mandate in the interests of development and self-government of the peoples of South West Africa. We believe the answer is no. South Africa's long history of failing to pay regard to the rightful interest and concern of the international community for the detailed reports of this administration has frustrated any meaningful international supervision even to the degree required by the mandate. In the opinion of my delegation, therefore, the record of South Africa constitutes clear grounds for stating that, in consideration of the well being of the inhabitants of South West Africa, South Africa has lost the right to continue administering the mandate. For our part, the Canadian delegation pledges to do what it can in the light of these comments to join with others in trying to work out how best the decisions of the United Nations General Assembly can be fulfilled.
