COUNCIL MEETING AT NEW CARLISLE

General Meeting of the Bonaventure County Councils Held on September the Ninth

A general meeting of the County Council of the County of Bonaventure was held at the Town Hall, at New Carlisle, on Wednesday, the ninth day of September, 1914, at 10 a.m.

The whole forming a quorum according to the provisions of the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec. Upon the opening of the meeting and in view of the absence of the Warden Dr. H. J. Martin, Mayor of Carleton Place, seconded by Mayor Levesque, that Mayor Busted act as Chairman of the meeting. This motion was adopted and the Council proceeded to business.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved by the Council, upon the motion of Mayor Blois, seconded by Mayor McRae.

The petition of the inhabitants of the Parish of Saint Simeon praying to be erected into a Municipality of the Parish was then laid before the Council by the Secretary-Treasurer for their consideration. Mr. John Hall Kelly, Advocate appearing for the petitioners.

After deliberation thereon, and all the requirements and formalities of the Municipal Code having been fulfilled, the Council, upon the motion of Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Cochran, resolved to grant the petition, and to erect into a Parish Municipality under the name of "The Parish of Saint Simeon", for all municipal purposes, as provided for by the Municipal Code, and that the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council be respectfully requested to approve the present resolution.

The petition of the inhabitants of the Parish of Saint Andre de Restigouche was re-considered by the Council, Mr. A. Cote, Advocate appearing for the petitioners, and Mr. John Hall Kelly for the Municipality of St. Alexis de Matapedia.

After deliberation thereon by the Council, it was moved by Mayor Castonguay, seconded by Mayor Cyr, as follows, to wit:—
"That the Parish of St. Andre de Restigouche be erected into a municipality of the Parish according to its canonical boundaries, as per motion already put before this Council, at its last meeting, and that the same be adopted."

Whereupon it was moved in AMENDMENT by Mayor Levesque and seconded by Mayor McRae, that the said motion be not adopted, and that the present Municipality of Restigouche West remain as heretofore.

For the Amendment—Mayors Frenette, Darche, McRae, Beebe, Dugas, Ferlatte, Blois, Scott, Cochran, Adams, Levesque, Angellard.

Against the Amendment—Mayors Cyr, Castonguay and Bourdages.

The majority of the Council voting in favour of the Amendment, the main motion was declared lost. Adopted.

Several petitions from the inhabitants of Port Daniel, New Richmond, Escuminac, St. Omer, Pasphebie, Caplan, Carleton, St. Alexis, Port Daniel East, New Carlisle and St. Andre de Restigouche were presented to the Council, praying for the adoption of a County Prohibitory By-Law regarding intoxicating liquors and the granting of licenses therefor, were laid before the Council, and duly deliberated upon.

It being the dinner hour, the meeting was adjourned, upon the motion of Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Frenette, until 1.30 p.m.

At 1.30 p.m., the Council resumed their proceedings, continuing their deliberation upon the proposed County Prohibitory By-Law.

Whereupon it was moved by Mayor Cochran, seconded by Mayor Beebe, that this Council do adopt the following By-Law, to wit:—
"Be it ordained and resolved by law that the County of Bonaventure, in the Province of Quebec, do hereby prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors and the issuing of licenses therefor, under the authority and for the enforcement of Section Fifteenth of Chapter Fifth of Title Fourth of the Revised Statutes of Quebec, 1907."

Whereupon it was moved in AMENDMENT by Mayor Blois, seconded by Mayor Frenette, that the said By-Law be not now adopted by this Council, but that the respective Rural Municipalities of this County still retain the powers which they have heretofore held in matters relating to Prohibitory enactments dealing with intoxicating liquors, as represented by their local Councils.

For the Amendment—Mayors Blois, Frenette, Dugas, Cyr, Ferlatte, and Cyr.

Against the Amendment—Mayors McRae, Beebe, Scott, Adams, Cochran, Angellard, Castonguay, Levesque, and Bourdages.

The majority of the Council voting against the amendment, the main motion and By-Law was declared carried. Adopted.

Mayor Cochran of New Richmond gave communication to the Council of a Resolution adopted by the Council of New Richmond authorizing him to place before the Council of the County of Bonaventure the advisability of interviewing Mr. C. R. Scoles, General Manager of the Quebec Oriental Railway Company about the trains on the said railway running on the same time as at present, so that the M.A.S. will not be left a day and night in Matapedia, which would be the case if the said Mr. Scoles changes to the old time.

After deliberation the Council, upon the motion of Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Ferlatte, approved of and adopted the resolution of the local Council of New Richmond. Adopted.

The Council then, upon the motion of Mayor Blois, seconded by Mayor McRae, passed and adopted the following resolution, to wit:—
Be it resolved by the County Council of the County of Bonaventure as follows:—
That it is of vital importance to the twenty-one local Municipalities of the County of Bonaventure in particular, and to the District of Gaspé in general, that the trains of the Quebec Oriental Railway Company do continue to run on the same time and schedule as at present, existing connections with the "Ocean Limited" of the Intercolonial Railway of Canada, so that His Majesty's Mails from Matapedia Eastward along this County and District, BE NOT left a day and night at Matapedia, which would be the case if a reversion to the old time be had; That the Honorable L. P. Pelletier, Postmaster General of Canada be memorialized to that effect; That copies of this Resolution be forthwith transmitted by the Secretary-Treasurer of this Council, to the Honorable the said Postmaster General, and the said Mr. C. R. Scoles, General Manager of the said Railway Company. Adopted.

The Secretary-Treasurer then laid before the Council the following accounts—Mayor's expenses, transport of an inmate from the Municipality of St. John the Evangelist and the account of Mr. J. H. Journeau, Special Road Superintendent, which were approved of and ordered to be paid, upon the motion of Mayor Dugas, seconded by Mayor Adams.

Mayor Dugas of Musseyville called the attention of the Council to the Resolution adopted by the same, at its last meeting, relating to what is known as the Mercier Road, and the continuation thereof, appertaining to the interest of the Municipality of St. Charles de Caplan and Musseyville, and the illegalities of the said Resolution, whereupon the Council, after consideration, upon the motion of Mayor Blois, seconded by Mayor Adams rescinded and annulled the said Resolution.

The Council discussed the proposition of praying the Local Government at Quebec to take over and macadamize the King's Highway in the County of Bonaventure, and after due deliberation adopted the following resolution upon the motion of Mayor Cyr, seconded by Mayor McRae, to wit:—
Be it resolved by this Council as follows:—
Whereas it is necessary and urgent that the King's Highway or Main Road, in the County of Bonaventure, beginning from the West end of the County and continuing on to Point a la Piquette, be modernized by the proper gravelling and macadamizing thereof; Whereas it is not within the means of the inhabitants of the County of Bonaventure, on its total length of 130 miles or more, and with its intricate, hilly, rocky, and by roads, to properly gravel and macadamize the said King's Highway; Whereas it would be of incalculable benefit to the inhabitants of this County in particular, and to the general advantage of the District of Gaspé and Province of Quebec, were the said gravelling and macadamizing to be done; Wherefore the Council of the County of Bonaventure, humbly memorialize the Local Government at Quebec, respectfully praying them, for the reasons as hereinabove stated, to take over the said road for the proper gravelling and macadamizing of the said Road;

Further resolved that copies of this Resolution be forthwith transmitted to Sir Lomer Gouin, Premier of the Province of Quebec, the Honorable J. P. Tassier, Minister of Roads, and J. F. Rubeau, Esq., Advocate, Member of the Legislative Assembly of this County. Adopted.

It being intimated to the Council that the Warden Dr. H. J. Martin, Mayor of Carleton, would be present at the meeting, upon the arrival of the East-bound train, the meeting was adjourned until 4.30 p.m., upon the motion of Mayor Blois, seconded by Mayor Darche.

At 4.30 p.m., the Council resumed its meeting with Dr. H. J. Martin, the Warden in the chair.

After loyal and patriotic discussions by the Council, and the members thereof, upon the motion of Mayor Frenette, seconded by Mayor Darche, the following resolution was unanimously adopted, to wit:—
Be it RESOLVED by the Council of the County of Bonaventure, as follows:—
WHEREAS the Empire which we belong, allied with France, Belgium and Russia, is at present engaged in a war of equality, justice, and liberty to all mankind; THAT this the Council of the County of Bonaventure, now in session, do place on record its sincere sympathy and approval of the War. Adopted.

Mr. L. P. Lebel laid before the Council, communication from the Local Government at Quebec relating to the division of the County for Agricultural purposes, and after discussion the meeting then adjourned.

UNCERTAINTY HINDERS LUMBER OPERATIONS

Miramichi Lumbermen do Not Know How Much to Cut Owing to Unsettled Conditions

(Chatham Gazette)

The S.S. General Gordon, Capt. Fair, arrived in port at noon, Thursday to load for the J. B. Snowball Co. This company is endeavoring to get two more steamers to load here before the close of the present season.

While the lumber companies are sending men into the woods to start preliminary work, few of them are starting work on as large a scale as in former years. One thing that unsettles the market at the present time is the uncertainty in connection with the Baltic shipments. At the present time many vessels loaded with lumber are tied up at Baltic ports and when the North Sea is open to shipping they will cross to England and temporarily flood the market. This contingency is preventing the lumbermen from involving themselves too deeply in operations until it is absolutely necessary before the advent of winter. The latest news from Old Country is that lumber has dropped considerably.

On and after Sept. 25th, there will be a change of the train service on the International Railway of New Brunswick, operated by the Canadian Government Railways. There will be one train daily, except Sunday, each way between Campbellton and St. Leonard's, one leaving Campbellton at 12.40 p. m., and the other leaving St. Leonard's at 8.40 a. m., arriving in Campbellton 4.00 p. m. 2 ins-Sept 24
