## NOTE AND COMMENT.

The annual report of the head constable which has just been published, shows that Canterbury, England, is about the most sober in Great Britain despite the fact that there are 83 public houses to every 10,000 of the population. The number of convictions for drunkenness for every 10,000 amounts to only 4.6. The figures are the more remarkable from the fact that the city has more drinking places than any other city in England in comparison with its population.

Business agents and officials of nearly every skilled craft union in Toronto report labor conditions to be normal or brisk. Indoor trades report the usual summer slackness, but nothing unusual at this time of the year. The stories of hard times appear to rise either from fear of the coming winter, or from the mass of unskilled workers, who are certainly feeling the effects of a tight labor market.

The automobile is as deadly as a small war. In the year ending June 30th, automobilists killed or injured a total of 753 people in the city of Detroit. The fatalities number 41 and the other accidents 712. Motorcycles killed four and injured 111, making a grand total of casualties from motor vehicles 868.

In view of the frequency of canoe fatalities, a suggestion is offered by Mr. W. H. Hill, of the Home Bank, London, that may be of interest throughout the province. It is that

all canoes be ordered by the Government to be fitted with side ropes attached at both ends, but hanging at the middle in the water. These ropes would not impede the progress of the canoe and could be so attached as not to interfere with the canoeist. In the event of accident, persons thrown into the water, instead of having only the slippery canoe bottom to which they hold, would have at hand a means of saving their lives.

The work of stamping out tuberculosis in cattle is about to be made national in character in the Dominion. By a recent federal order-in-council regulations have been authorized which will empower the department of agriculture to enter into an agreement with cities for the definite object of eradicating bovine tuberculosis from all dairy herds supplying milk to cities. This has been under contemplation with the minister of agriculture for two years, and its adoption will be the means of very materially assisting the work so thoroughly set about by the government in this province.

The parcel post has reached the top of its popularity. From the time of its inception the popularity of the parcel post has increased and the volume likewise till about six weeks ago since when there has been no increase. The volume of the mail has remained steady since then however and it is proving a fairly heavy one all the time.

What does it cost to produce the various crops grown on the farm or to fatten hogs or beef? This is a question very few can answer, partly because accurate accounts have never been kept, and again, conditions vary. It costs some more than others. But when records are kept of work done on the farm and feed fed to stock, farming will appeal more strongly to those engaged in the occupation of growing the material that feeds the world. Four hundred and fifty young men in the Province of Ontario, who attended agricultural classes held by district representatives last winter, are this summer entered in an acre profit competition and the young man in each county who obtains the highest net profit from his crop is rewarded by having his expenses paid for two weeks stock and seed course at Guelph in January, 1915. The information obtained in keeping accounts will be valuable to the public as well as the boys doing the work. No matter how high prices are, the vital question is, how much did it cost to produce the crop or pound of beef or butter.

## BROOKE COUNCIL.

Alvinston 25th July 1914.  
Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present. Minutes of previous meetings read, and on motion of Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. McCabe, were approved.

Application made by Mr. Tait for bonus for the erection of wire fence, McCabe—Bourne, that Council refuse to grant or give any bonus for wire fences.—Carried.  
Mr. Shields asked for the erection of a new bridge, leading into lot W 1/2 27 Cont. 7. Considerable discussion but no action.

Geo. Bowie applied for pay for one sheep killed and lambs damaged, valued at \$18. Thomas Saunders for one killed and three sheep and one lamb worried, valued at \$16., and Thomas Sisson for two thoroughbred ewes and three lambs killed and others injured, valued at \$80., all by dogs. Bourne—Kennedy, that Mr. Bowie be paid the sum of \$12. Mr. Saunders the sum of \$10.66, and Mr. Sisson the sum of \$53.33.—Carried.

McCabe—Bourne, that Commissioner's report on the completion of the Wallis-Bolton drain be accepted.—Carried.

McCabe—Campbell, that the Commissioner's report on the completion of the work on the Craig drain be adopted, and the sum of \$51.50, the costs in connection with drain levied pro-rata on the parties assessed for the work.—Carried.

Bourne—McCabe, that the adjourned Court of Revision on the McGill 27 Cont. Line Drain, be reopened, the Reeve in the chair.—Carried.

Campbell—McCabe, that assessment in bylaw be adopted without any change therein, and report closed.—Carried.

Bourne—McCabe, that council open as a Court of Revision on the 6/7 con. road and Weidman drain bylaw, the Reeve in the chair.—Carried. Declarations taken, three appeals David Lloyd sworn said, I am assessed too high. Arch Leitch sworn said, I also am assessed too high. Edward Chapman who had appealed against lots in the 8th Con. did not appear. Owners of lots appealed against were present and opposed any increase.

Kennedy—Campbell, that \$6.50 each be struck off the assessments on lots E 1/2 1 w 1/2 2, and N w 1/4 3, con. 6, and these reductions amounting to \$8.50 added to the amount payable by Township. That these changes be made in the assessment in bylaw and then adopted and report closed.—Carried.

Campbell—McCabe, that George Tait be paid the sum of \$25.00 for cutting the noxious weeds on lot NE 1/4 15 Con. 5, south of railway, and that the clerk be authorized to charge this amount on the collector's roll against the different parties assessed for this land.—Carried.

J. Kersey, Courier, Watford, applied for return of money paid for hire of horse, while his own was laid up by injuries received in crossing defective culvert, on 6/7 sideroad, con. 13. Laid over.

Bourne—Campbell, that the clerk be instructed to forward a request on behalf of this council, to the Secretary of the Hydro-Roadway Department, Toronto, for the survey of a line or lines for a Radial Railway through Brooke; providing such survey and report are made free of expense to the township.—Carried.

McCabe—Campbell, that the Engineer's report on the extension of the Parker—Lucas drain, the repair to the Parker—Lucas drain and the repair to the 13th Con. drain be accepted, and Clerk instructed to prepare for submission at next meeting, a bylaw authorizing this work.—Carried.

Bourne—Campbell, whereas this Council find it necessary to erect three new steel bridges during the present year, two of them on the 10-11 con. road, and one over the Sydenham River on 24-25 sideroad in the 8th Con., costing somewhere about \$10,000, which sum will have to be raised by either a direct levy in one year, or borrowed by the issue and sale of debentures, the repayment of which could be spread over a term of years, and which issue of debentures would have to be authorized by a vote of the qualified electors of the township. Therefore we direct the Clerk to have ready for next meeting of council a bylaw authorizing a vote to be taken to borrow the sum of \$10,000 by the issue of debentures, to be repaid in ten years with interest at 5 per cent. per annum. It being understood that those who vote AGAINST the bylaw, vote in favor of levying the cost of the bridges in one year.—Carried.

Bourne—Kennedy, that the bylaws for the Lamb drain and Pray drain be each read a third time and finally passed.—Carried, read and passed.

Bourne—Kennedy, that the Council do now adjourn to meet in the Village of Inwood on Saturday, the 15th day of August, 1914.—Carried.
