

PLANES OFF FOR WEST VIRGINIA

Thirteen Army Machines En Route to Scene of Rioting

REPORTS CONFLICTING

But Gen. Banaholtz Asks for Troops at Once

LANGLEY FIELD, Vt., Sept. 1.—(Associated Press Dispatch)—Thirteen De Havilland airplanes left here at 11 o'clock this morning for the coal fields of West Virginia. The squadron is in command of Major Davenport Johnson, who saw service in France. Each plane has a pilot and observer aboard.

REPORTS CONFLICT.

LOGAN, W. Va., Sept. 1.—Conflicting reports of happenings along Spruce Fork Ridge, on one side of which armed bands were gathered, while on the other side Logan County deputy sheriffs, volunteers and state troops, were circulated here to-night.

URGES HASTE.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Sept. 1.—At midnight Gen. Banaholtz announced that he had dispatched a telegram to the war department at Washington to send federal troops into West Virginia at once. In announcing his decision to recommend martial law, Gen. Banaholtz made the following statement: "I am satisfied the miners will not obey the president's proclamation. A telegram has been sent to Washington requesting federal troops at once."

TRAINS READY.

CHILLICOTHE, Ohio, Sept. 1.—Eleven coaches and a baggage car were furnished by the Norfolk & Western Railroad here to-day for transportation of troops from Camp Sherman into the troubled district of West Virginia. The coaches were taken to Camp Sherman this morning and it was understood that the troops there were prepared for move at a moment's notice.

Capt. Hollingsworth came into town early in the evening and declared that deputies patrolling Crooked Creek had been driven down the hillside by a band from across the ridge. Immediately an emergency force was sent out.

REPORT OF WOUNDED.

When asked to verify the report shortly afterward Col. Eubanks, in charge of county forces, declined to confirm it, or another, said to have been brought in from the Crooked Creek district, that two deputies had been wounded.

Capt. Lawson, of the Mingo Militia, who has charge of Mingo and McDowell state patrols, brought three prisoners into town to-night. He departed half an hour later, saying he had been directed to return to the mountain district. At the same time two airplanes passed eastward, flying in the direction of the Logan-Boone border.

FOUR PARTIES IN THE CAMPAIGN

First General Election With Such Situation

NEW ELECTION LAW

All Women Enfranchised Under Certain Conditions

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—(By Canadian Press).—The coming general election will be the first fought with four definite parties—Government, Liberal, National Progressive and Labor—in the field. It will be contested on existing distribution of seats, but under the new election law. What the result will be is beyond the most daring of political prophets, except that it is likely to result in the election of powerful groups, with the possible formation of a coalition Government. Recent results in Alberta indicated the powerful grip on the Prairie Provinces of the National Progressives, and the prime minister's speech in London to-night is indication that it is against the anti-protectionist views of the National Progressives that the Government's campaign will be chiefly directed.

The campaign will be short but keen. The prime minister's announcement of an election before the new year is taken to indicate that there will be little delay in Cabinet reconstruction and in the issue of writs, with the holding of the election as soon as the necessary official preparations can be made.

THE WOMEN'S VOTE.

Thousands of women will vote who were not enfranchised in the last election. The female relatives of soldiers were entitled to the vote. The new election law enfranchises all women, with certain exceptions in the case of women of foreign birth, who are over the age of 21 years. Generally speaking, every person, male or female, will be qualified to vote when not being an Indian ordinarily resident on an Indian reservation—(a) is a British subject by birth and naturalization, and (b) is of the full age of 21 years, and (c) has ordinarily resided in Canada for at least 12 months and in the electoral district where such person seeks to vote for at least two months immediately preceding the issue of the writ of election.

It is provided, however, that any Indian who has served in the naval, military or air forces of Canada is eligible to vote unless otherwise disqualified.

LEFT WIFE HERE, SAY SARNIA AUTHORITIES

SARNIA, Sept. 1.—An enlargement until September 8 was granted by Magistrate Gorman in the case of Archie L. Tomlinson, 210 North Christina street, arraigned on a charge of non-support. The defendant's counsel, N. J. LeSueur, did not plead on behalf of his client and no evidence was taken. A second charge of bigamy was preferred, according to the police, and evidence on both counts may be taken when the hearing is resumed. It is alleged that Tomlinson left his wife in London, came to Sarnia and later married again in Port Huron.

NO DECISION YET ON FREIGHT RATES CUT

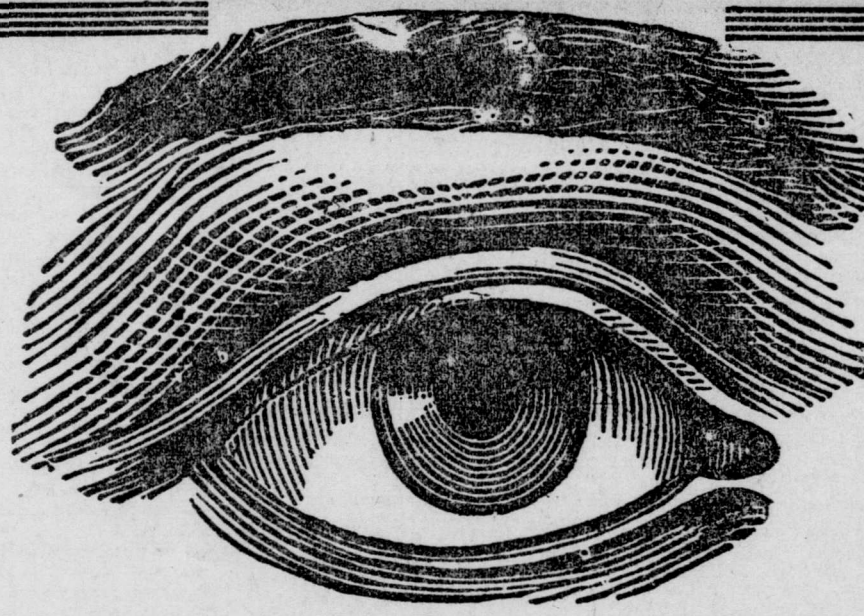
Representatives of Railways and Rail-Way Board Chief Hold Long Conference.

Hon. P. B. Carvell, chief railway commissioner, stated at the close of to-night's meeting that there was nothing for publication and that the conference would continue to-morrow. Representatives of the railways also said that no decision had been arrived at. It is understood that the railway heads are putting up a strong fight against reduced rates on the ground that reductions in wages and material do not yet warrant any cut in charges.

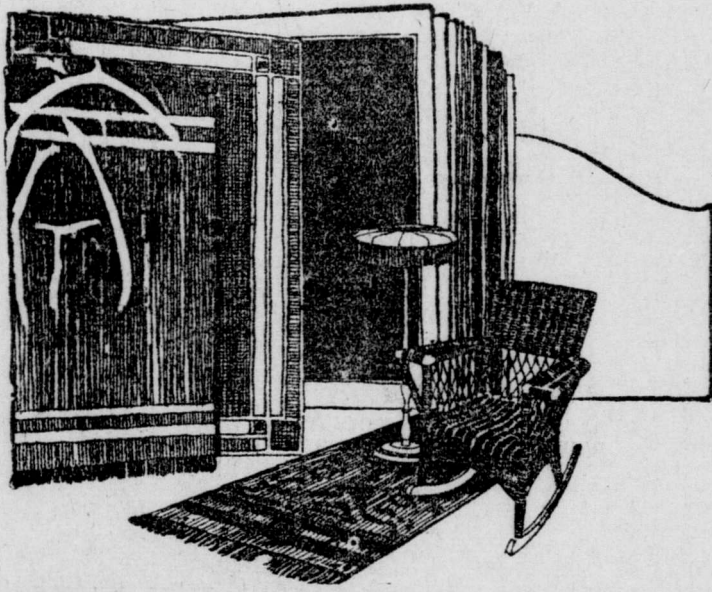

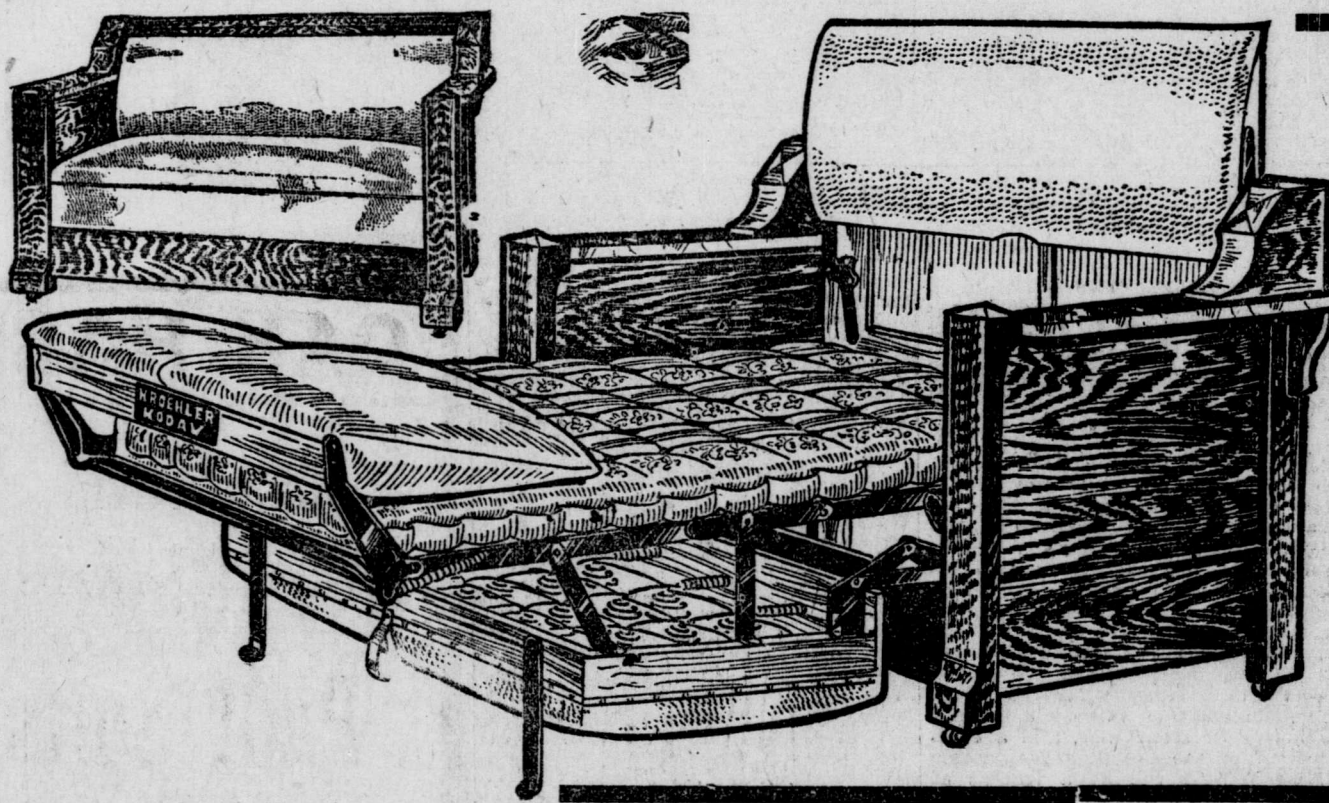
