LE DAIN COMMISSION REPORT

2. How many copies must be sold in order to make the publication profitable and what, if anything, is the government doing to avoid loss on the publication?

Hon. Martin P. O'Connell (Minister of Labour): 1. 5,339 French copies and 24,960 English copies have been printed of the Interim Report of the Commission of Inquiry into the Non-Medical Use of Drugs. Copies are sold through Information Canada's Centres (Bookshops), commercial booksellers which have asked for them and by mail order from Information Canada. The Report sells for \$2 per copy.

2. The publication became profitable after the sale of 4,270 copies of the French edition and 19,960 copies of the English edition. Copies of the Report are nearly sold out and a revised second edition is presently under consideration.

1. How many manufacturers have been helped to take advantage of export opportunities arising from the Kennedy Round by the General Adjustment Assistance Board since it was established in 1968?

2. How much money has been saved or expended by manufacturers as a result of the establishment of the General Adjustment Assistance Board?

3. What is the yearly cost of maintaining the General Adjustment Assistance Board?

Mr. Bruce Howard (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): 1. A total of 76 manufacturers have been assisted.

2. (a) The amount that manufacturers have saved is not available. (b) As a result of the establishment of GAAP, manufacturers have expended or committed to expend \$77,914,000 on restructuring programs.

3. For fiscal year 1971/72, a total of \$11,000.

SENATE COMMITTEE REPORT ON POVERTY

Question No. 318-Mr. Robinson:

1. How many copies of the Senate Committee Report on Poverty have been produced?

2. Where are they sold and what is the price per copy?

3. How many copies must be sold in order to make production profitable or break even?

4. What, if anything, will the government do to avoid any possible loss on the publication of the Senate Committee Report on Poverty?

Hon. Martin P. O'Connell (Minister of Labour): 1. 2,500 French copies and 11,544 English copies have been printed of the Senate Committee Report on Poverty.

2. Copies are sold through Information Canada's Centres (Bookshops), commercial booksellers which have asked for them and by mail order from Information Canada. The Report sells for \$2 per copy.

3. Sales must reach 8,772 copies of the English edition and 1,676 copies of the French edition in order to recover printing costs. Sales of the English edition have exceeded the break even point and the French edition is within 100 copies of that level.

FEDERAL ASSISTANCE TO STATE OF BANGLA DESH

Question No. 347-Mr. Robinson:

Has the government extended recognition of the independent State of Bangla Desh and, if so, what assistance is planned by the government for this nation at the present time?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): The Government of Canada recognized the state of Bangla Desh on February 14, 1972. A Canadian mission headed by Mr. Gérin-Lajoie, President of CIDA, recently visited Bangla Desh and assessed the humanitarian and rehabilitation requirements. As a result of the mission's findings and in co-ordination with the United Nations Relief Organization Dacca (UNROD), a Canadian aid program is being discussed with Bangla Desh officials. The prospective breakdown is as follows: food aid \$20 million; railway track material \$7 million; tubewell project \$5 mil-
