IMPERIAL LINES

Subsidies Granted to Steamships for South Africa.

London, Aug. 14.—In its issue of this morning, the Daily Express asserts that Canada will subsidize to the extent of \$150,000 and Great Britain to the extent of \$50,000, the new line of steamers to be established between Canada and South Africa, which is the first portion of the great plan elaborated by Colonial Secretary Chamberlain to make the British Empire Independent of foreign supplies for food, etc.

Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, Canadian high commissioner in London, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian premier, assisted, according to the Daily Express, "in arranging Mr. Chamberlain's plan, which has the sympathy of Kang Edward and the Prince of Wales." The Canadian Pacific railway has thrown in its lot with the shipping lines concerned in the amalgamation, the paper concludes, and the same combination is arranging for a fast steamer service between Canada and Great Britain. The conference of colonial premiers with Colonial Secretary Chamberlain, which adjourned August 11, reached no agreement as to Canada's contribution to the Imperial navy.
