MURDER .- We are sorry to have to record the particulars of the following shocking occurrence, which took place in this city, on Friday last, in a public house, in the New Market. It seems that two young French Canadians, named Jean Baptiste Rousseau and Loms Beancure, a butcher, had quarrelled some years ago; and unexpectedly met at the house in question on Friday evening, when Beaucaire, who is said to have been a little intoxicated. again commanded to quarrel with Roussau and threatened to kill him. Rousseau replied, "that he had no quarrel with him, and wished to be good friends again," and invited him to take a glass of samething with hunself, and was in the act of turning round to the bar, when Beaucaire seized a red hot poker and strack han on the back of the head with it. The unfortunate young man fell senseless, and died on Saturday, the 6th instant, at half-past 12 o'clock. The unhappy author of the misches was apprehended and is now in custody. Rousseau bore a very high character, was much esteemed by his employer, Mr. Courcelle, whose foreman he was. He has left an aged father, whose support he was. The Coroner's Inquest, which was held on the body, returned the following verdict: "Murder, with malice aforethought," i. e. in the second degree .- Marning Courier, Jan. 8.
