On the recommendation of the Hon. the Minister of fort clause of "The Fisheries Act," His Excellency has been pleased to make the following Regulation:---"No person shall fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell, or have in possession any Bass between the first day of April and the first day of August in each year, in the Pro-vinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, nor at any "time shall Bass of a less weight than two pounds be inshed for, caught, killed, bought, sold or had in posses-sion, and if caught by accident in nets or other fishing "the cost and risk of the owner of the fishery on whom in every case shall devolve the proof of such actual libera-tion : Provided that nothing contained in this regula-tion shall prevent any person from fishing for, catching " athen of Bass so caught shall be liberated alive at "or sale of Bass so caught shall impose on the possessor," purchaser or seller the burden of proving the lawful "W. Emigrants should take their own rations. Provisions will, however, be furnished at cost price, at Shebando-wan, Fort Frances, and the North-West Angle of the Lake of the Woods.

Through Tickets for Emigrant: to Fort Ga rry via Princ Arthur's Eanding,

Can be had at Toronto, at the Stations of the Northern, Great Western, and Grand Trunk Railways. Emigrants are requested to take notice that packages of luggage are limited to 200 lbs. weight for convenience trausport on the Portages.

#### Merchandise

Merchandise. After 20th June next, will be transported from Prince Arthur's Landing to the Eastern terminus of the Fort Garry Road, North-West Angle, at the rate of \$2 per 100 lbs, or \$40 per ton of 2,000 lbs.
