## **GOVERNOR GENERAL OF CANADA**

APPOINTMENT OF EDWARD SCHREYER—RETIREMENT OF JULES LÉGER

Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Deputy Prime Minister and President of Privy Council): Mr. Speaker, it gives me great pleasure today to advise the House that Her Majesty the Queen, this morning in London, approved the recommendation by the Prime Minister (Mr. Trudeau) that Mr. Edward Schreyer be appointed the next Governor General of Canada.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. MacEachen: Those of us who have served in the House of Commons for a period of time well remember the vigorous young member who served the interests of his province and region so well during the four years he spent in Ottawa before returning to the west to become premier of Manitoba.

At only 43 years of age, he now takes on the deep national responsibilities of a new office which symbolizes such a vital link between the different parts of Canada and gives evidence of the cultural and linguistic character of the country.

Mr. Schreyer's background itself is almost a manifestation of the Canadianism, if I may use that word, which developed as this land was being settled. He was born during the depression to a Manitoba farm family of German descent. While growing up in the west, he became familiar with German, Polish and Ukrainian and while serving as a member of parliament was quick to take advantage of the opportunity to learn French, a language in which he is now fluent.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. MacEachen: In his political career, while lending his efforts to improving the conditions of daily life for Canadians generally, he has always had a particular concern and compassion for the native people and those whose opportunities have been limited by factors outside their control.

Mr. Speaker, Mr. Schreyer has a feeling for all of Canada and possesses qualities which I am sure will bring the same sense of understanding and excellence to this high position as was possessed by his predecessors.

Finally, Mr. Speaker, to his Excellency the Right Hon. Jules Léger, and Madame Léger, we would offer our deep gratitude and affection for their warm and enthusiastic contribution to our country and its unity.

Mr. MacEachen: The word "distinguished" is the exact description of their performance, and I think all members would wish to salute their courage and dedication in the past five years. We extend to them our best wishes for many more happy years together.

Mr. Joe Clark (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, I am pleased to receive, as I am sure the House is, the announcement by the Deputy Prime Minister (Mr. Mac-Eachen) of the approval of Her Majesty, this morning, of the recommendation by the Prime Minister for the appointment of Mr. Schreyer as next Governor General of Canada. I am sure he will do a good job in that role, and on behalf of my colleagues I want to wish him well.
