playing very clean lacrosse, scored for them when Norman was out of the flag. Time, 6 minutes.

The fifth game was very short, lasting only a minute. W. Bland ran down field and passed to Campbell, who scored.

In the sixth the Beavers made desperate efforts to retrieve their fortune, and in spite of Summers being sent to the fence for fouling Sinclair they kept the Capitals from scoring for a long time. Scurry doing remarkably good service. A pass from Finlayson to Bland was sent across the front of the flag to F. Schnoter, who scored. Time—28 minutes.

In the seventh game, after a very short tussle at centre, the ball went to Smith, who scored in 2 minutes.

VANCOUVER SUFFERS DEFEAT.

Vancouver, B.C., Aug. 24.—(Special)—The lacrosse match between the Vancouver and Westminster senior clubs at Brockton Point to-day was in many ways a repetition of last Saturday's game, and was lost to the home team chiefly through bad luck and bad management. In the first game Vancouver seemed to be doing all the playing. The struggle lasted eight minutes, for seven of which the ball circled around the Westminster flag. But the Westminster home got it for a minute and scored, J. Lewis making the lucky shot.

The second game was fast and exciting; the Vancouver home bunched in front of the flag bringing the Westminster defence with them, and when the ball was coming towards the enemy's poles struggled along one side instead of spreading out. The home team had twenty shots on the visitors' flag, but Westminster had only two on the flag of the home team. At the end of the twenty-four minutes Cambridge got the ball from Oddy and ran behind the flag, he tipped to Ryal and Ryal scored.

In the third game the Vancouver home were instructed to lead out the rival defence, but it was seen at once that Vancouver was hopelessly helpless in the hands of the visiting defence. On the other end Vancouver was playing the most nervous defence game. Snider and Quigley did the work of a dozen men in successfully holding down the famous Ryal-Cambridge combination for 32 minutes, and possibly if W. Quinn had not been ruled off for rough play Vancouver would have shown up better. But the Vancouver home was too weak to make an effective work against Cheyne and Stuart Campbell. Ryal scored for Westminster. In this game Smith strained his ankle and Myers was put on in his place.

In the fourth game, with Quigley taken from defence to home and Myers fresh in the field, things looked more favorable, and at the end of seventeen minutes Myers shot on goal. The ball fell in front and Quigley pushed it through. In this game Cheyne was ruled off for striking W. Quinn just before the game was scored.

In the fifth game the home team showed up brilliantly, but the visitors did not check closely and after one minute's play Quigley scored for Vancouver. J. H. Senkler made a strict but very satisfactory referee. Two

thousand people saw the splendid exhibition of lacrosse, and saw the best team win. For Vancouver, Quigley, Snider and J. H. Senkler deserve special mention for brilliant play, and for Westminster, Cheyne, Stuart Campbell, Cambridge and Ryal headed an entire aggregation of stars. Vancouver's defeat is most unfortunate for them, as it compels them to postpone their Eastern trip to vary late in the season.

FAIR PLAY FOR MORTON.

The Toronto Telegram prints the following, prompted by a desire to see fair play for everyone: "A paragraph from the Peel Banner, quoted in this column last Saturday, is illustrative of the fine frenzy which pervades the columns of too many of the local papers of Ontario when their town teams gets the worst of it. The Banner's statements as to Harry Morton's play against Brampton at St. Catharines were disposed of in the remarks of J. D. Bailey. Its other assertions, that a man meeting death at Morton's hands in a lacrosse match in British Columbia, and the subsequent attempt to prosecute the St. Catharines man for manslaughter, were entirely erroneous. Morton, who was playing with a visiting team, was the victim of police interference upon behalf of one of the home players, who was injured in the play. The man did not die, and there was no prosecution for manslaughter, but Morton was harassed by just such tactics as the Capitals used at Ottawa when they called in the police to arrest Kelly, of the Shamrocks, for checking one of the Ottawa players."

W. C. T. U.

Doings of the Annual Convention at
Nanaimo—A Satisfactory
Year's Work.Superintendents of the Various De-
partments—The Outlook a Most
Encouraging One.

The twelfth annual convention of the British Columbia W.C.T.U. was both in interest and numbers the best that has been held in the history of the organization in this province. Fifty-five delegates were present representing the unions. The convention was called to order on Saturday morning, 14th inst., by the president, Mrs. Spofford of Victoria, and the three days' programme, which was an unexceptionally full one, strictly adhered to and carried out in every detail. On Saturday afternoon Mrs. Soaife of Victoria gave an address on "Higher Womanhood," which was much appreciated and listened to with marked attention.

On Sunday the hospital, Sabbath schools, Indian and Chinese missions and Y.M.C. were visited and addressed by members of the convention appointed for the purpose. The report of prison work, a paper by Miss Barnes of Comox, and a report of Refuge Home work, and a memorial service occupied the morning. The report on work done in the Refuge Home was especially encouraging. The thanks of the convention were tendered to the COLONIST and Times of Victoria both for supplying papers free as well as advertising meetings, etc. Thanks were also tendered to the physicians for medical attendance, they having invariably attended the inmates of the memorial service already mentioned in memory of the late Mrs. W. L. Williams, Dominion president, and "G. V. Taylor, of the Nanaimo union."

In the afternoon reports were presented from the superintendents of scientific temperance instruction in schools, and the department of prison work. The former showed that while much work had been accomplished during the past year very much remained to be done. The Union at Comox has been successful in securing its introduction into the schools of that district and Vancouver also after much hard fighting. New work for over a year has had the subject taught in the schools of the city. The department of narcotics was felt to be in need of active work, seeing how widely spread the tobacco habit has become amongst the young people. The temperance reports were followed by a parliamentary drill conducted by Mrs. Jenkins of Victoria, which proved to be both instructive and amusing. The election of officers followed—those of the previous year being re-elected. The plan of work as submitted by Mrs. Gordon Grant, of Victoria, was adopted with amendments.

In the evening a large gathering in the Wallace street Methodist church listened to a stirring prohibition address given by Mr. Trotter. By request that gentleman sang "Canada Shall Yet Be Free," the audience becoming so enthused by the song that finally all joined in the chorus.

On Tuesday morning the opening services were conducted by Mrs. S. T. Brown, of Vancouver. In the flower mission, social purity, the franchise and the refuge home, superintended by Miss Latham, of New Westminster, great activity had been displayed during the year. The committee on resolutions reported on Sabbath observance, police matrons, outdoor refreshment, purity, the franchise and the refuge home building fund. In order to save time at future conventions it was resolved that hereafter no reports from any department of the provincial superintendents, or the report of the meeting, should be read. The morning session was closed by Mrs. McDonald of Victoria, with a very helpful and encouraging Bible reading. Miss Bowes opened the afternoon meeting, after which the report of the ladies' department was read. The question box was opened and the questions asked by the president. Owing to the indisposition of the recording secretary, Miss McDonough of New Westminster, Mrs. McGregor of Vancouver was allowed to substitute her paper on "The Sanitation of Homes" to be read at the evening meeting. The appointment of superintendents and standing committees was confirmed by the convention, unfinished business dealt with and new taken up. Mrs. J. Cunningham invited the convention to meet at Vancouver next year. On motion the invitation was accepted unanimously. The evening meeting, addressed by Rev. Mr. Taylor, of Nanaimo, after which the provincial banner for the largest increase in membership for the year was awarded to the Nanaimo Union. Rev. Mr. Maillard gave an address on "Woman's Work." This brought the convention of 1895 to a close, a convention which will long be remembered by every one present as most successful and harmonious—the success and harmony being largely due to the president, Mrs. Spofford's great tact and executive ability.

Wednesday's demonstration, in which all the temperance organizations, together with the W.C.T.U. delegates, took part, was an innovation in the temperance movement in this province. A procession was formed at St. Alban's church and headed by the Nanaimo silver cornet band paraded through the city to the Caledonian grounds. En route they were re-inforced by the Wellington band. On arriving at the grounds the ladies of Nanaimo, presided by the ladies of Nanaimo. Speakers were commenced for which prizes were given amounting in value to \$300, and at 3:30 a mass meeting was held, at which the speakers were Rev. R. R. Maillard, of Nanaimo; Mrs. Jenkins, of Victoria; and Mrs. James of Nanaimo, the able president of that union, gave a solo. To this lady's energy and ability is due the remarkable success which has attended the W.C.T.U. of Nanaimo.

A SCOTTISH DAY.

St. Andrew's and Caledonian Society
Hold Their Thirty Second Annual
Gathering.The Bagpipes, Highland Dancing,
Athletic Sports and a Concert
the Attractions.

The kilts and bagpipes were very much in evidence yesterday. It was the annual gathering of the St. Andrew's and Caledonian Society, so all good Scots who had them donned kilts and plaid; those who had none contented themselves with a scrap of tartan ribbon displayed in the button hole, and perhaps a Glengarry tilted rakishly over the right eye. The men in the kilts were most of them "braw lads," whose enormous calves were the wonder of an admiring crowd as the owners strutted up the green in front of the grand stand. The afternoon was fresh and bright, just cool enough for the contestants in the various athletic events. The number of the visitors offered was large and as a result, the attendance of spectators was correspondingly numerous. The grand stand was filled to overflowing and the space around the enclosure was well filled with people. The fair sex were out in force, many of them sporting tartan ribbons in honor of the occasion. Of music there was plenty. The B.C.B.G.A. band played during afternoon and the space intervals were always filled with the skill of the pipes. There was one pipe—J. R. McKenzie—only eleven years old, who not only came out third in the pipe playing competition with the men, but took part in the sword dancing and the Highland fling as well.

The Governor-General, Lady Aberdeen and their children were present during the sports, and took a keen interest in the various contests. The two younger boys, Hon. Archie and Hon. Dudley Gordon, were in kilts. When the vice-regal party arrived they were met near the gate by the committee of the society and escorted to the place reserved for them in the centre of the grand stand. The Governor-General after the lacrosse match had both teams called together, and made them a little speech, congratulating them on the good temper displayed during the game and the moderation they had shown in spite of knoaks and tumbles. The teams cheered him lustily as the conclusion of his remarks.

The sports started with the football match, the Wanderers first defeating the Bays by 1-0, and Mr. Gordon's team beating the "Trillies" of H. M. S. Royal Arthur. The final between the Wanderers and Mr. Gordon's team was won with ease by the former. The Highland fling and sword dances were on a raised platform in the centre of the field, so that the spectators could have a good view. Young McKenzie, who was third in piping, will before long make the best of them look to their laurels. The piping was extremely good, according to Mr. A. Robertson, the judge of the piping match.

The Chinese proved a feature of the day, and was very funny indeed. Four of them entered and puffed round the course, to the huge delight of the crowd, who cheered tremendously as a long, keen Chinaman in blue opened his first, his feet just skimming the ground in that peculiar shuffling gait that comes of carrying two baskets on a pole over the shoulders.

Mr. J. G. Brown, first vice-president of the society, presided over the football; Messrs. C. P. Wolley and W. Ward presided over the sports and Mr. P. E. Irving referee; Mr. John Estman acted as starter and Mr. E. C. Smith, the energetic secretary of the society, was everywhere, taking entries, giving information and helping generally to send things along.

The small boys' race was, as usual, a big success. Over twenty youngsters entered and when the word was given, away they went round the track like a swarm of bumble bees. The little girls did not turn out as well, for only four of them started, but they too, made a capital race of it. The results in the various events were:
