derhart and others will sing. The audience

military. To illustrate the thoroughness
being given to details, Manager Philip has
sent to Britain for a particular song and to
Philadelphia for a particular view for the
projectoscope. The admission prices are
35, 25 and 15 cents. No tickets will be
peddled about. The plan will be opened in
the usual way.

expression to the loyalty of the Twin-City.
