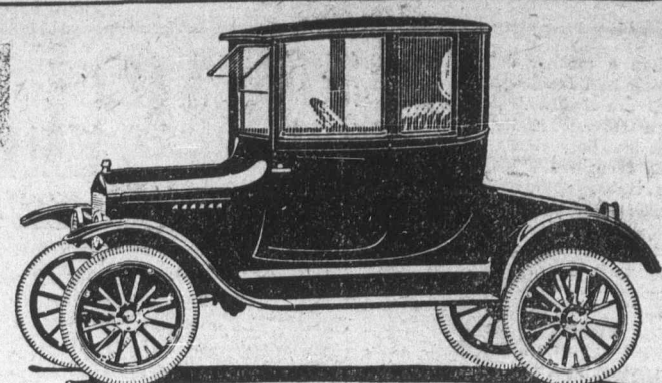

Miss Lottie Cameron of the Watford Public School, rendered a pleasing solo which was greatly appreciated. Miss Leapha Annett read a good report of the O.E.A. meeting held in Toronto last Easter. Miss F. M. McRae gave an interesting paper on Community Work in Schools. Henry Conn, Inspector of West Lambton, brought the Convention to a close with a splendid address on the subject of Intelligence Tests.

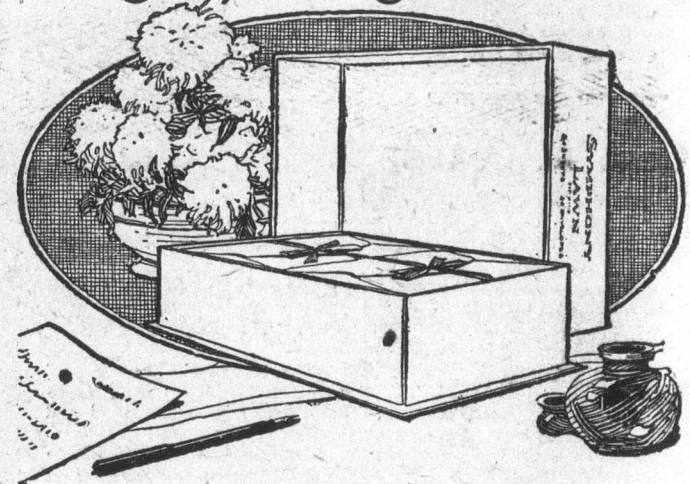
