### A GROWING INDUSTRY

The total number of dairy factories in operation in Canada in 1924 was 2,998 and the total value of production was \$124,143,470 according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This is a decrease of nine in the number of factories and an increase of \$4,023,060 in the value of product, compared with 1923.

### SHOT MAMMOTH DEER

Fredericton Mail: William Barrett, who is employed on Akosno Staples' farm at Kingsley, had the carcass of the largest deer shot this season on sale in the Fredericton market, Saturday morning. One of the hind-quarters of the venison weighed 66 pounds, and it is said the animal dressed 250 pounds. The antlers were very large and well formed and carried no less than thirty points.
