Suffocated When They Seek Refuge in Tunnel of Lucky Jim Mine, Near Kaslo-Case of Self-Sacrifice

FLAMES RAGING AT MANY POINTS

Mine Buildings and Much Valuable Timber Destroyed -Arrowhead Lumber Co., Meets With Heavy Loss


